# Accord with Jordan

The Sultanate of Oman and Jordan signed an agreement on Tuesday to develop relations in trade, industry and agriculture.

The agreement was signed by Col. Salem bin Abdulla al Ghazali, Minister of Commerce and Industry and his Jordanian counterpart Dr. Rajai al Mashar at the Ministry's headquarters in Ruwi.

The accord provides for the setting up a joint committee which will devise ways to promote economic cooperation between the two countries.

Talking to newsmen after the signing, Col. Salem bin Abdulla al Ghazali said the agreement, which reflects the desire of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos and His Majesty King Hussain to bring their countries closer, will provide a framework to regularise economic relations.

The joint committee set up under the agreement will set the economic relations between the

two countries in the right direction, he said, adding that the agreement will provide impetus to private sectors of both countries to increase contacts for mutual benefit

The Minister said he looked forward to his next meeting with his Jordanian counterpart in Amman to follow up the points discussed and agreed in Muscat.

He expressed the hope that the agreement will serve as a symbol of ideal relations between the two brotherly Arab countries.

Dr. Rajai al Mashar thanked Colonel Ghazali for the hospitality and warm welcome accorded him and his companions in Muscat. He said the extensive talks between the two countries culminated in a final agreement which

will pave the way for establishing joint ventures in the private sec-

The two sides, he said, agreed to the need to identify fields in which there is a possibility of setting up joint ventures.

Dr. Rajai said the talks centred on ways to promote commercial exchanges between the private sector which will enable businessmen of the two countries to know about their import and export needs.

He said to introduce Jordanian products to the Omani people his country will hold an industrial and tourist exhibition in Muscat in the second half of this year.

The Jordanian Minister said during his detailed talks with agriculture marketing authorities the two countries have agreed to exchange agricultural products to help farmers of both countries their priduce.

The second meeting of the Oman-Jordan Committee will be held Amman when Col. Salem bin Abdulla al Ghazali will attend.

Earlier in the morning the two minister met at the Oman



Chamber of Commerce and Industry along with officials and leading businessmen of the two countries. The meeting discussed ways of promoting cooperation between the private sectors of the two countries.

The Omani delegation at the talks included Col. Salem bin Abdulla al Ghazali, Dr. Omer bin Abdul Munim al Zawawi, His

## Traffic Week again soon

## Swedish warship visits Sultanate

Eleven women trainee naval officers are visiting Oman as part of the 203-member crew of the Swedish minelayer HMS Carlskrona which docked at Mina Qaboos on Monday.

The three-day visit is the first by the Swedish Navy to the Sultanate and is part of an extensive training expedition which started in December last year. The Carlskrona is now on its way back to its base in Sweden after calling on various ports in the Middle East and Far East - as far as away as Shanghai.

The women naval cadets are the first batch undergoing officer training in the Royal Swedish Navy after the Navy began accepting women cadets in 1984. For most of them it is their first voyage following which some will receive their commissions in December and the rest in April next year.

"They have been doing a great job," said Carlskrona's captain, Commander Gustataf af Klint, adding that they tried to give them an all-round experience.

After initial curiosity and what Commander Klint diplomatically called "discussions" in naval circles, the women have been accepted as equals by their male cadets. There is no discrimination in duties except that women are not permitted to do duty on submarines and as pilots.

The Carlskrona, now on its fourth foreign voyage, will have covered 23,000 nautical miles at

the end of the 103-day trip. The vessel has called at Rotterdam, Cartagena in Spain, Djibouti, the Maldives, Port Kelang, Brunei and Shanghai on its outward trip. Returning, it has stopped at Hong Kong and Colombo.

After leaving on Friday, the vessel will make one halt at Alexandria before sailing to its base in the city of Karlskrona, after which it is named.

"The voyage has been a good one with the weather almost as good as we expected in the Indian Ocean which was a little more windy," said Lieutenant Commander Leif Lindheimer, second in command.

The Muscat halt is particularly nice as they have more spare time than usual to spend seeing the city and going swimming and diving, their main interests.

The 3500 tonne Carlskrona, a combined minelayer and training vessel, is the largest and most modern ship of the Royal Swedish Navy. Built by the Swedish shipyard Karlskronavarvet AB, it was handed over to the Navy in March 1982.

On its current voyage, which serves the dual purpose of training cadets and showing the Swedish flag, it has a total crew of 203 comprising 47 officers 108 cadets, including the 11 women, and 48 conscripts.

### Health drive in Bahla

A health awareness programme, which will focus on child immunisation, the importance of breast feeding, nourishment and oral rehydration therapy, will be organised in the villages around Bahla.

The Public Health Unit in Bahla is busy preparing for it with the coordination of Bahla Development Work Group.

Debates, lectures, film shows and other programmes are to be held in Al Aqeer, Sankam, Al Aish villages in the Wadi Al Ula and Safil. The unit will also visit villages such as Harmat, Dan, Mewal, Seih-al Mash, Sint and Sumt in Wadi Ula.

The PHU in Bahla organised a number of educational debates within the framework of the National Child Health programme. The programmes were attended by many citizens.

Sumayil Public Health Complex organised similar debates.

### Tunisian message

Deputy Prime Minister for Financial and Economic Affairs, Qais bin Abdul Munim al Zawawi received a message from Tunisian Prime Minister Mohamed M'Zali dealing with bilateral relations.

The message was delivered by Tunisia's Ambassador in Muscat Abdullah al Areef.

## Sweden to have embassy in Oman

Sweden is to set up an embassy in Muscat soon. It will start functioning from July 1. Sweden's nonresident Ambassador to Oman told reporters on Tuesday.

Riyadh-based Ambassador Frank Belfrage said he will continue as non-resident Ambassador and the new mission would be headed by Charge d'Affairs Carlson. Sweden currently has a consulate in Muscat with an honorary consul general in charge.

Sweden had very good commercial and cultural relations with Oman, said Mr Belfrage, and it was increasing.

The estimated 250-strong Swedish community in Oman is also expected to increase as engineers and technicians from the Swedish telecom giant Ericson will be visiting the Sultanate to help develop a telecommunications network in rural areas.

The Ambassador, who met newsmen on board the visiting Swedish Navy vessel HMS Carlskrona, said he welcomed the visit as a new feature in cultural exchanges between the two countries.

### Tribute to Omani-UK links

Foreign Under-Secretary for Political Affairs, Sayyid Haitham bin Tarek al Said paid tribute to Omani-British relations and described them as deep-rooted.

In an interview with "Oman Newspaper" Sayyid Haitham said that a meeting of the Omani-British Joint Commission, in London would give a fresh impetus to the existing bilateral cooperation.

Asked if there was any plan for an extraordinary session of the AGCC Foreign Ministers to discuss the consequences of the flare-up in the Iraq-Iran war Sayyid Haitham said that the situation did not demand such a session particularly when Iraq was said to have repulsed the Iranian attack.

He added that the AGCC Foreign Ministers will hold an ordinary session in Riyadh next month.

### Post

The Ministry of Posts, Telegraphs and Telephones is planning postal services for the newly developed communities in the Capital Area.

The first two communities which are on the list of the Ministry for launching services are Wadi Kabir and Wadi Hattat.

Habib Hamdan, Director of Capital Area Post Offices said this week that until permanent places are found for post offices in the two areas there will be mobile post office vans.

### Electricity for 3 towns

The towns of Dank, Mazim and Yanqul and a number of surrounding villages will receive electricity for the first time by the end of the year when work on the laying of a 132 KV transmission main line between Ibri and Wadi Jizzi power station is completed.

The line is being laid by Civil Contracting Company and National Electrical Services, but local transmission lines will be laid by other firms.

The Ministry of Electricity and Water has ordered surveying and invited quotations for the internal network which will use low tension, 11 KV lines.

Ibri town will also be served by the Wadi Jizzi power station after the installation of the main line and internal network.

The town is now fed by a diesel power station. This station will be

closed down when IDTI is connected with Wadi Jizzi power station which uses gas turbines.

To serve Ibri and the other areas, the capacity at the Wadi Jizzi station is being increased by 54 MW to a total of 160 MW.

## Meeting in Malaysia

In Malaysia, Oman's Charge d'Affaires, Ahmed bin Ibrahim bin Kasim, met the Malaysian Minister of Information, Datou Raees, to discuss ways to enhance relationship between the two countries.

### MINISTER SPEAKS OF PUNISHMENTS FOR OFFENDERS

Traders who charge higher prices for their goods despite repeated warnings from the Government will be dealt with sternly, Minister of Commerce and Industry Colonel Salem bin Abdulla al Ghazali said on Saturday.

## Money measures 'sufficient'

The devaluation of the rial and a ten per cent cut in expenditures announced by the Government were sufficient to overcome the present crisis following the fall in oil prices in the world market, Dr Sherif Lutfi, Advisor to His Majesty the Sultan and Secretary-General of the State Development Council, has said.

Dr Lutfi said the devaluation was a necessary and timely step, adding that he personally did not feel that any further measures were called for to meet the situation.

He said that Oman's economic and financial position had now become very strong making it confident to face the situation until the end of this year.

He added that the third Five Year Plan would be implemented as scheduled, however, the country must be prepared to face any new developments next year.

Dr Lufti said his personal prediction for 1986 was that oil prices would settle nearer to \$US20 per barrel.

Punishments contemplated, Colonel Ghazali said, includes putting a ban on imports by the errant traders, withdrawal of their trading licences and a reconsideration of their commercial registration.

He was speaking to reporters after a meeting with the AGCC Directors-General of Stores and Supplies at the Commerce and Industry Ministry.

Colonel Ghazali issued his first warning to traders not to increase prices on 2 February following a meeting with the directors of the Oman Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

On the previous day, Commerce and Industry Under-Secretary Ahmed bin Abdulnabi Macki held a meeting with the OCCI directors and local businessmen.

Colonel Ghazali said on Saturday "After the meetings we told the traders that we are giving them a chance to bring down prices already hiked, especially of foodstuffs.

"I told the Press at that time that the Ministry meant what it said.

"Today, after two weeks, we still find some of the traders charging unreasonable prices."

The Minister said the Government appreciated, however, the large number of businessmen who responded to its call positively in the interests of the nation.

About those who did not had the Ministry's advice, Colonel Ghazali said: "They are known to us by their names. We are compiling the names now in order to take the necessary action against them."

Oman, he said, had adopted the free enterprise economic system and was determined to follow it. "This policy does not mean that the consumers can be exploited," Colonel Ghazali warned.

He also admonished the traders not to misuse the 25 January devaluation of the Omani rial as an excuse to raise prices, adding the Government knew that international factors were to some extent responsible for the increase.

The international prices, however, went up three months before the devaluation, the Minster pointed out.

He said that Oman's economy was in very good shape as compared with several other countries.

Import duties levied by the Government did not exceed five per cent on any commodity while in some other countries the duty ranged from 30 per cent to 100 per cent.

Colonel Ghazali said a survey carried out by the Ministry on market trends in the country during the last two weeks revealed that prices in the Southern Region had gone up by eight to 11 per cent and those in the Capital Area by between 15 to 20 per cent and more.

The Minister also used the occasion on Saturday to warn Omanis on the dangers of depending on foreign business partners. The foreigners, he said, were here only for a short period and might not give enough importance to Oman's national interests.

Mr. G. Cranwell Montgomery, the United States Ambassador, held a reception at his residence on Monday to mark George Washington's birthday anniversary. It was attended by Government and diplomatic dignitaries and prominent people in Oman's business community.

### Batinah projects inspected

The Director-General of Public Works at the Housing Ministry, Abbas bin Jaffar bin Hussein, has completed a tour of the Batinah Region. He inspected various projects supervised and executed by his office for the Ministries of Health, the Interior, Justice, Awqaf and Islamic Affairs and Regional Municipalities.

The projects Mr Hussein visited included the wali's office in Nakhl; mini health centres in various stages of construction in Wadi Mistal, Wadi Bani Kharus, Wadi Hamli and Wadi al Hawasinah, the Rostaq market and the Sharia Court in Musanah.

He was accompanied on the tour by Bob Maclain from the second unit of the Directorate-General, George Mansour, in-charge of follow up, and engineers from public works offices in Sohar and Musanah.

## Girl Guide certificates presented

The wife of the Housing Minister, Ahmed bin Abdulla al Ghazli, presented certificates to the participants of a one week Girl Scouts and Guides camp held in Seeb.

The camp, organised by the Arab Girl Guides Bureau, was attended by 40 Girl Scouts and Guides from all over the country.

If focussed mainly on leadership training and community development projects, the Advisor for Programmes at the Omani Girl Guides Association, Rayya al Riyami said.

The main lectures were the Chairwomen of the Arab Girl Guides Bureau, Kamaria Amia and a number of the AGGB, Afaf Fateh.

### GTO course success

The General Telecommunciations Organisation's executive President, Noor bin Mohammed Abdul Rehman, presented certificates to GTO employees on completing training course in "Transmission and Power supply" at the GTO training Centre in Ruwi.

Eight employees received certificates for successfully completing the course.


An expert from Siemens Company of West Germany gave training on equipment-oriented transmissions.

## Top priority - the people

His Majesty Sultan Qaboos has stressed his determination to maintain the living standards of his people in the present world recession conditions.

In an interview with two international journalists, representing the Dutch Brabant Press and United Syndicate His Majesty said that this consideration was foremost in his planning.

His Majesty also said that diversification of the economy would be energetically pursued in order to reduce the Sultanate's heavy reliance on oil revenues.

On international affairs, His Majesty called for an all-out effort to bring about a peaceful end to the Iraq/Iran war. The region, His Majesty said, could not afford it, and it was a tragedy that the loss of life should continue.

Recent events in the People's

Democratic Republic of Yemen, His Majesty said, were a matter solely for the people of PDRY.

His Majesty added that assurances given by the new regime that the friendly relations established with the Sultanate would be further developed, were welcomed.

### Oman will host Jamboree

The Sultanate will host the Arab Scout Jamboree in July, according th Hussain Macki, the councillor of the Arab Scout Organisation, who attended the 16th Arab Region Scout Committee meeting at Amman recently.

Mr. Macki said that the committee in its meeting held from 5 to 7 February, also decided to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the scout movement in the Arab world.

He added that since the first Arab Scout Association was formed in Syria and Lebanon in 1911-12, it was decided to hold the opening of the 75th anniversary celebrations in Damascus in the middle of next year.

Mr. Macki will head the committee, formed to work out the celebration plans.

The committee also accepted recommendations by the medal committee and decided to present Arab Scout medals to four members, Mohammed Hassan Faima of Libya, Hussain Macki of Lebanon, Dr Hamid al Khafif of Egypt and Jordan's Samir Issikender.

Mr Hussain Macki, who is also member of the World Scout Organisation Committee, is working as an adviser with the Directorate of Youth Affairs.

### Foreign Ministry posts



## Gulf roundup



The technical committee of credit banks and funds in the six-member AGCC states held a meeting in Riyadh last week. A working paper prepared by the organisation's secretariat on closer policies in credit facilities for the industrial sector was discussed.

### The UAE

- The UAE's Seventh Annual Cleanliness Week will begin on March 11, officials of all municipalities decided at a meeting in Dubai last week. The Abu Dhabi Municipality has offered to supply saplings and seeds to other municipalities.
- A conference on the care of old people in accordance with Islamic teachings, will be held from April 21 to 24 in Abu Dhabi
- A total of 55 tankers have been "anchored idly" off the east coast of the UAE on account of a sharp drop in oil shipments out of the Gulf countries, the "Al-Khaleej" newspaper reported. Several company spokesman said the total had risen from about 30 during the past two years to 55 in the last quarter of 1985.
- The first plastic arts exhibition for juniors (5 to 16 age group) will be held at the Cultural Foundation in Abu Dhabi on February 22. The foundation will also organise the first UAE fair for women on March 8.
- A children's centre was formally opened at the Cultural Foundation in Abu Dhabi last week by the President's Representative Ahmed Khalifa al Suweidi. The centre has a library of religious and scientific books in Arabic and English for the six to 12 age group.

### 'Women only' beach in Abu Dhabi

The Abu Dhabi Municipality has restricted an area along the beach to serve as an exclusive resort for women and children below the age of six years. A special police contingent is to keep watch and guard the beach against intruders. Coast Guard vessels will keep all pleasure boats away from the resort.

A mini-waterfall is being completed on the beach. The cascade will be lit by coloured lights, a municipal spokesman said.

### **UAE** health strategy

The UAE Minister of Health, Hamad Abdul Rahman al Midfa, last week approved the new health strategy and working plan for achieving health care for all by the year 2000.

The strategy, worked out in co-operation with the World Health Organisation, includes a five-year national plan for health development.

Commenting on the gift, Vice-Chancellor Dr David Harrison, said: "This gift is especially important to Exeter now. It enables us to press forward with our exciting and imaginative plans to develop a much-needed postgraduate centre. This generous donation will spur us on to raise the remaining money required.'

Exeter University is noted for its flourishing Department of Arabic and Islami Studies and for its Centre for Arab Gulf Studies. The Centre is the only institution outside the Arab world devoted to the study of the Arabian Gulf.

### Saudi Arabia

- Prince Faisal ibn Fahd, Chief of the Saudi Presidency of Youth Welfare, last week signed a contract for the implementation of the Majma, Sports City Project.
- A sum of SR 1.196 billion has been allocated for municipal projects during the fiscal year 1985-86 in Saudi Arabia's Northern Province Ibrahim Khileif, Director-General of Municipal and Rural Affairs in the province said.

- Saudi Arabia has been praised by the World Health Organisation for the efficient manner in which it had almost eradicated a number of diseases through an intensive immunisation programme.
- The Saudi Arabian Government has donated \$1 million to the International Islamic University in Kuala Lumpur to ease the financial problems of overseas students there.
- A new fish and shrimp-breeding project is to be set up under the Saudi Fisheries Company's expansion plans. The scheme will be joint venture with the Moram agricultural establishment, Saudi Agriculture and Water Minster Dr. Abdul Rahma al Sheikh said.
- The Governor of Jizan, Muhammad ibn Turki al-Sundairi, last week opened a new hospital at Farasan island. The SR 150 million hospital is a gift from King Fahd to the area's citizens.
- The Arabian American Oil Company witnessed significant improvements in its safety records in 1985and officials claimed that in certain categories the company's safety performance had surpassed US petroleum industry's records.
- The Dammam Municipality is implementing projects worth SR 708 million, Zaid Fahd al-Sikeibi, its president, said.

### **Computer for** Jeddah jails

A computer system has been installed to maintain all records of convicts in Jeddah prisons, according to the weekly 'Saudi Economic Survey'

The system, which has been installed at a cost of SR 300,000, will be run by Saudi officers who have been trained for the job. Some of the prison inmates will also be trained - as part of the rehabilitation programme, the weekly said.

### Saudis to make toys

Saudi Arabia, a hot market for toys, is planning for its first local manufacture of the commodity, industry officials said.

The Ministry of Commerce and Industry has undertaken studies to determine the feasibility of manufacturing toys within the Kingdom, the officials said.

One licence has been issued for a factory in Dammam with an estimated output of 32,000 toys.

Three other plants - in Riyadh, Jeddah and another in Dammam are waiting for permission to begin operations.

Officials estimated that toys worth a total of about \$65 million were sold in the Kingdom last year.

Thailand has asked Saudi Arabia to drop a requirement for Thai workers to provide certificates guaranteeing them free from Aids, the "Saudi Gazete" said. It quoted Thailand's new Ambassador to the Kingdom Vibhak Bhinvoying, as saving that only six Aids cases had been reported in Thailand, four of whom were among foreigners. The tests at 500 baht (\$20) were expensive for the workers, he said.

## Saudi curbs on wheat production

Saudi Arabia has imposed production curbs on large Saudi wheat farmers to head of a massive wheat surplus it cannot store or is willing to pay for, according to 'Financial Times' reporting from Riyadh.

The Government has informed the Kingdom's largest wheat farming operations that it will buy only 60 per cent of the wheat they produced during last year's harvest.

Smaller operations, which produced over 2,000 tonnes during last year's harvest, are also hit by quotas. The Government has said it will only take 70 per cent of their harvests. Farms smaller than this are unaffected. They account for less than 50 per cent of the Kingdom's output.

The projected harvest this year, according to officials, is 1.7 million tonnes, double the estimated domestic consumption of 800,500 tonnes.

There are only 900,000 tonnes of storage available for wheat, in which 500,000 tonnes are already being stored.

The new harvest follows a record harvest last year of 1.3 million tonnes - threatening to overwhelm the Government silos.

## Plan for first aid centres on highways

The Saudi Red Cresent Society is planning to set up one first aid centre every 10km on the Kingdom's highways.

The society is co-ordinating its plans with the traffic department and the Ministry of Transport. Dr. Hammad Al Sugair, President of the Society, said all the pre-hospital emergency services in the Kingdom are the responsibility of his society.

The society has at present 110 first aid centres all over the Kingdom. The centres are manned by skilled staff and includes basic equipment, including ambulance.

### Qatar

- Qatar and Turkey last week exchanged in Doha the ratification instruments of the technical and economic agreement the two countries signed during the Emir's visit to Turkey in March last year.
- Qatar's Advisory Council met last week to discuss a memorandum from the Amir's office on the Council's recommendations on a new maternity hospital.
- A two-day computer fair was held at the Doha Club last week. Several computer gamesets and word-oprocessing packages were exhibited by local companies.

### Doha street names

Doha Municipality is to start putting up street names and building numbers in Doha on February 22, a project for which citizens have waited a long time, Doha's 'Gulf Times' reported. Doha will be the first area where some 50 metal boards will be installed on main streets.

This will be followed by posting boards with building numbers.

- There were 93 fatal road accidents in Qatar last year and more than 800 victims were admitted to hospitals with modernate to serious injuries, authorities said in Doha.
- The Qatari Cabinet last week approved a bill on procedures and provision of the law on births and mortality records. The Cabinet also approved the holding of the 16th session of the Arab Centre for Studies on Arid Land in Qatar in April.

## Exploration agreement

Qatar on Saturday signed a 25-year exploration agreement with the US company Amoco, formerly Standard Oil in Indiana. The production-sharing agreement covers most areas of the peninsula, except Dokhan onshore field in the west and an area in the north-east.

Amoco is to bear all exploration, development and production costs.

### Compulsory insurance for Kuwait traders

Social security insurance for all Kuwaiti businessmen will be made compulsory beginning March this year, an official spokesman said.

Owners of factories, workshops, restaurants, taxis, fishing boats and all categories of traders who practise their trade which needs a licence from the Government will be brought under the scheme, the spokesman for the Public Institution for Social Security said.

Members of the Kuwait Municipal Council, who were not covered earlier will be also brought under the new scheme, the official added.

With the 25th anniversary of the country's Independence, all Kuwaitis in public or private sector service, will be covered by the social insurance scheme, the spokesman added.

The subscribers can select any slab ranging from KD 200, KD 950. Altogether 16 slabs are open. Payments should be affected in instalments from five to 15 per cent of the subscription

Maturity of the scheme is classified into three classes. Any person who attains the age of 60, even if he continues to practise his trade, will be entitled for full benefits. Those who have discontinued practising their business will be eligible for benefits at the age of 55. Both these categories should have covered a subscription period of 20 years.

The third category includes mostly men who attain the age of 65 and here the institution stipulates only 15 years of subscription period.



The Aga Khan Award for Architecture this week announced the Master Jury of the 1986 award at a meeting in Geneva, Switzerland.



The Master Jury of nine members is made up of Mahdi Elmandjara of Morocco, economist and member of the Club of Rome and professor of international affairs at Rabat University, Abdel Wahed el-Wakil of Egypt, noted architect and himself winner of a 1980 award, Hans Hollein of Austria, practising architect, professor at the Academy of Applied Arts and head of the Institute of Design in Vienna, Zahir-ud-Deen Khwaja, of Pakistan, architect and planner formerly director of planning in the Development Authority Islamabad, Ronald Lewcock, Australian architect, Professor of Design in Islamic Cultures at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology also currently technical coordinator of two international campaigns for the conservation of Sana'a in the Yemen Arab Republic and the City of Shibam and Wadi Hadramaut in the People's Democratic Republic of Yemen, Fumihiko Maki, noted Japanese architect in private practice and Professor at the University of Tokyo and Robert Venturi, the influential American theoretician, architect and planner.

The Master Jury convened in Geneva at the end of the end of January to begin the selection process for the 1986 award. It will reconvene in June to discuss the findings of the technical review team and select the prize winners. The Master Jury will apportion the US Dollars 500,000 prize among the winners.

The awards will be presented at a ceremony in Marrakesh in November in the presence of His Majesty King Hassan II and His Highness the Aga Khan, the founder of the award.

The Aga Khan Award for Architecture established in 1976, is the largest architectural award in the world. It seeks to recognise architectural excellence for Islamic cultures. Through the awards themselves and through activities such as seminars and publications, the award programme seeks to identify issues affecting the contemporary built environment of Muslims and highlight possible solutions. A seminar, the tenth in the series, entitled "Architecture Education in the Islamic World", is due to be held in Granada, Spain, from 21st to 25th April.

The Tresham delegation will be in Oman for ten days.



The course was conducted by Pauline Wright and organised by the Health Minstry in association with Omani-American Joint Commission for Technical and Economic Cooperation. It was held at the Institute of Health Sciences in Wattayeh.

## New recruits pass out

## Books of facts and figures available

Members of the public have access to a number of books giving facts and figures covering the development of Oman and other countries.

This follows the transfer of the library of the Development Council's Directorate-General of National Statistics from its old cramped quarters at Muscat to more spacious premises at the Council's new headquarters at Al Khuwair behind the Ministry of National Heritage and Culture.

Visitors can now refer to books on statistics and development during office hours, but will not be allowed to take them from the library.

Librarian Jawad bin Baqer bin Suleiman did say, however, that exceptions to this rule would be made for Government employees.

The council releases statistical information on all aspects of development from time to time and these are given free to those who request them.

There was a big demand for the Socio-Economic Atlas, the first of its type to be published by the Omani Government and which was released last November during the National Day celebrations.

Preparations for the atlas were supervised by Mrs Rajiha bint Abdul Ameer, acting Under-Secretary for Planning and Director-General for National Statistics.

Mr Suleiman said the council's publications were being sent to some 70 organisations abroad, including universities.

He said the library's stock of books would gradually be increased and the mailing list for the council's publications would also be expanded.

## Southern Region campaign

A nine-day campaign is being launched by the Southern Region's Directorate-General of Social Affairs and Labour from 21 February to make people aware of the various programmes initiated by ministries for their benefit.

The campaign will cover all villages and towns of the region's western part. As part of the campaign, lectures symposiums, home visits and video and cinema shows have been organised.

It will enable people to know how and where to avail of facilities offered by the government in different areeas fo development.

### More mosques for Kuwait



## Freya Stark, a remarkable wanderer

Freya Stark has been described as one of the twentieth century's most remarkable women.

She was born in Paris in 1893 and by the time she was five years old, she could speak three languages.

The wandering life of her childhood left her precocious and fairly tough and equipped her for what was to be more than 40 years of travel, exploration and writing.

Freya Stark was fearlesly independent and unconventional. She nearly always

travelled alone without money or support. She was not the first explorer in many of the regions she travelled through, yet people began to regard Freya as something unique. She began developing her own style of observing, more lively and detailed and often very personal, unlike that used among explorers before.

Biographer Caroline Moorhead states: "There was something about her vision of things that singles her out, a certain quality to her observations, so that she appeared to relate landscape, people and their history, and make them all accountable for each other in some way peculiarly her own."

It was not unitl after the war, despite many trips and climbs, that Freya was able to mount her first expedition. In 1931, having spent most of her money on emerald beads, Freya set off from Hamadan, then in Persia, through mountains and villages. She was struck down by malaria in a lonely mountain village and for a week was near death. She was nursed back to health on a diet of egg whites and sour milk. After four weeks of travelling she reached Teheran.

Throughout her life ill-health shadowed every adventure, but her grim determination always pulled her through. She was always conscious of her appearance. When she arrived in Baghdad she was 36, small, somewhat dumpy and determinedly eccentric.

She lamented her appearance but believed clothes could help. Between 1929 and 1934 she earned £272 by writing of which £155 was spent on dress. She would order clothes from Paris and delighted in finery and a love of fabrics and colour.

In 1935 Freya travelled to South Arabia. She paused at Aden but her goal was Shabwa in the Hadhramaut, said to be the centre of the incense trade and Himyarite capital. It was seven days' hard ride without water, never before visited by Europeans.

She set out on a donkey, with compass and camera, accompanied by guides.

She wrote almost daily at times to her mother when alive, and later her husband (a short, unsuccessful marriage at age of 54 to life long friend Stewart Perowne) and friends. Almost 60 years of correspondence was finally to be drawn together as a diary of her adventures over the years and as a basis to many of her books. She once suggested that selection of essays she was working on in 1971 should be called "After Eigty" (like the chocolates). Her life is possibly one of the most fully documented.


During the journey she caught measles and then by the time she reached Shibam, known later as 'skyscaper town of the desert' for its manystoried mud-and-brick houses, she again

## Putting all the sounds on record

Users from other countries will soon be able to gain easy access to a centralised comprehensive data base giving details of all sound recordings commercially available in Britain.

Called the National Discography, it aims to cover all United Kingdom singles, long-playing records, compact discs and music videos, together with imported material.

The information needed for the National Discography will be compiled from a number of sources, including record sleeves and labels, music journals and catalogues produced by the recording companies.

Software will offer rapid access and will enable information such as record companies and labels, catalogue numbers, titles, publishers and key individuals to be tracked down speedily.

The National Discography, launched on 24 January, is a wholly-owned subsiduary of the Mechanical Copyright Production Society, an influential music industry organisation representing the copyright interests of more than 10,000 composers, lyricists and music publishers.

Exchange

It is being funded jointly by the MCPS and the British Library's National Sound Archieve which alreadyo holds Britain's largest collection of sound recordings - more than 500,000 discs and over 35,000 hours on tape.

Acting as a single point of exchange for all information about readings, the discography will help improve the overall efficiency of the music industry.

Record retailers will be able to trace at one source what recordings are available in a whole variety of fields. There will be information on hand to help collect and distribute royalities.

## Device to prevent cot deaths

A device which could prevent cot deaths has just won 20-year-old Michelle Richmond the Mary George Memorial prize awarded annually by Britain's Institution of Electrical and Electronic Incorporated Engineers.

Miss Richmond, a micro-wave technical engineer with Plessey Radar, competed against 51 young women for the award which was instituted to encourage a greater feminine participation in the electrical industry.

The young lady, who last year was named Plessey Radar Technician of the Year, began working on the alarm system after several of her colleages had lost children, all under one year of age, through cot deaths.

The device features a pressure pad in a cover blanket which is placed beneath the sleeping baby. When breathing stops, the alarm is triggered alerting parents that something is wrong.

A spokesman for Plessey said that the alarm could be marketed for around £80. "During the tests we carried out on employees' children, it has worked very satisfactorily and I understand Michelle has been approached by a British concern who are keen to put it on the market."

## Kangaroos spring a surprise

Researchers have found that Australia's kangaroos have such economy of movement that makers of artifical limbs and running shoes could learn something from them.

Scientists at Flinders University, Adelaide, have discovered that each time a kangaroo hops it gets back 90 per cent of the energy it used for that hop for use in the next one.

Dr Russell Baudinette, associate profesor of biological sciences, said a kangaroo merely lengthened its hop when it wanted to cover ground quickly. This lessened the frequency of contact with the ground and therefore the retarding effect of friction.

"We've had correspondence with

makers of running shoes and artifical limbs interested in the structures of a kangaroo's muscles and tendons. They are interested in the possibilities of using materials which will produce something approaching the extraordinary springing capacity of these unique marsupials, "Dr Baudinette said.

## Leprosy - trial for a vaccine

The first African trial of an anti-leprosy vaccine is now getting under way in northern Malawi.

The trial is being carried out by the British Leprosy Relief Association, known as LEPRA, in association with the World Health Organisation (WHO), the Malawi government and the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine.

In the past 20 years, LEPRA has treated more than 45,000 leprosy victims in Malawi with considerable success, but treatment with drugs alone is not enough to secure the eventual eradication of the disease.

Some years ago scientists predicted the day when a one-only injection of a vaccine given to children when they went to school from isolated rural areas would overcome the problem of repetitive drug injections and lead to eventual world eradication.

But the latest hope is that a combination of drug treatment and a vaccination programme, in areas the disease is established, will lead to the end of the scourge that affects as estimated 15 million people throughout the world.

It has proved extremely difficult to develop suitable leprosy vaccines for reasons that include the impossibility of growing the leprosy organism under laboratory conditions. Scientists have now overcome this problem by growing the organism in armadilloes. These have been found to be the only animals in which it will multiply easily. A two-year old ninebanded armadillo is said to be able to produce an estimated 25,000 vaccine doses.

By using this Mycobacterium leprae organism, scientists have been able to produce a vaccine that stimulates the body's natural defence system to combat and protect against the invading disease. Much of the pioneering work on this vaccine was carried out at the UK National Institute for Medical Research in Mill Hill.

#### **Encouraged**

Initial trials with the vaccine are being carried out in Venezuela and producing good results. Indications are that it not only gives protection against leprosy but when used with drugs can combat established leprosy more effectively than drugs alone.

This has encouraged LEPRA and the WHO to go ahead with large-scale vaccine trials in Malawi where some 100,000 people will be vaccinated over the next four years. There are also plans to test the vaccine in India.

Scientists believe that the best area in Africa for the trial is the Karonga district of northern Malawi. This is because use can be made of the large amount of information that has emerged from a LEPRA-funded scientific survey of the population of the area that has been carried out over the past five years to track down what factors are important in the transmission of the disease.

LEPRA said in London last month, that the vaccination programme in Malawi will run concurrently with the second phase of this study. Another vaccine "sweep" will start in the area in 1990 and it is hoped the first indications of the success of the vaccine will be seen by 1994.

The total cost of the first three years of the vaccination programme is estimated at £300,000 a year. This will be met by LEPRA, other members of the International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Association (ILEP) and the WHO.





## CBO circular on bank funds abroad

All licensed banks in the Sultanate have been asked to comply by the end of March with the Central Bank of Oman's resolution on placement of bank funds abroad.

From that date the banks have been granted a two-month grace period to adjust their positions according to the provision of the regulation published in the Official Gazette on January 15.

CBO's president and deputy chairman Dr Abdul Wahab Khayata last week sent a circular to this effect to all licensed banks.

The Board of Governors decided at its meeting in August last year that local branches of foreign banks should be allowed to maintain foreign currency balances up to 100 per cent of their net worth in Oman with their head offices, branches abroad or head office affiliates.

Locally incorporated banks are also allowed to maintain the same amounts of foreign currency balances with non-resident banks that are principal shareholders of the local banks, or affiliates of shareholders or branches of local banks abroad.

The ceiling stipulated refers to the total of all balances booked in the head office, branches, affiliates abroad, and for locally incorporated banks, all principal

### Delegation to visit Djibouti

A four-member delegation from the Oman **Chamber of Commerce and** Industry will leave for Djibouti on February 23 to attend a meeting of the Association of the Arab Chambers of Commerce, Industry and Agriculture.

It gives its members an opportunity to exchange views, represents them to the Government and other bodies and helps them market their wares. It keeps capability registers, a catalogue of what each member-firm can do.

Leading the mission will be Mr. Tony Taylor, who started with Rubbaglas Petroseals 23 years ago, sweeping the factory floor and is now Managing Director. He is a member of the executive committee of the EIC and founded its London and South-East regional

## Positive signs in oil market, says Oteiba

UAE's Minister of Petroleum and Mineral Resources Dr Mana Said al Oteiba on Monday spoke of the "positive signs" in the world oil market, the effects of which, he said, would be felt very shortly.

'There are positive signs which will be felt very shortly, especially after the OPEC Oil Ministers' emergency meeting in Geneva on March 16" Dr Oteiba said in Salalah.

He arrived in Oman on Monday morning to convey a verbal message to His Majesty Sultan Qaboos from Sheikh Zayed bin Sultan al Nahyan, the President of the UAE.

Dr. Oteiba said the oil industry was currently passing through a crisis, but added that the petroleum producing countries were taking the necessary steps to minimise the hardships.

The Gulf countries, he said, had been negatively affected because they depended on oil revenues for their development and social pro-

"We hope the crisis will not last long," he added.

Dr Oteiba said his visit to Oman came as part of OPEC's efforts to keep in touch with non-OPEC oil

producing countries on the world oil situation.

He said the UAE and the other AGCC countries gave top importance to cooperation and coordination with Oman in these difficult circumstances.

Ties between his country and the Sultanate in the sphere of petroleum, he said, were continuous, historical and everlasting.

### **UK** mission sees good prospects

A group of British businessmen now on their last leg of a tour of the Gulf states, have found conditions to be much better than they expected following the crash in oil prices recently.

The 18 members of the trade mission from the Manchester Chamber of Commerce and Industry found traders in Kuwait, Bahrain, Qatar, the UAE and now Oman reacting positively to the variety of goods and services they displayed. But the emphasis was on different products in each state. In Oman the emphasis is on joint ventures.

"The mission is delighted with the response and we are very optimistic for the future despite falling oil prices," said mission leader Alfred Taylor.

He said they were glad to be in the region when changes were taking place because by coming here they could see for themselves the changing requirements.

Exports to the Gulf area states was actually increasing, he said, due mainly to aggressive promotion. Oman is the fourth largest export market for Britain in the region, he said.

The group began their tour on January 31 and arrived in Oman on Monday for a four-day visit.

## Gulf will continue to offer opportunities

The seven Gulf states - Oman, Bahrain, Iraq, Kuwait, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the UAE remain the single largest concentration of commercial opportunities in the developing world, according to "Gulf Economic and Financial Report", a monthly publication of the Gulf International Bank, the first issue of which has just been released.

The bank, which is owned by the seven Gulf states, said the Gulf states have been a consistently stable region and, coupled with their, sizeable oil reserves and ambitious development plans, they will continue to offer opportunities for foreign business throughout the 1980s and beyond.

The states are at different stages of development, but in general their future plans concentrate on diversifying their industrial base and providing essential services for their people, all of which would require advanced technology, expertise and equipment.

Development of infrastructure has levelled off, while capital internsive products, high technology items, maintence and various services, especially health, human resources development and communications, are expected to continue to do well in the future, the General Manager of Gulf International Bank, Ghazi Abdul Jawad, said in the report.

Gulf markets are in a way unique. While the institutions and the nomenclature are the same as in the developed countires, they function somewhat differently and must be interprested with skill. Those foreign enterprises which

are able to understand the region and position themselves for a long-term commitment in this part of the world would find the Gulf countries to be quite rewarding, the report said.

The report added that the double digit growth rates witnessed in the Gulf region in the 1970s were not normal and could not, therefore, have been sustained for a much longer period of time. The normalisation process of the Gulf economies that began three years ago is expected to prevail in the coming few years.

### Emirates Data Network

Etisalat's 'Emirates Data Network' has become operational and also international by linked and is expected to provide the most advanced technique for data communication.

The network services will officially become available to the public by the end of March and subscription from potential customers will be accepted from mid-February. UAE subscribers would be provided with interemirate traffic free of charge for the first six months, Mr. K.P. Steinruck, project consultant, said.

The technique will provide connections between subscribers within the emirates and subscribers abroad, connected by similar data networks. These networks are primarily located in the UK, the US, Canada, Western Europe and the Far East. At present, the conncetion with West Germany has become operational.

## Report on education, training services

The Arab-British Chamber of Commerce has published in its Economic Report series the papers presented at the seminar on "Education and Training: Equipment and Services", which the Chamber organised last year.

The first paper delivered by Mr Dominic Savage, Director of the British Educational Equipment Association of London, was about the export opportunities in Arab school markets, particularly in the Gulf. He gave specific examples - the main one being the Bahrain-based Gulf University, whose first phase (apart from the Medical Faculty) is scheduled to be ready by September 1986.

He also pointed out that various Arab markets place education very high on their expenditure lists. He put Kuwait first, as the country not only enjoying the world's biggest per capita income, but also the Arab countries' highest per capita spender on education. In Saudi Arabia education spending is only second to that on defence.

He advised more participation in exhibitions, which he thinks are a good way of obtaining first-hand experience of the market as well as developing and creating contacts.

Mr Richard Ware, publishing manager of the Arab World Division of the Longman Group, talked of fitting English language textbooks to Arab needs. He advocated customising teaching materials for an individual ministry as much as possible. He detailed the process of working out the best text books as a joint project between the author, the ministry, teachers and the local experts.

Mr Ware has worked on text book schemes in Oman, Sudan, Egypt and Bahrain. Longman text books had for long been used in these and other Arab countries.

The work of the British Council in Arab States was explained by Edmund Marsden, director of Educational Contracts Department of the Council. Mr Marsden has visited many Arab countries and was the Council's representative in Algeria and Syria.

The last paper was by Mr David Booth, Educational Technologist from the Sussex Overseas Services in Brighton and Vice-Chairman, Marketing Committee Industrial Council for Educational and Training Technology, of London. From 1976 to 1979 Mr Booth worked at the English Language Centre, King Abdulaziz University in Jedda. He advocated package deals. "This requires close cooperation between consultants, project contractors, manufacturers and suppliers." The ICETT is the only British trade association which has a contracting department. It was through this organisation that with the help of the British Overseas Trade Board, a consortium of UK firms was formed to supply equipment to the new Sultan Qaboos University in Oman. "The university was entirely designed and built by British firms and much of its equipment is supplied by UK companies.

The report ends with a profile of the British Council in Arab States and a number of appendices, such as the number of teachers and students at British Council English - language teaching centres in Arab countries; Overseas Development Administration aid to Arab countries for technical coopration; and Arab students in UK universities, polytechnics and other further education

establishments.

## Demand for OPEC oil to rise

Demand for Opec oil will be around 179 million bpd in the first quarter of 1986, according to Interfinance, a Paris based firm of oil analysis.

However, it predicts the demand will decline by two million barrels in the second quarter, partly as a result of the recovery of exports of the centrally planned economies combined with higher non-Opec output.

The analysts say Opec oil demand jumped from less than 16 million bpd in the third quarter of 1985 to 18.3 million bpd in the final quarter because of abnormally cold weather and a stock build-up in OECD countries.

World consumption in the first quarter of the current year is projected at 47.3 million bpd, some 600,000 bpd higher than in the last quarter of 1985, but 200,000 bpd below the first quarter of 1984.

Stock drawdowns are estimated at one million bpd during the first quarter, which would reduce actual demand to 46.3 million bpd.

World demand in the second quarter is forecast at 45 million bpd.

Indian exports to Oman last year were valued at around RO 30 million - mostly food and light manufactures. The corresponding figures for the preceding two years were RO 21.5 million and RO 20 million, respectively.

India's imports from the Sultanate rose to RO 7.2 million in 1984 from RO 700,000 the preceding year.

Oman began exporting oil to India for the first time in 1984 following an agreement between the two Governments. India imported 4.6 million barrels of oil that year. During the first three quarters of 1985, for which figures are available, imports were about 2.6 million barrels.

India, however, remains an important market for Oman's dates - accounting for nearly 60 per cent of all date exports. In 1984, dried dates exported to India were worth RO 340,808.

Mr. Rajan felt there was great scope in Oman for Indian industrial vehicles, machine tools, light engineering goods and consumer durables like sewing machines and ceiling fans, agricultural machinery, telecommunication equipment and sports goods.

The exhibition, he said, would provide an opportunity for Indian businessmen to get a feel of the Omani market and to explore possibilities for setting up joint ventures.

## AGCC crude oil reserves

Crude oil reserves in the six member-states of the Arab Gulf Cooperation Council were reported as standing for 42.7 per cent of the world reserves for 1884.

According to the Economic Bulletin of the AGCC General Secretariat, the Gulf crude reserves in 1984 stood for 298.6 billion barrels, or 24.3 billion barrels more than the confirmed reserves for 1983.

Saudi Arabia occupied the first place in the world oil reserves confirmed by the end of 1984 as totalling 169 billion barrels, according to the bulletin.

Saudi reserves formed 42.2 per cent of the world reserves and 56.6 of the AGCC's, it said.

Kuwait came in the second place with a 90 billion barrels reserves, or 12.9 per cent of the world reserves and 30.1 per cent of the AGCC's. The UAE held 11 per cent of AGCC reserves, it said.

## Metering equipment

A rush contract was completed in just 48 hours for the Qatar Electricity Authority.

Watson Norie and Tegrel Engineering, both of Tyneside, north east England, supplied a prototype service cabinet for metering equipment - and were awarded an initial contract for 100 units.

Mr John Bremner, Watson Norie's managing director, said: "The Electricity Authority had decided that every customer needing electricity supplies into their premises would require a special design of service cabinet.

"A draft design was provided to us with a request to speedily submit proposals for the final design and for the manufacture and supply of the cabinet boxes."

The prototype, measuring 914 mm by 508 mm by 304 mm, was made by Tegrel and air-freighted to Watson Norie representatives in Qatar.

The company is hoping that further orders will follow.

The AGCC Secretariat reported a drop in AGCC oil revenues of 27.1 per cent in 1983 as compared with 1981, and 63 per cent between the years 1981 and 1985

AGCC oil revenues in 1983 were \$82.74 billion as compared with \$155.8 billion in 1981, it said. A retreat to \$57 billion was reported in 1985.

Bahrain reported the highest drop in oil revenues in 1983, reaching 46.2 per cent of its oil revenues in 1981. Saudi Arabia faced a 31.9 drop from \$11 billion in 1981 to \$51.5 billion in 1983.

Kuwait was the least affected among the six AGCC states with an 8.5 per cent drop in the same period, according to the bulletin.

The recession, the bulletin reported, also affected the natural gas production in the AGCC member states.

A drop of 25.1 of the AGCC gas production in 1982 was mentioned in the bulletin, as compared to the previous year, from 83.6 to 62.6 billion cubic feet.

The natural gas reserves in the AGCC member states in 1983 also reported an increase of 1.6 per cent as compared to 1981, from 7,003 billion cubic metres in 1981 to 7,235 billion cubic metres in 1983.

Saudi Arabia has the largest natural gas reserves among the AGCC member states with 3,446 billion cubic metres or 47.4 per cent.

### Dubai sports clubs' order

The Dubai Trading Company has awarded a spectator seating contract worth £750,000 to supply for 10,000 people at four sports clubs being built in Dubai

Last week's meeting was attended by the Director-General of Labour, Ahmed bin Ali Rajab, and the Director-General of Vocational Training, Ali bin Hassan bin Ali.

## Australian firms are doing good business in Gulf

Australian companies have been doing good business in the Gulf states and exports have been rising in all countries — with the possible exception of Kuwait.

The higest importer of Australian products last year was Saudi Arabia which bought about A\$ 700 million worth of goods. The next biggest buyer last year was the UAE which imported A\$200 million worth.

For the ten months up to October last year, Oman imported A\$40,629,000 worth of items and Australia's Abu Dhabi based senior trade commissioner John Butler estimated it would go up to A\$50 million for the whole year.

He said the value of exports to Bahrain was A\$ 130 million, Kuwait was A\$ 140 million and Qatar about A\$ 30 million.

However, Australia's imports from Oman have been dropping mainly because Australia has been buying less Omani crude and refined petroleum for the last three years.

From a high of A\$ 63 million worth of crude oil in 1982, imports dropped to A\$ 29 million next year. The graph continued to dip over the next year with crude imports falling to A\$ 17 million in 1984. But imports picked up last year with imports of crude rising to A\$ 21 million up to October.

Australia also imported over A\$ 10 million worth of refined petroleum products last year, almost doubled the amount it last bought in 1983.

Mr Butler said the value of oil imports had falled partly because the cost of oil had gone down in recent years, but also because Australia began producing more oil while implementing energy saving plans.

Australia, he said, currently produces about the same amount of oil as Oman while it has developed advanced techniques to harness energy from the wind and the sun, both in plentiful supply Down Under.

The country, one of the world's largest food exporters, has been supplying the Sultanate with most of its basic food requirements, especially flour and meat.

Wheat is still the largest exported item to Oman as it has been for the last few years. Up to October, over A\$12 million worth had been sold to Oman last year. The figures for the previous two years were over A\$ 14 million.

Next highest has been meat and live animals for food. Live Australian sheep are imported in large numbers every year as well as mutton, beef and veal. In 1985, over A\$ 2 million worth of live animals were exported, up from A\$ 80,000 in 1982

Now Australia is planning to boost its substantial non-food products in a region where it has traditionally been known as a food exporter.

The signs are there that it can be a seri-

## Northern UAE power output

Power stations in the northern emirates generated 1,605,000,000 Kw of electricity per hour last year as against 1,267,000,000 Kw per hour in the preceding year, according to figures released by the Ministry of Electricity and Water in Dubai.

The energy consumed stood at 1,155,000,000 Kw per hour as against 1,219,000 Kw per hour in 1984. Diesel used by the power stations totalled 16.7 million gallons, along with 559.6 million cubic metres of gas.



## Abdulla looks forward to the challenge

PDO has a new petroleum engineering manager. Abdulla Lamki, the fourth Omani member of the management team, is setting in and looking forward to what he describes as "a new challenge; a much bigger job."

Abdulla returns to the company fresh from a two-year spell in the chilly climes of Norway, where he was chief petroleum engineer for Norske Shell.

"Of course it was very different from Oman," he commented. "In fact, in many respects, almost as different as you could get.

"Nevertheless, it was useful experience and on enjoyable two years."

Most petroleum engineers enter the oil business straight from university, often after taking a higher degree. Abdulla, however, joined Shell only in 1973 after some years in the world of academe.

Having graduated as a Bachelor of Science at Trinity College, Dublin, in physics, he went on to take his PhD and to become a lecturer at the university.

Staying in academic life, he moved after a while to the Regional Technical Institute just outside Dublin where he was responsible for setting up the Physics Department.

An appointment at the University of Baghdad followed where he lectured in electron physics for two years. "Then," said Abdulla self deprecatingly, "I saw the lighter and went into the oil industry."

Joining Shell in 1973, he spent several months in The Hague on various courses before returning to Oman in early 1974. During the following 12-month stint as a well site petroleum engineer, he became familiar with Interior locations — Natih,

Fahud, Saih Nihayda, Saih Rawl and Amal among others.

A three-year spell in production technology followed. In 1978, Abdulla was posted to Nigeria, initially to petroleum operations engineering. By the end of 1979, he had become head of department and another move was in the wind.

The importance of language as an everyday tool of communication cannot be over-stated and, although English is the lingua franca of the oil industry, Arabic is assuming greater and greater importance within technology in the Arabian peninsular, particularly in terms of communication with Government. Reaching back to his academic roots and, at the same time, forward to his current position, Abdulla went to Cairo to study Arabic.

Having completed his course, he came back to PDO as head of Production Technology at the end of 1980. In 1983, he was transferred to Norway.

His spare time is much taken up with his family, although he enjoys swimming for exercise. Married with three sons aged 12, 10 and 4 years, his wife is expecting a fourth addition to the family very soon. "It would be nice to have a daughter," he said. "But only time will

The Committee for Middle East Trade is one of BOTB's 16 area advisory groups. It was established to help increase British exports to the Middle East. COMET maintains a continuous review of economic and commercial opportunities in the region and runs a programme of seminars and conferences to promote interest in the area. Members of COMET are drawn from companies which trade regularly with the Middle East, banks and other organisations.


The British Overseas Trade Board guides and directs the export promotion services of the Department of Trade and Industry.

### Gas pipeline

The Arab Gulf-Cooperation Council's Secretariat is actively studying a proposal to instal a pipeline at the regional level to feed gas from the source to consumers

Preliminary studies have revealed that it would be feasible to supply unaccompanied dry gas to consumers from various gas fields in Saudi Arabia.

Studies are also being undertaken with respect to gas supplies from Qatar, whose reserves are considered as one of the largest in the world. Also experts are considering the possible supplies of ethylene from Kuwait and Bahrain to industries in the AGCC countries. It is expected that the gas from Kuwait and Bahrain could be utilised as feedstock for power plants in the area.





Bahrain's Minister for Development and Industry have advised the Gulf states that the only chance for survival of their nascent petrochemical industries was to turn to manufacture of advanced byproducts like ammonia, urea and chemical fertilisers.

Yousef al Shirawi told the weekly newspaper 'Al Adwaa' that even if EEC settled a controversy with the Gulf by waiving all tariffs on petro-chemicals from the region, the Gulf countries could not expect the EEC to develop into a good market.

"We face competition and restric-

tions", he said. He advocated the spread of industries so that the region would not continue to depend on oil as its sole source of revenue.

He referred to Bahrain's efforts to develop energy-intensive industries as aluminium, capitalising on the oil wealth of the Gulf region.

The Minister expected oil prices on the world market to take an upward slide over the coming 10 years because demand was expected to rise.

He said the current downslide was 'nothing more than psychological warfare'.





Additionally, further downstream development is planned with the building of an aluminium foil mill project which will be built as an expansion to the rolling mill. The foil plant, which will be located adjacent to the rolling mill will use rolled aluminium as raw material and will have a capacity of 6,000 tonnes per year.

The major products of the new plant will be: aluminium foil (plain and converted), aluminium finstock and semi rigid containers.

The foil mill is scheduled for completion in 1988 and will become an integral part of the GARMCO rolling mill operation.

Work commenced on the GARMCO plant in 1983, whereby a turnkey contract was awarded to Kobe Steel of Japan with a completion date set for the latter part of 1985.

Kobe steel has also been responsible for the training of personnel, and the supply of the necessary process and product technology.

U.S. company, Raymond Kaiser Engineers and Constructors Inc., were retained to provide project management and consultancy services.

## Expansion plans on anvil

During the first two years of its operation, GARMCO expects to meet the extensive requirements of the Gulf market for flat rolled aluminium products.

The company's commitment — and that of the owning states —is further evidenced by the recent decision to proceed with further expansion. This entails another downstream development — the building of an aluminium foil mill adjacent to the rolling mill which will use GARMCO's rolled aluminium as raw material.

The foil mill is scheduled for completion in 1988 and will become an integral part of the GARMCO operation.

Furthermore, additional private downstream industrial activities are likely to be spawned and encouraged by GARMCO's arrival in the region.

While AGCC member-state Governments will actually advise and foster such downstream private enterprise, GARMCO will itself assist wherever it can.

"For example," they point out, "there is no major bus building industry in this region at present. Now, with local capabilities for supplying aluminium sheet and extrusion product, this and other fabrication activities for products currently being imported into the region offer distinct opportunities.

The Minister of Commerce and Industry, Col. Salem bin abdullah al Ghazali, was attending the official opening of the mill.

Another area in which GARMCO intends to place great importance is training, according to the firm's management. Because of the existing pool of trained labour in Bahrain they have started operations with a substantial percentage of Bahrainis on their work force.

But training will be a continuous process — both for operations and maintenance functions. A substantial number of our staff have had on-the-job courses with Kobe Steel in Japan, and, of course, all our key operators have years of experience. But our medium-term goal is to train Bahrainis to do every job in the organisation.

"That, combined with our state-ofthe-art plant and technology, low cost energy and other resource facilities, will provide us with a competitive advantage."

The industrial process of rolling is unlikely to change but the company is determined that it will stay abreast of any new developments or innovations that do occur.

"With a 25-30 year working life for a facility such as ours with appropriate periodic reviews, we look forward to being a competitive force in our industry worldwide for many years. Indeed, in this regard our situation is probably unique, in that we are operating a brand new, "green field" site," the management says.

As far as the overall situation of the aluminium industry worldwide is concerned, GARMCO believes that overcapacity problems exist mainly on the primary side — that is in the smelting and production of aluminium.

"As far as the rolling business is concerned there is not a great deal of overcapacity," they point out. "Indeed, in some areas there is a shortage of capacity."

But depressed prices of primary metal have a knock-on effect which will likely result in significant structural changes in the primary business with high cost smelters being closed.



moved once every 30 hours in the Petroleum Development Oman concession area. Last year, this complex operation was carried out about 280 times, requiring close cooperation between Drilling and Supply, the two departments mainly invloved, and, where new wells are concerned, Construction - who build the drilling cellars.

For a newcomer to rig camp on the move, the scene is one of noisy confusion. Shouted orders, the growl of heavy truck engines, the whine of winches and the clank of metal on metal characterise the operation.

Almost imperceptibly, the rig mast starts to telescope inside itself and then tilts to one side until it is lying horizontal and ready to

> The rig, in fact, travels in two parts, the mast unit and the draw works.


> But, in addition, there are the other parts such as water tanks, pumps, tanks generators — each massive on their own which are essential parts of the working whole. Giant oil field trucks lumber into position to winch these skid-mounted units onto their backs for the journey to the next site.


> Once they are on the road, headed by a transport supervisor from one of the Interior bases and by a police vehicle if they are to travel on the main road, it is time to move the camp.


The sheer size of a drilling rig is hard to grasp unless you have seen it. But the police escort is needed for blacktop travel simply because a rig takes up the whole width of the main Muscat to Thumrait highway.

And though the rig works on the move are impressive, the mobile camps of the two PDO Rig, 5 and 11, are nothing less than huge. Prefabricated in four units each in three decks, the new camps make moving day much simpler than the previous process of moving the portacabins which are the more familiar style of accommodation of these hightech nomads.


And in an hour, its all The rig has over. already arrived another site and is getting ready to drill again.








At its full working height the drilling mast towers over the surrounding landscape, apparently immovable. Then slowly, almost casually, the mast starts to shorten, telescoping inside itself until it is half its working height. Using its own winches and motors, the rig section now performs an even more remarkable feat, lowering itself onto its side ready for the huge truck which will take it to its next location to be hooked up. The Junkers Ju 52 To mark 60 years in the air the Ger-

man national airline Lufthansa has restored a pre-war Junkers Ju 52, showing how keen the airline is on tradition. The oldtimer painstakingly restored at Lufthansa's Hamburg workshops, a pioneer of international civil aviation, is an original and image-boosting present Lufthansa has made itself to mark the anniver-

The Junkers will be flying again this year, but only at special, promotional events and not on regular services. Few aircraft could be better suited for keeping up traditions. The Ju 52 played a leading role in the history of German civil aviation and came to symbolise the quality of Germanmade planes. Its reputation for reliability was second to none.

The 50-year-old veteran was bought in America, where it took passengers on joyrides in Florida and was known as Iron Annie. It arrived at Hamburg airport after an adventurous flight across the North Atlantic in December 1984. After restoration the plane now looks as thoug it had just taxied out of the Junkers works hangar in Dessau.

Once the Federal Aviation Office in Brunswick has licensed the plane and jet pilots have been taught how to handle it, Lufthansa's oldest and newest aircraft can look forward to logging a new lease of life. European airports where it will be seen alongside modern jet airliners such as the Airbus and the Jumbo, the Ju 52 will remind plane-spotters and others of Lufthansa' contribution toward the development of international civil aviation in the 1920s and

## Did you know?

David Meinheir of Finland (1714-1749) was reported to be 2.83 metres tall, according to measurements taken by Paul Topinar, a French specialist. However, German professor Karl Linger re-measured the skeleton in a museum in The Netherlands - and it measured only 2.22 metres.

The Russian giant Lochkin was reported to have measured 2.53 metres, but his skeleton in the Leningrad Scientific Academy measured only 2.39 metres.

Iranian Siah Khan bin Kashmir Khan (born 1913), stood 2.70 metres tall. Robert Waldo, born in 1918 in the United States, is regarded to have been the tallest man in the human history. When born, he weighed four kg, but then began to grow abnormally until at the age of five he weighed 48kg and stood 1.63 metres tall. Eighteen days before he died in 1940, a Dr. Charles of Washington University measured his height at

2.72 metres. Other giants recorded have been John Carol - 2.63 cm, John Rogan - 2.49 metres - all Americans.

Among women the tallest recorded have been Jane Binford, born in 1895. She measured 1.98 metres when she was 11 years old and she reached a height of 2.41 cms before she died in 1922. American women Ella Ewing and Delorice Johnson measured 2.49 m. and 2.27 metres, respectively. The tallest living woman today is Tilia from India - at 2.26 metres.

"Hard work is needed if we are going to flourish this year," she said. "But I think the effort is worthwhile".


Any members of the Ras-al-Hamra recreation centre interested in taking part, helping or starting a production of their own were all warmly invited to "have-a-go".

## 'Private Lives' - sparkling and stylish

With the lines coming on like rifle-fire and the cracking fun throughout, Sir Noel Coward's "Private Lives" is a sparkling and tremendously stylish comedy that remains as contemporary as it was when produced some 55 years ago.

It is the hallmark of a classic when a play can be revived at any point of time and still retain the ebullience and charm that the playwright intended when he summed up his environs and times.

At the Jabrin Ball room of the Muscat Inter-Continental Hotel, "Private Lives" has been running to the delighted applause of diners from last Saturday. The play, put on by the British Airways Playhouse is the 19th in the Inter-Con's Dinner Theatre series, produced by Derek Nimmo.

The story line is simple: a romantic hotel balcony on the French Riviera is the setting for the surprise reunion of a divorced couple - Elyot and Amanda - who are horrifed to discover that they are both honeymooning with their new partners Cybil and Victor, in adjacent suites.

It takes little time for both to realise they are still very much in love with each other - warts and all! And the same night, they elope together to Paris with Cybil and Victor in pursuit, the latter "for some reckoning to be done".

The rekindled love affair produces some of the wittiest lines written by Coward and the whole production seethes and bubbles with joy. The play is almost nine-tenths conversation - and flows with such effortless ease that the audience must feel that Coward must have spent days on it polishing and amending! In fact, the entire play was

written in four days flat - while Coward was convalescing in Singapore after a bout with influenza.

Central character Elyot Chase is played by the handsome and debonair Gerald Harper - for whom the role appears to be specially written. Jacqueline Pearce, in the sterling role of Amanda Prynee, is the perfect foil for Elyot as the tempestous and passionate former wife. Both are perfect together neither faltering a moment in the 'word war'.

The pompous Victor Prynee, is played with ease by Geoffrey Davies - especially when he is reluctantly pushed forward to a fight and then backtracks - ably assisted by the beautiful Julie Dawn Cole playing the vapid Sybil Chase.

Jo Kendall as the French maid in Amanda's Paris apartment lends strong support. The sets and costumes are designed by Terry Parsons and the superb lighting effects are by Stan Davies. Direction by Gerald Harper.

"Private Lives" is one of the greatest classic of our times and a great part for Gerald Harper. Coward's lines retain all their barbs, giving an insight into what we call love and the highlight of the play is undoubtedly the excitingly staged fight between the lovers.

"Private Lives" ends tonight at the Inter-Con. Don't miss it, if you can still get tickets.

Alan Falk led the king of spades which declarer won. South tried three rounds of hearts, but the jack did not fall, so he had to try clubs. It is true that declarer would have felt better had she tried clubs first, since spades were 4-3 but her contract was safe with the heart play if the jack fell, no matter how the spades were distributed.

Falk won the third round of clubs ... and Prosnitz had to find a discard. The fact that he did not have a small diamond was a problem, but suddenly he realized that he had a card in his hand that would transmit an urgent message to partner. he discarded the king of diamonds!!

It was clear that declarer had the ace of diamonds, so Falk quickly realized that spades had to be the key suit. He knew Prosnitz had the jack of hearts, so he inferred that Prosnitz' entry was in spades; it had to be ten. So he underled his queen-jack. Sure enough, Prosnitz took the ten of spades, cashed the jack of hearts and returned a spade for Falk to cash two more tricks to set what looked like a cold game.

## A new look for Escort

Mechanical and design improvements to the world's best-selling car, the Ford Escort, have been announced.

The car is to have a new "leanburn" petrol engine, to improve performance and economy and reduce exhaust emission, and it will become the first in its class with anti-lock braking.

Its exterior is to be made smoother, for improved aerodynamics, while changes inside will include a rapid de-ice windscreen and high-security door and steering column locks. Steering, suspension and transmission will also be improved.

The Escort will have a choice of six "lean-burn" engines from 1.1 to 1.6 litres. The 1.4 and 1.6 litre units are Ford's CVH (Compound Value angle Hemispherical chamber) engines, one of the most efficient volume production automotive power plants. Nearly 2.5 million have been made at Ford's factory at Bridgend in Wales.

The new braking system, developed jointly by Ford and the UK company Lucas Girling, is espcially for front-wheel-drive cars. It has been

tested over nearly five million kilometres by Ford engineers and police authorities in Britain and mainland Europe.

Since its introduction in 1980, worldwide production of the hatchback Escort has exceeded four million. The car is made in Britain, West Germany, the United States, South Africa, Spain and Brazil, with designs varying from country to country.

In 1981 the Escort was voted European Car of the Year and it has won ten major national awards. The Escort range begins with the budget-priced Popular and moves upwards in specification through the L, GL and Ghia.

The range has been improved and expanded year by year with the introduction of five-speed manual and three-speed automatic transmissions, an advanced 1.6 litre diesel engine, a five-door estate car, the high-performance, fuel-injected XR3i, a cabriolet (now the best-selling convertible in Europe) and the RS Turbo.

Similar improvements are to be made to the Escort's sister car, the Orion,

## Limousines in a wider range

Britain's largest producer of limousnes has launced its widest product range. Coleman Milne has introduced new versions of its seven-seat Dorcester and Grosvenor limousines and two new versions of its seven-seat Dorchester and Grosvenor limousines and two new versions of its Minister executive car.

The range will include four-and sixdoor models, powered by either a 2.8 litre electronic fuel injection six-cylinder engine in V-formation or a 2.5 litre diesel engine.

Features of the new range will include anti-lock braking; automatic, electronically controlled self-levelling suspension; four-speed automatic transmission; and electronic engine management.

They say the new range has already brought interest from prospective buyers in mainland Europe, the Far East and North America. British prices for the range start at £22,400 for the Minister, £23,900 for the Dorchester and £27,000 for the Grosvenor.

Coleman Milne produces around 500 vehicles annually at factories at Bolton and Halifax in northern England. The Halifax plant was established in the 1820s, making it one of the oldest coachbuilding establishments in Britain.

### Conversions

The company's customers include major corporations, financial institutions, state-owned industries, government departments, municipal authorities, funeral parlours and car hire companies. Members of Britain's Royal family use cars supplied by the firm.

Most Coleman Milne conversions are based on Ford cars, notably the large Scorpio saloon. The firm also converts cars made by Jaguar, Rolls-Royce, Aston Martin, Austin Rover and Mercedes, and the classic London taxi.

It has adapted ambulance and taxi versions of the medium commercial Sherpa and Trafic vehicles, built respectively by the British and French state vehicle companies BL and Renault.

The company also supplies armour protected vehicles for use by diplomats, distinguished visitors to overseas territories, and business.

## Riding the Range with 'king' Rover

The sun was setting slowly across the coastal plain as a small convoy sent dust clouds billowing up into the early evening air.

Most of the drivers and passengers looked weary, and ready for home after an invigorating yet energy-sapping weekend in Oman's great outdoors.

The wadi-bash had been spectacular, but now most were thinking ahead to a hot shower, and getting their feet up.

But inside the roomy 1986 Range Rover Vogue picking its was through the pack myself and two companions were savouring the last couple of hours of a memorable trip.

The graded road south of Quriyat was taking its toll on the rest, as they bounced along into the sunset.

We were the lucky ones. The Ranger Rover had surpassed all expectations, and was now in its element.

### Convinced

Soon the road ahead was clear again, and we were back up to 120 km/h. Braking softly or changing down for each bend I picked my line, felt the vehicle begin to slide, and pulled gently on the wheel to let the power steering straighten us out in an instant.

By now all three of us were convinced - the Range Rover was the king of the four-wheel drives and this was a right royal experience.

Not that I can say much about the diff' lock facility of a vehicle with constant four-wheel drive. I barely needed to call for its help during approximately 300 kilometres of the most testing driving conditions I have encountered.

One little episode sticks in my mind. We were twisting up and around a particularly tricky stretch of graded road near Fins when the vehicle in front staggered to a halt on the incline, began to slip backwards, and the driver had to use all his extra power to reach the top at the second attempt.

I waited for him to make it, pressed my foot on the accelerator, and cruised up in second gear. It wasn't difficult.

In fact it was also so easy that we began feeling sorry for our two

friends behind who were struggling to stay with us and feeling the effects as they were tossed around in the process.


Under the bonnet the Ranger Rover's 3.5 litre fuel injection engine was taking the strain comfortably. Talking of comfort, and the three of us frequently were, it is difficult to imagine a smoother ride over terrain normally so condusive to sore backsides and headaches.

## Ancient wall a big 'find'

The north wall of a hitherto lost Roman basilica, thought to be 1,800 years old, has been found in the City of London, and is arousing world wide interest among archaeologists.

The remains of the basilica - the largest civic building of its day north of Alps and the largest in the Roman Empire - has been described by Brian Hobley, chief urban archaeologist at the Museum of London, as forming "an exceptional site.'

Mr Hobley said: "I've had several enquiries from countries outside Britain,

including France, Canada and the United States.

'At the moment, we have about 60 fully-trained personnel on site, but in the summer, during the university vacations, we accept a flood of students from many countries. "For anyone starting a career in archaeology, it will offer a golden opportunity

The discovery was made when a team from the museum was digging on Leadenhall Court in the City of London - a site being developed by the Legal and General Insurance Company.

#### Unique

Construction has halted so that the rich archaeological details of the complex can be investigated. The museum has until October to complete the work.

The dig is being carried out on a small section of the lost bascilica, which once dominated first century Londinium, on a hill-top site overlooking what is now London Bridge. The building was up to 10 metres high, 160 metres long and 50 metres wide and housed the Curia - the Roman town council - the magistrates' court, the Treasury, shrines and a prion.

It was on the north side of a 3.2 hectare square, the other three sides being lines with shops and offices, linked with colonnaded porticos, which enclosed a huge trading area.

The excavation provides a unique opportunity because over half of the bascilica had been destroyed in Victorian times, and no other part of the area is earmarked for redevelopment in the foreseeable future.

During excavation, a surviving wall from the original Leadenhall, a private residence, was found incorporated inato later building work and is still standing. By 1411, the site was a general market and in 1411, it was conveyed to the City Corporation, and a public market of international standing in the wool trade became a civic building almost as important as the Guildhall.

All the buildings were destroyed in the Great Fire of 1666. In 1881, the great glass and megal Leadenhall was built nearby.

### Appeal

The excavation is also exceptional for other reasons - the freedom with which the archaeologists are allowed to go into what is essentially a commercial site. For the last 10 years, the museum has worked hard to build up the sort of good relationship with developers which is not equalled anywhere else in the world.

Legal and General has allowed one year for excavation, which started last October, for installing men and machines shorting up the excavation and removing soil and for work to be carried out beneath a plastic roof.

The company has also contributed £150,000, with the government-backed English Heritage conservation organisation providing another £150,000. But a further £140,000 is still needed and the museum is launching an appeal.

Explained Mr Hobley, "We realise that developers have an important job. A city with no development is a dead city. Equally, we try to persuade them that out activities are now part of a highly professional operation that is a valid part of the redevelopment process.

We have established a good rapport over the years. In the last 11 years during which we have excavated 150 sites, we have recovered one million objects - and not one has been claimed by the developers.'

The bascilica is expected to produce spectacular relics over the next few months which will eventually be displayed at the Museum of London.

The Hong Kong Tourist Association has produced a new Taxi Communication Card that will make it easy for visitors to communicate with urban taxi drivers.

The card is written in English, Chinese and Japanese and lists names of hotels, hostels, guest houses, places of interest, major buildings and consulates, as well as useful phrases.

A similar type of card, designed to enhance the quality of service offered to visitors to Hong Kong by taxi drivers, was produced in 1983 and was well-received by both visitors and drivers alike.

Fabled Bali lies off the east coast of Java. The island of the God's or so the gentle Balinese believes as they perform, almost daily, religious rituals and exquisitely grateful dances in col-

ourful costumes. Thousands of Hindu temples, rice-terraced hillsides and beautiful coral beaches — paradise for sightseers and beachcombers alike!

The main resort area of Bali consists of two beaches, Kuta and Sanur. Kuta's long beach is a surfer's dream and the casual and friendly village is fun to explore. By contrast, Sanur is more spread out and offers a wider choice of international resort hotels.

Other places in Indonesia worth a visit include, in North Sumatra, famous Lake Topa which surrounds the island of Samosir. Hotel accommodation and watersports facilities are offered in Prapat; a mountain and lake resort on Lake Toba's northern shore.


Adventurers could take a river trip in East Kalimantan to discover remote former headhunting tribes, or visit Komodo Island, famous for its giant 'dragon' lizards. In the southern part of Sulawesi, the orchid-shaped island once known as Celebes, you will find the ancient tribal people of Tana Toraja, dwelling in prow-shaped houses and buying their dead in mountainside 'hanging graves'.



#### Flowers of Saudi Arabia

An "Illustrated Guide the Flowers of Saudi Arabia" is the title of a lavishly produced book published by Scorpion Publishing of Buckhurst Hill, near Lon-

The pictures are beautiful. Except for a few photographs of her own herbarium specimens, all photographs were taken in the field, and all but three by the author herself, Sheila Collenette. The book contains more than 1700 full-colour photographs.

Where the plant has not been in flower, fruity or vegetative branches have been photographed instead as an aid to further indentification and in order to establish the presence of the

species in Saudi Arabia.

The volume includes maps identifying the main collection areas, brief introduction to each family and detailed description of each plant, as well as full index of plants collected, with their authorities and herbarium number.

Miss Collenette has visited Saudi Arabia over a period of 12 years and has collected and photographed more than 1500 species belonging to 115 families. Many of the species are recorded for the first time from the Arabian Peninsula. Each photograph is of a numbered plant subsequently prepared as a herbarium specimen. These have been identified and named and are preserved at the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, with an almost duplicate set at Edinburgh, in Scotland and a further set at the National Herbarium of the Ministry of Agriculture in Riyadh, where the collection is available for study.

Saudi Arabia is a meeting point of three photo-geographical regions - the Mediteranean, the Oriental and the African - and Miss Collenette's collection reflects this variety. Becuase of the support she received from the Directorate of Mineral Resources and contacts established with various geologists and mining companies, Sheila Collenette was able to conduct much of her field work in often remote and largely inaccessible areas.





The sport has a new base at the Oman Sheraton Hotel in Muscat and the prospects for the future seem bright.





On a day or thrills and spills at the Seeb circuit Hayward increased his championship lead - despite losing a wheel in one heat - while Alan Pringle and Johan Kwant, his closest rivals, both ran into trouble.

But there were no problems for Hayden in the OUA-sponsored meeting as he won the first heat to earn pole position on the grid and powered his way to victory in each of the three finals.

Hyden has been held back this season while adapting to a new kart frame, and he said, "It's quite a different piece of equipment.

"It is much more temperamental and you have to be much more precise.

"It looks like we have more or less got it right now, but I wrote off part of the frame in the team race."

Hayward had one moment of drama before going on to finish third on the day, and stretch his lead to 360

"An axle stub snapped off at the base as he was driving along," said ROP club chairman Barry Cheverton. "The front wheel came off and he drove on for above 40 yards before he realised it."

#### **Serious**

The hopes of Pringle and Kwant were dented in a five-kart pile up at the start of the second final.

The shunt left Pringle with no brakes, while the frame of Kwant's kart was twisted, with the seat touching the ground. None was injured in the collision.

Frenchman Rene Legonnet had another good day, taking second

place overall and is now a serious championship contender in fourth spot.

For the second time in succession Hayward and his Zubair partner Neil Wragg won the team race, with Wragg leading from start to finish, while the new ROP pairing of Nigel Heath and Keith Weetch were runners-up.

### MATCH POINTS

All shots in tennis, no matter how much you practice them, some times fall apart. What can you do when this happens?

If you are not actively competing when a breakdown occurs the solutions are not too difficult.

First you can gain help from a professional or knowledgeable player. This is a good solution when you cannot figure out what you are doing wrong.

If your are already an experienced lesson-taker experimentation is the key.

The cricitcal concept is one of adjustment. Try not to continue making the same error repetitively. For example if hitting a forehand into the net, it's better to lob than simply trying to hit several feet higher.

#### Serious

Confidence can instantly return just by hitting a few balls in the court, even if your opponent returns them.

But you may find a stroke failing when you are in the middle of a serious match. It is especially disconcerting if the shot is normally sound or even a real strength. Again, be willing to change. If you normally hit powerful deep volleys but they all seem to be flying long, try aiming at the service line.

Although you may hit few a short volleys at least your opponent will have to make passing shots rather than happily watch your ball sail out.

You may experience a real nightmare when an entire area of play distintegrates. Don't panic. Your opponent must have weaknesses and you may successfully change gear and exploit them. For example you have planned to hit top spin but suddenly all you can do is chip the ball.

Well, try chipping the ball you may find it works too. Remember, adjustment determines both strokes and strategy.

The conference on standardisation of housing in Arab states has urged all member states to make optimum use of local building material and give special consideration to the element of conservation of energy in future buildings through heat insulation.on.

The meeting organised by the Department of Housing of the Arab League was attended by engineers and town planners from Oman, the UAE, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, Jordan, Sudan, Mauritania, Morocco and Iraq.

The Omani delegation at the conference, held in Bagh-dad from 10 to 12 February, consisted of Ali Mohammad al Mahfouqi, Chief of Technical Units at the Directorate General of Public Works; Ali Masood al Falahi, Town Planner and an engineer from the Ministry of Housing.

Ali Mohammad al Mahrouqi said the conference agreed that the future houses in Arab countries should be provided with at least water and electricity and a proper sewerage system.

The conference stressed the need to use architectural techniques to keep houses cool without restorting to the use of electrical appliances.

The future buildings must also be architecturally capable of absorbing much sunlight during

Ali Mohammad al Mahrouqi disclosed that Oman has already started to implement the element of heat insulation in all Government buildings while there is a plan to extend the feature to all commercial buildings in future.

The conference heard several papers on Arab housing delivered by experts from Baghdad Univer-

In reply to a question he said since Oman started construction late its buildings are free from many architectural defects in buildings in other Arab countries.


He said there is no plan to change the traditional pattern of Omani houses but efforts are continuing to improve the design of these houses.
