I have been asked to write a few words to mark the birth of the "Times of Oman", the first newspaper in English to appear in our country.

Not being a journalist by profession I feel rather inadequate to dole out advise to people who I have reasons to believe know their ropes very well, but even a layman knows how powerful the press can be, and that it can be used either to hasten the pace of the wheel of progress of the country and its people or to sow the poisonous seeds of discontent and disruption among the population. It is a tool, like many other tools, which can be put to use for noble or ignoble purposes.

Oman is in the process of rapid development and consequently undergoing rapid changes, not only physical but also social and economic. In order that these changes should be for the good of our society it is imperative that the Omani himself should appraise them and participate intelligently in them. To do this he needs the guidance of others who have had the benefit of a good education and experience in the affairs of life. This is particularly important because the ordinary Omani was denied contact in the past with what can be considered as essential elements of world civilisation whose norms have become standard in our modern world.

Changes in our environment require changes in ourselves as well. By this it is not intended that we should lose our identity. While we retain our culture we should raise the standard of our living and build our society on the basis of our heritage so that we become a sovereign and respected nation with an unquestionable integrity.

The changes, therefore, should not be in our being but in our modes of approach, our attitudes and our methods. We have to develop in us certain qualities which are demanded by life in our new challenging circumstances if we are to develop as a self-respecting and a respected nation. We should inculcate in ourselves the habits of hard work and perseverence, honesty, a sense of responsibility, and of looking at things objectively rather than emotionally. Above all, I feel strongly that loyalty to H. M. The Sultan and faith in his Government together with a sincerity of purpose and fairness in our dealings with our people are, needless to say, of paramount important.

This paper will be read mainly by English speaking people inside and outside Oman, the majority of whom will probably be non-Omanis. While I do not feel that the paper is expected to sing in praise of our country, I would certainly hope that it will adopt an attitude of objectivity and that it will try to portray Oman in its true perspective bearing in mind the irrefutable fact that the rapid expansion and development now taking place in this country cannot but be coupled with problems and shortcomings. It is up to you, Mr. Chief Editor, either to seek and strike at the Archeles heel of our institutions or to join the band-wagon of selfless and dedicated constructive workers of our nation under the wise and benevolent guidance of our beloved ruler, Sultan Qaboos bin Said. I sincerely hope you will choose the latter.



I should like to congratulate the owners of this newspaper on their success in bringing it into being.





FOCUS ON OMAN

Terrorists Continously Harassed By Sultan's Armed Forces

More & More Come Forward To Declare Loyalty To H. M. Sultan Qaboos

During the last few days jet aeroplanes of the Sultan of Oman's Air Force have ranged far and wide in search of the terrorists. 19 operational attacks have been made against the communists in the last three days alone, mainly in the western area. Our pilots continually harass the guerillas, making the movement of supplies particularly difficult and reminding them of the Government's overwhelming influence.

Our ground troops have twice taken action against small isolated bodies of terrorists in the last three days. At Sarfait our artillery, assisted by jet aeroplanes of the Sultan of Oman's Air Force opened fire on a small party who fired unsuccessfully on our position. Another small party was sighted by men of the Loyal Firqat Khalid Bin Waleed north and south in the Wadi Ethom south of Medinat al-Haq. Our men opened fire but firm results of the fire are not known.

Men continue to come forward from the so-called communist front to declare their loyalty to the Government. Among recent arrivals in Salalah are Salim Abid Musallim Bait Amreet, Ali Ahmad Salim Bait Said, Said Ahmad Juma Bait Dishayl al-Kathiri and Said Muallim Ali Bait Maashani. Salim Musalim Jumaan Bait Faadhil and Bakhait Masud Hamimat Bait Shidur arrived recently at Jebel Qaftawt.

Broadcasting Contract in Oman

Pye Tvt Ltd., of Cambridge, eastern England have announced a further broadcasting contract worth £2m with the Sultanate of Oman bringing the company's export total to the territory to over £10m in only nine months.

Under the latest contract Pye will supply radio studio equipment and the services for technical operation and maintenance staffing of the television centre currently under construction in Salalah.

The new equipment is for a new radio complex to replace a temporary station and to link it to a recently installed transmitting station.

The new radio centre will provide greatly enlarged programming facilities, and it comprises a fully equipped main music/drama studio with space for audience participation. A discussion studio, an announcer operated disc jockey type studio, two continuity suites, a dubbing suite, and a master control room are also included.

Italian President to Visit Oman

The Italian President, Giovanni Leone, is expected to pay a one day visit to the Sultanate on 5 March, accompanied by the Italian Foreign Minister, it was officially announced.

Wali of Al Masna'ah

Sheikh Salem Bin Seif al-Aghbari has been transferred from Ibri to become Wali of Al Masna'ah.

H. M. Sultan Qaboos Visits Dhofar Jebel

H. M. the Sultan of Oman visited the central area of the Dhofar Jebel to visit the men of his armed forces and see for himself the civil development that is being carried out for the good of the people in the area.

His Majesty left Salalah driving his own Range Rover and headed up the Salalah to Thamarit road. This road traverses the east to west mountain range known as the Dhofar Jebel and is a vital link between Dhofar province and the interior road route to Muscat. Major improvements are being made to the road and His Majesty drove out of Salalah along the re-aligned route. The whole road is being re-aligned in detail, re-graded, widened and tarmacademed.

The security of the vital highway is achieved by the presence of troops of the Sultan's Armed Forces who man a number of defence positions near the road. On the way up the highway H. M. the Sultan stopped to speak to men of the Royal Guard Regiment

and the Oman Gendarmerie who carry out these important duties. At Aqabat Jasmin he toured two of their positions to inspect the defence layout in detail.

At midday His Majesty arrived at Qairoon Hayrita where he received a tremendous welcome from the inhabitants. Since Government secutity returned to this part of the Dhofar Jebel deep wells have been dug to supply water and a large scale Government centre is being built. His Majesty inspected the plans of the new Government Centre and viewed the first foundations of the

buildings. H. M. the Sultan then moved on to join the men of the Loyal Firqat Al Mustagala west for a meal. Only 24 hours before these men had taken part in an operation with the Loyal Firqat Al Mustagala east, the Loyal Firqat Qaboos and the Southern Regiment to the east of Qairoon Hayrita, designed to track down the few remaining communist terrorists in the locality.

His Majesty left Qairoon Hayrita and drove on towards Thamarit. On his way he passed the new well at Al Hatab and the northern section of the road which is virtually completed. His Majesty inspected the fine new runway at Thamarit airport before returning to Salalah in a Defender aircraft of the Sultan of Oman's Air Force after a very exacting but valuable visit.

Omani Forces Recover Soviet Weapons

Men from the Loyal Firqat Al-Aruba, the Loyal Firqat Salah al-Din, the desert regiment, and the Jebel regiment returned to their bases after a successful operation in the area of the Wadi Mahiz. Later, they moved forward from our bases at Adami and Hattal to surround the Wadi Ghevial.

At dawn our men went down into the Wadi to seek out the terrorists and their supplies. A cache of 2300 rounds of small arms ammunition, some heavy machinegun ammunition, 5 mortar bombs and some explosives were found hidden in the caves and rocks.

A small party of terrorists was sent at a distance and was promptly engaged by our artillery and mortars. The results of our fire are not yet known. Our men searched the south of the Wadi Nahiz before returning to their bases. As they did so they were warmly greeted by the numerous civilians of the area.

Further to the west, in the Jebel Khaftaut area, men of the Loyal Firqat Abu Bakr al-Sadeeq have made another exciting arms find. They successfully located a cache of communist weapons and recovered 2 Russian light machine guns, 2 SKS rifles, a Chinese pistol, nine RPG rockets and a hand grenade. This will further reduce the terrorists' capability of endanger our lives.

Fahmi Warns Egypt Will Fight

-- Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmi CAIRO Egypt would go to war with Israel again if current said U.S. efforts to reach a second stage agreement on the Sinai fail. He indicated there still was hope for these efforts.

It was clear from U.S. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's talks here that he is sure of achieving progress and that the American government is anxious to achieve that progress, Fahmi said in a statement to the People's Assembly Foreign Affairs Committee.

The foreign minister reiterated his government's stand on a declaration of nonbelligerency in exchange for a pullback, and its view that any new agreement in Sinai would be strictly military and should be followed by a resumption of the Geneva conference, with the first order of business being the invitation of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

There was no indication of what tangible steps Egypt is prepared to take to secure return of the strategic Mitla and Giddi passes in Sinai and the Abu Rodeis oilfields. Israel is demanding at least a tacit rejection of the threat of force or use of it, and efforts by Egypt to try to relax the political, diplomatic and economic boycott of the Jewish state.

Fahmi said the decisive three months President Sadat has referred to in recent interviews would be over at the end of next

month after Kissinger's visit and said:

'If Israel continues to be arrogant and all peace efforts collapse then we have to resort to other alternatives. We never adopted the political solution as an alternative to the military

one. If all roads (to peace) are blocked, then we will have to return to our armed forces, which once proved capable of achieving our objectives."

On a declaration of nonbelligerency, Fahmi said, "ending a state of war is a legal procedure that cannot be accomplished in days. We accept it only within the context of an overall peace settlement.'

Street Combat Rages in Asmara Between Regular, Rebel Forces

ADDIS ABABA, Fierce street fighting between secessionist guerrillas and Ethiopian government troops proke out in the Eritrean capial of Asmara

The battle erupted only hours after the military government nere declared it would pursue a policy of "unity or death" and warned that it was capable of raising more than six million men to crush the secessionists.

Asmara residents said heavy nachineguns, bazookas, grenaies and automatic weapons were being used in heavy street fighting throughout the city.


Egypt, Kuwait To Set Up Firm For Fishing

The Egyptian units were new, the correspondents said, having sailed from the Mediterranean to replace the old units. If necessary, large detachments of men could be ferried through the canal to the Gulf in 24 hours.

DIVERS SEARCHING FOR LOST ART TREASURES

British divers hope shortly to start recovering a cargo of priceless Italian art treasure lost when a British warship, HMS Colossus, sank in a gale off the Isles of Sicilly, off the south-west coast of Britain, on December 10, 1798.

The art collection belonged to Sir William Hamilton, British envoy to Naples and husband of Emma Hamilton, Lord Nelson's mistress. It was packed in 18 crates, some of which were saved when the Colossus went down, but there were probably six or eight crates left. By now the crates will have split up and their contents — Roman jewellery, bronzes, marbles and a type of terracotta known as black slag — strewn among weed on the sea bed.

Leading the expedition to bring the treasure to the surface is Mr Roland Morris, a restaurant owner from Cornwall, who has salvaged much treasure from ancient wrecks in the past 20 years.

- NEW YORK -- The American army engineer corps will help build a headquarters for the Saudi Arabian National Guard, the magazine "Newsweek" reported American army engineers will go to Saudi Arabia soon to supervise the start of construction, the magazine said.
- CAIRO -- The state of war with Israel "will remain in effect until all Arab territories have been liberated and the Palestinian people's legitimate rights restored, "Egyptian Defense Minister Mohammed Abdul Ghani Gamassi was quoted as saying Monday, the Cairo newspaper "Al Ahram" reported that Gen. Gamassi called for continued preparation for Egyptian Armed Forces.
- CAIRO -- Egypt is considering resumption of diplomatic relations with Portugal, the Middle East News Agency quoted Foreign Minister Ismail Fahmi as saying The agency said this is being done in light of the recent recommendation by the Organization of African Unity which said that the new Portuguese regime has shown "wisdom and realism" dealing with territories under its occupation.
- ABU DHABI -- A.H. Boerma, director-general of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) has arrived in the United Arab Emirates (UAE) on a Gulf trip which will also take in Bahrain. The newspaper "Al Ittihad" quoted Boerma saying on arrival here that the UAE delegation played an important role in formulating decisions at the recent world food conference in Rome.
- JERUSALEM -- Computer errors brought 30,000 Israeli teachers out on strike, giving 500,000 children a day off school. The teachers complained of serious mistakes and delays in salary payments for the past 16 months since the ministry of education switched to a new computer.
- TEL AVIV -- A prominent Japanese, believed to be a former finance minister, is making a "semi-official, goodwill" tour of Israeli-occupied West Bank of Jordan with the stated aim of forging links between Japan and the Palestinians, the Israeli daily "Maariv" reported

This Man Called Ford Was born as Leslie King Jr.



United States President Ford, born and raised in the American midwest, is representative of that generation of moderate post-World War II political leaders who supported the rise of America's role in international affairs and who helped win its acceptance from a citizenry once reluctant to involve itself abroad. He has often spoken of himself as the man "in the middle."

As congressional leader and Vice President he travelled tens of thousands of milometers during his Vice Presidency alone, and delivered speeches at the rate, he once himself estimated, of one every two days. He has also travelled extensively abroad, principally as a member of the Inter Parliamentary

Gerald Ford is the 38th President of United States since the election of George Washington under the Constitution in 1788. He had served as the 40th Vice President and is the ninth to succeed to a vacant Presidency.

Gerald Rudolph Ford Jr. entered public life in 1948 after returning from nearly four years of service with U.S. Navy in World War II and working for two years as an associate in a law firm in his home town of Grand Rapids, Michigan. He had achieved local civic

prominence and become involved in reform politics. Seen by his colleagues as a conciliator and forthright leader, he once testified: "Truth is the glue that holds government together, and not only government, but civilisation itself."

In the beginning Gerald Ford was not his name. He was born Leslie King Jr., on July 14, 1913, in Omaha, Nebraska. But before he was two years old

his parents were divorced and he was adopted by his mother's second husband, the late Gerald R. Ford Sr., a Grand Rapids Civic and Republican Party leader and owner of a paint and varnish company.

Young Ford was a boy scout, reachng the top rank of Eagle, and he played football for Grand Rapids South "gh School, graduating in 1931. He took his sports ability to the University of Michigan, where he was the 'varsity football center,' and earned his B.A. degree in Political Science and Economics in 1935 — working his way through in those depression years by washing dishes and doing odd jobs.

From Michigan he went east to the Yale University Law School where, in addition to carrying a full academic schedule, he was the assistant football coach and the freshman boxing coach. He was graduated in the top third of his class in 1941.

Ford's decision to turn from the practice of law to politics coincided with his decision to marry Elizabeth Bloomer, a former modern dancer (under Martha Graham) and fashion designer five years his junior whose first marriage had ended in divorce. They were married on October 15, 1948, in the midst of his election campaign.

The Fords have four children: Michael Gerald, 24; John Gardner, 22; Steven Meigs, 18 and Susan Elizabeth, 17.

Moray House to Train Saudis

Edinburgh, is co-ordinating an intensive UK programme of teacher training for Saudi Arabia, through its Scottish centre for education overseas.

Price of Oil Could Rise Arabs Urged to Assist

Shah Warns

ZURICH

-- The Shah of Iran warned that the price of oil could rise even higher if the western world did not check

inflation.

He indicated that the question of dearer petroleum could be seriously considered by oil-producing states next month.

Talking to journalists after a three-and-a-half hour working lunch with U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, the Shah said the purchasing power of oil producing states was being sharply eroded by higher costs of imports.

He said he would attend next month's summit meeting in Algiers of the 13-nation Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC), of which Iran is an influential member.

Asked if the price of oil -currently between \$10 and 11
a barrel -- would go up, he
said: "This meeting will probably study what to do if the
inflation in Europe and elsewhere continues. If our purchasing power becomes less
and less, we will have to defend ourselves."

Philippines To Witness Richest Fight

MANILA

What is claimed to be the richest boxing event ever held in the Philippines will take place next month when Filipino world junior lightweight champion Ben Villaflor stakes his crown for \$60,000.

Villaflor, 22, who lives in Honolulu where he won the world
title three years ago, will defend his crown against South Korea's Kim Hyun Chi on March 14
at the suburban Araneta Colis-

Kissinger said he and the Shah, whom he described as 'an old, trusted and valued friend of the United States,' discussed energy problems, the Middle East and bilateral affairs.

As they talked over caviar and roast beef 300 armed policemen encircled the luxury hilltop Dolder Hotel in the biggest security operation here since then British Prime Minister Winston Churchill visited Zurich in 1946.

The Shah said they also talked though not in detail, about Kissinger's recent proposal for a new guaranteed floor price for petroleum. This would be considerably lower than the present cost but would also provide a level under which it would not drop.

As Kissinger stood impassively by his side, however, the Shah told newsmen packed into a gold-chandeliered hotel room that he was not in avor of a lower price for oil.

Arabs Urged to Assist Threatened French Banks

KUWAIT

Jewish bankers are blackmailing the French government into changing its pro-Arab policy by threatening to withdraw capital from French banks and smash the economy, it was charged here on the eve of a meeting of the Arab Bureau for Boycotting Israel.

Meanwhile, the bureau's Director General Mohammed Ahmed Mahjoub, saidin Damascus that the bureau was anti-Zionist, but not anti-Semitic. The bureau's black list, which is expected to be revised at the meeting in Cairo, was drawn up "regardless of nationality or religion," he said.

Mah joub's remarks and allegations in the Kuwait press of Zionist pressure on France followed an official statement in Paris of an inquiry into accusations of anti-Semitic dscrimination by Arab financiers against Paris banks.

Dacca May Ban Marriages in Alternate Years

DACCA

Marriages may be outlawed in Bangladesh next year and in 1978 to defuse the country's population explosion if family planning experts here have their way.

In a report on family planning legislation available here Monday, Norul Islam Khan declared that Marriage may be completely banned in alternate years, with a provision for exceptional cases."

Nurul Islam Khan said the right to marriage was not part of an individual's birthright. "It is an idiotic idea," he told a recent family planning seminar, "that everybody, irrespective of financial, physical and mental capabality, should be entitled to Marriage."

The experts told the seminar that family planning was a basic human right and ought to be protected by law. They suggested comprehensive legislation which would cover abortion, polygamy and marriage and said the already overcrowded country's population should be reduced.

Nurul Islam Khan also urged raising the age at which marriages could take place, courses on population control in schools and encouragement of later marriages.

WASHINGTON -- Former President Richard M.
Nixon exceeded his authority in withholding nine billion dollars
authorized by the U.S. Congress for pollution control, the U.S.

Supreme Court declared unanimously Tuesday.

It was the first time the supreme court has ruled on a presidential impoundment of funds, although numerous impoundments were struck down by lower federal courts during the Nixon admi-

Congress has since passed legislation giving itself power to control such impoundments.

Speaking through Justice Byron R. White, the supreme court said the act under which the pollution-control money was appropriated "was intended to provide a firm commitment of substantial sums within the relatively limited period of time in an effort to achieve an early solution of what was deemed an urgent problem."

"We cannot believe that congress at the last minute scuttled the entire effort by providing the executive with the seemingly limitless power to withhold funds from allotment and obligation," White said.

In 1972, congress authorized the appropriations not to exceed five billion dollars for fiscal year 1973, six billion dollars for fiscal 1974 and seven billion dollars for fiscal 1975 for sewage treatment grants.

Russell Train, then administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency, acting on Nixon's orders, allotted two billion dollars for 1973, three billion dollars for 1974 and four billion dollars for 1975.

The Nixon administration thought the money appropriated by congress wouldfurther aggravate the inflation.

The government contended that the impoundments were authorized under a 1972 amendment inserting the words unot to exceed" in the legislation under which the funds were authorized.

Soviet Union Said Using Listening Posts in Aden

LONDON The Soviet Union has set up several listening posts in South Yemen to monitor civilian and military radio traffic in neighboring countries and between ships of the south coast of the Arabian Peninsula, "The Daily Telegraph" reported Tuesday.

In a report from Beirut, the newspaper said detachments of Soviet technicians and radio specialists had landed at Aden from the Soviet ships now operating in the Indian Ocean.

DAMASCUS -- The Syrian committee for Afro-Asian solidarity condemned "acts of terrorism and genocide which the Ethiopian military authorities are committing against the Eritrean people." In a statement issued here the committee said "the road to terrorism and genocide against the Eritrean people, chosen by the military clique ruling Ethiopia deserves all denunciation and condemnation"

Trade Mission From America Visits Jordan

AMMAN A team of American executives and managers of major American organizations arrived Amman on the second leg of a fact-finding tour that will take them to a number of Arab countries.

The delegation, made up of 29 members, is traveling under the theme of "U.S. Triangular Mission to the Arab Nation."

Ephraim Katzir of Israel has canceled plans to attend the coronation of the king of Nepal because agitators were plotting to disrupt the ceremonies, the Israeli government announced







OAU Calls for Banning Petromin to Build Military Aid to Israel

-- The Organizatin of African Unity (OAU) Tuesday called on all countries to cut off military aid to Israel and pledged its support to the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO)

Informed / sources at the OAU's 24th ministerial council here said the council voted that the OAU's liberation committee should provide the PLO with aid however minimal, and that they invited PLO chairman Yasser Arafat to address the July summit of the organization in Kampala.

The sources said it was the first time the organization had discussed the Palestinian problem in a purely African con-

It congratulated the United Nations on inviting the PLO to participate as an observer in General Assembly affairs and at international conferences.

Ford to Extend **Tour Planned** For Far East

LONDON, -- As-ian diplomats reported Tuesday President Ford is planning to extend his journey to China next fall with state visits to at least three other Asian countries.

The American leader, these informants said, has accepted invitations to go to India, Pakistan and Iran -- and possibly Japan.

Washington and New Delhi officials already are discussing arrangements for the Indian visit, with October as the target date. But the informants stressed no final dates or arrangements have been set, presumably because the centerpiece of the presidential journey is certain to be the trip to Peking.

Editor Charged With Luring Girls to Cairo

Cairo vice squad arrested a Lebanese editor on charges of using his magazine to lure girls to Cairo and then entrapping them in a white slavery ring that extended to other Arab capitals, newspapers said

The man was identified as Nabil Maamoun Nassar, owner and editor of the Lebanese magazine "el Mogtama el Jedid," which has offices here

Reports said police raided his villa and found pornographic pictures, large sums of money and 16 passports for girls in the ring who were described as beautiful, university graduates lured by ads offering them jobs in the press at attractive salaries.

Schmidt Recovering From Pneumonia

Petromin, the Saudi Arabian national oil company, expects to spend \$30 billion over the next five to eight years to build a vast hydrocarbon industry in

Some of the biggest names in industry in the United States, Western Europe, and Japan are or will be associated with Petromin in a venture that for scale and complexity is probably unprecedented in the world, according to the governor of Petromin, Abdulhady Taher.

The aim is to spread industry, which is now concentrated in the region of the eastern oil fields, throughout the kingdom. Export refineries, petrochemicomplexes, fertilizer plants, gas reduction steel mills, and aluminum production are among the projects planned or being studied, Taher said in an interview here.

Curbing CIA May Benefit Soviets

WASHINGTON.

-- A leading British authority on Soviet affairs warns that any curtailment of the role of the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) could turn out to the advantage of the Soviet Union.

Robert Conquest, whose study to Soviet Communism began with service as a British liaison officer with the Soviet Army in World War II, says of the current investigation of the CIA that, from the point of view of Soviet intelligence officials, "it must be absolute fantasy."

He adds that "it seems rather like that to most Europeans

The Last of the Watergate Probes

Although the climactic Watergate trial is history, Americans still have not heard the last of the broad spectrum of wrongdoing known as Watergate -- 2 1/2 years after the celebrated breakin.

revolves action Future around the special prosecutor's office, the courts, the congress and possibly even the many proinvestigations into the Central Intelligence Agency.

In a nutshell the action is: -- The special prosecutor's office continues to investigate several areas broadly called "Watergate" Any additional indictments most likely will come in the area of campaign financing. A task force of the prosecutor's office continues plow doggedly through mounds of material related to campaign financing.

The outcome of a suit in U.S. District Court may determine whether the prosecutor's office ever can unravel tangled threads which could lead to wrongdoing in other Watergate-related areas, sources here acknowledge. The prosecutor's office for months has sought several dozen White House tape recordings made during the Nixon presidency. plus documents bearing on several specific issues. The suit is an attempt by the former president to prevent the prosecutor's office from obtaining these.

Judge Charles Richer has

heard evidence from both sides in the case. Both sides now await his decision. Appeals to higher courts could drag out the issue for months.

Prosecutors hope the tapes and documents will shed enough new light on unresolved issues to obtain convictions. Among these issues where investigation as yet has reached no provable conclusion are:

Who caused the 18-minute gap in a White House tape? What was the full story behind the backdate deed for the

Was there an innocent or unrelationship between IT&T and the Nixon administration?

Nixon income tax deduction?

What is the full story behind the two \$50,000 campaign gifts which Nixon's friend, Charles G. Rebozo, apparently received from Howard Hughes?

Thus far, the prosecutor's office has obtained no indictments in any of these areas. indicating that the grand jury (and possibly the prosecutor) is not satisfied wrongdoing has demonstrated. At the same time the prosecutors have not closed any of these investigations, indicating they are not satisfied that they know the full story.

-- The prosecutor's office also is working on its final report. Though some have asked that this report outline the full Nixon involvement in Watergate sources clearly indicate that it will not. The prosecutors are reluctant to write in their report anything they can not prove

in court -- and the pardon of the former president prevents

The prosecutor's office is expected to take about six months to complete all these activities before disbanding.

-- Several cases remain to be tried in connection with work by the special prosecutor's office.

Heading the list is the trial of the former Texas governor and cabinet office, John Connally, charged with bribery and conspiracy and obstruction of justice in connection with the Watergate coverup.

Jack Chestnut, 1970 campaign manager for Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, also is charged with accepting illegal campaign funds from the milk producers.

Also, the four defendants convicted in December's Watergate case -- John Mitchell, Robert Haldeman John Ehr lichman, and Robert Mardian -are expected to appeal to the U.S. Court of Appeals. Their appeals were to be filed 10 days after they were sentenced which was expected to be within the month.

-- Congressional hearings were planned early this year on an omnibus bill by retiring Sen. Sam J. Ervin, aimed at preventing future Watergates. The measure would, in part, establish a permanent special prosecutor, require annual financial disclosure by the president and vice-president, and prevent the attorney general and Justice Department from engaging in partisan politics.

Self Realisation

HUMAN personality can be considered as an organic and harmonious whole in which reason is integrated with the emotional and imaginative self, and action is the manifestation of thought.

A state of bliss comes through only when one's mind is at peace — profound peace and one's thoughts are pure and innocent. Bliss is just opposite to mental sickness. Lack of equilibrium, lack of harmony and dissonance in human personality, which are born out of conflicts, are conducive to mental conflicts. This is followed by a state of mental unhappiness and if prolonged leads to constant mental sickness, when for instance our actions are at variance with the accepted code of conduct, we feel as though a still but effective voice condemns us for these reactions.

Many people are in a position to rationalise their actions but quite a few may take to preaching virtues. What happens in the latter case is that the person who actually loves virtue preaches loudly, smiply endeavouring to drown the voice of his conscience. This is evidently a state of mental conflict and by proclaiming the virtues of good actions is actually at war within himself. This generates tension which may split up personality.

The reasons of mental conflict are 1. geographical, 2. psychological, 3. sociological and 4. physiological. The concept of good and bad, virtue and vice can be termed as geographical. Moral norms may vary from region to region and people to people. There are certain condemnable actions in our society but these very actions may be very much in conformity with the norms of some other community. As such, even the concept of sin is geographical. Religious feelings create a psychological rift in human mind. Certain actions which are diapproved by religion keep the mind subjective to punishment of the hereafter.

SOCIAL VIEW

Social view is superior to ethical as well as material values. Ultimately, the idea of mental happiness is tied up with the concept of human personality in its locality with all social and ethical values.

The human desire to acquire easy wealth is divisive of two categories—haves and have-nots. When the have-nots look at the haves enjoying affluence without physical labour, they develop a desire to emulate their example. In their craze to reach a higher pedestal with the haves, they ingeniously adopt all means—fair or foul—so long as these work. The prevalence of this situation not only generates and accelerates sociological complications but also brings about unhappiness and anguish.

There is hectic activity around us, and the idea being in most cases is to accumulate material values. Peace and happiness flowing from spiritual and ethical values ceases to occupy any place on the spectrum of life, although the fact remains that a state of inward happiness is in indirect proportion to one's faith in spiritual and moral values.

AFFLUENT IDLERS

There is an affluent cross-section of the people known as rich idlers who know not what to do with the wealth and leisure at their disposal. They too suffer from frustration.

The last aspect is physiological. Handicapped or sick persons hardly ever develop a fuller personality, it is either incomplete or lop-sided. Such a personality becomes morbid. His physical disease or handicap is bound to give a morbid covering to his outlook towards life.

Man being animal, is often lured into sin, it is his destiny. Perhaps in some cases it is essential for self-realization and self-accomplishment. After committing a cardinal sin, more often than not, man feels penitent. He dissolves in his own tears, and out of that is born a great man, a mightier man who is beloved of Allah.

It is our wayward desires that pull us down and degrade us.

In reality we should identify our will with the will of Almighty Allah and have strong conviction in the teachings

of Holy Quran. This can help us a lot in eliminating unhappiness on individual and collectve level.

PROBLEMS WE CANT TALK ABOUT

Start by recalling happy memories days you've enjoyed, things that were fun. Talk about things you like to do together — or used to. Don't ask each other why things have changed. Just remember.

IN THESE EARLY sessions, talk of the things in your life that are good — and you'll be surprised how long that list is! Remember the things that attracted you to each other originally. And tell each other all of the things you admire and respect about each other now, too. You'll find there are many.

You'll want to get to the point where you can talk about things you dislike in each other, too — the little habits, things that annoy. Not cuttingly or harshly. You aren't trying to wound. You're trying to understand. You're building that bridge.

As you continue your talks, do your best to make your home pleasant for each other — comfortable. See what small thing you can add to the day to make it nice for the other. Do a lot of giving — both of you.

Eventually, of course you are going to talk about the basic problem in your marriage. And in spite of your success in the preliminary sessions — in spite of the good you've found in them — communicating on the subject of sex is going to be difficult — for most couples it is just about the most difficult thing in the world.

There are many reasons for this. Our early training, the taboos of past generations, unconscious guilts or fears we've acquired — they all in habit us. Even the most sophisticated couples who say they can talk freely find it very hard to talk about their own intimate sex life.

But you must talk about the problem you share. You must learn to talk freely and fully. Admit your embarrassment at the start to each other — it will help. At times during your talks you may find it easier to show each other what you need or like, rather than putting it into words. That's all to the good.

Every wife must be able to tell her husband what caresses arouse her, what she wants him to do, what is sexually meaningful to her. Every husband must be able to say to the other (if this and what he doesn't. Each of you must be able to say to theother (if this should be the case) that you aren't sure

what you want, that you want to experiment and learn together what's pleasing.

As you communicate with each other, bring these problems into the light of day. Help each other to find the truth about them — truth can free you.

As you are talking together, try to dredge up any such things from deep in your mind. Together you can discuss them, learn to understand them.

If these things are never talked about freely and honestly, there is a little chance for success. And here again is where the learning to communicate can perform seeming miracles.

One word more: If there is a deep, underlying psychological reason for sexual failure, then only professional therapy can help.

But for many — for most of us — learning to communicate fully and freely can be all that is needed.

Safety Rules for Terrapins


Terrapins (water tortoises), which are currently imported into Britain at the rate of some 50,000 a year, mainly from North America, but with a considerable percentage from the Middle and Far East, can be a health risk in Britain.

This warning has been given by two British Government veterinary scientists, who have discovered salmonella germs, one of the major causes of food poisoning, in the water of domestic terrapin tanks.

The two scientists say they can understand why terrapins are fast growing in popularity as pets in Britain, but have published rules to make them safer to keep.

Their rules say that only one member of the family should look after terrapins as pets, and he or she should always be careful to wash their hands after handling them. Children should not handle the terrapins unless they can be trusted always to wash their hands, and, most important, the terrapin tank should not be casually cleaned in the kitchen sink.

Also, the once blackened trunks of trees, where the peppered moth roosts by day, are gradually recovering their colour.



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

What Happens to Children When They Are Unloved?

It may be easier to understand the vital role played by mother-love if one studies what happens to babies who are, for any reason, deprived of it. (And, of course, the point must be made that true, continuous mother-love can be provided by anyone-not only a child's natural mother. Adoptive, foster, substitute mothers of all kinds have proved this over- and over again).

It was the work of Dr. John Bowlby, MD. which first illuminated this subject. He mounted a series of investigations into the physical, mental and emotional development of children in a residential nursery. They received perfect physical care from skilled, trained nurses, and to the uniformed outsider it would have appeared that these babies had none of their needs neglected. But Bowlby reported a number of disturbing facts. One: that they took less food than babies cared for and handled by a single person-mother or substitute-mother — and consequently were smaller. Two: they suffered a greater incidence of illness — infectious and other. Three: they were slower in their development — smiling, grasping, crawling, walking, talking and so on at later age than properly mothered children.

Dr. Browlby also makes the point that not only children in residential nurseries may suffer mother-love deprivation. A child cared for by his own mother, and only his mother, may show symptoms of being love-starved if for any reason the mother is unable to give enough of herself to her relationship with her child (maybe due to the fact that she herself failed to find adequate loving in infancy). Further work by other researchers has suggested that mother love-deprived children carry the effects of their loss well into school life. They are less likely to achieve their full potential, less likely to establish happy relationships with teachers or pupils. Some workers have also suggested that in extreme case a baby may actually die if deprived of close human contact of the sort that is formed in the first weeks of life.





"Furthermore, as part of aid to food production we help developing countries to create or improve their own sources of fertiliser supply. For example, since 1970 Britain has committed over £25 million (62 million dollars) in capital aid to India alone for this purpose".
