Show reinforces Oman-UK ties

Anglo-Omani ties found open expression at a British trade exhibition, the centrepiece of "Oman with Britain - Friendship and Co-operation," which opened on Monday.

Sayyid Faisal bin Ali bin Faisal, the Minister of National Heritage and Culture, and the visiting Duke of Kent jointly inaugurated the five-day British Industrial and Consumer Exhibition at the Oman Exhibition Centre in Seeb.

"The relationship between the Sultanate and Britain has become distinguished as an example to follow," Sayyid Faisal said.

"It is marked by stability, consistency, clarity, respect and mutual confidence."

Also attending the inaugural function were Members of the Royal Family, Ministers, diplomats and leading businessmen.

The Minister said the exhibition represented His Majesty Sultan Qaboos's keen interest in rein-

forcing the friendly relations between the two countries which date back to the 17th century.

In his opening speech, the Duke of Kent reiterated the confidence of the British Government and the country's industrial sector in Oman as a substantial and stable market.

He said the exhibition was intended to underline the ability of British industry to offer the technologies, services and products which Oman needed as it continued its impressive rate of development.

Celebration

The Duke said Oman and Britain shared strong ties spanning over three centuries and covering both good and difficult times.

"Oman with Britain is both a celebration of this relationship and a signpost to its continuation and expansion in the future. It

demonstrates a shared determination to keep the partnership up to date and to develop it to mutually beneficial effect."

"I also believe that economic links between the two countries will thrive more effectively if, in addition to contacts between government, there are regular discussions between the private sectors in the two countries."

He said there were plans to create this year groups in each country, primarily but not exclusively of private sector businessmen, who would meet regularly to further the already close ties.

The Duke, who is also the Vice-Chairman of the British Overseas Trade Board, said: "I believe that as a trade exhibition this is the largest ever staged by one country in Oman. It is also one of the largest officially-supported British exhibitions in the Middle East in recent years."

298,426 pupils in 721 schools

A total number of 298,426 pupils are currently receiving education at the Sultanate's 721 schools and institutes, according to figures just announced.

Of these, 163,222 are boys and 135,204 girls.

The Director of Educational Planning at the Directorate General of Educational Development of the Ministry of Education and Youth, Raheela bint Amor al-Riyami, announced that the largest number of students are in the primary grade — 228,714. Of these, 112,374 are boys and 106,000 girls.

The total number of students in the preparatory grade are: 51,030 of these 30,697 are boys and 20,333 girls.

total number of students is 15,190. Of these, 7,490 are boys and 7,700 girls — the girls outnumbering boys.

The total number of students receiving general education is: 160,561 boys and 134,373 girls.

The remaining students are: 563 at the Islamic Preparatory Institutes in Mosques; 286 at the Islamic Secondary Institute; 1,653 at the Teachers' Intermediate Colleges; 146 at the Agricultural Secondary; 195 at the Industrial Secondary and 284 receiving private education.

Of the 721 schools in the country, 370 are primary schools — 118 for boys, 144 for girls and 108 coeducational.

The total number of preparatory schools is 267 - 122 for boys, 83 for girls and 62 co-educational.

The total number of secondary schools is 66 — 31 boys and 35 for girls. There are no co-educational secondary schools.

Schools, institutes and colleges of other kinds are: seven Islamic Preparatory Institutes at Mosques, one Islamic Secondary Institute, five Intermediate Colleges, three Industrial, Commercial and Agricultural schools and two private education schools (co-educational).

The total number of boys schools in Oman 285 and the total number of girls schools 264. Coeducational schools number 172.

According to Raheela bin Amor, the total number of classes in these schools during the current year was 9,202 — 4127 for boys, 3,630 for girls and 1,445 co-educa-

Arab League agreement on taxation

The Sultanate has become one of the signatories to the League of Arab States' agreement on the exchange of exemption from taxes and duties on the activities and equipment of the air transport organisation.

Under the terms of a Royal Decree issued by His Majesty Sultan Qaboos, Oman has joined the agreement signed originally in Tunis on September 5, 1979.

The decree asks the concerned authorities to notify the general secretariat of the Arab League about the step, in accordance with the requirements of the accord.

The decree comes into force as of February 11, 1989.

Health benefits

Nationals of other AGCC countries living in or visiting the Sultanate will receive the same benefits and privileges as Omanis at all Government health establishments in the country from March 1, according to Dr Ali bin Mohammed bin Moosa Minister of Health.

other dignitaries went around the richly varied exhibition which depicted the close ties enjoyed by the two countries in various sec-

The best from Britain is on display at the exhibition in which about 70 major industrial and commercial organisations are taking part. The exhibition includes industrial equipment, motorcars, domestic appliances, building materials, communications systems, medical equipment and sports and leisure articles.

The non-industrial side of the exhibition has a unique and highly visual historical display cataloguing the history of Anglo-Omani relationship from the first trading agreement of 1645 through to the many modern day areas of cooperation.

Over 50 display panels, using both Arabic and English text and historical pictures not seen in public for many years, are housed in a bedouin style tent a the entrance.

It spans over centuries from the first contact between the two countries in 1645 when the Ya'riba ruler of Oman, Imam Nasir, offered the British East India Company a trading station at Sohar to the present day bilateral relationship under His Majesty Sultan Qaboos.

A selection of colourful pictures are featured in the exhibiton, with His Majesty paying a State visit to London in March 1982, returning a visit to Oman made by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and his Royal Highnesses Prince Philip. Their Royal Highness the Princess and Prince of Wales have also visited Oman, as did Prime Minister Mrs. Thatcher.

A delightful picture features Sir Ranulph Fiennes, the well-known explorer, planting the Omani flag at the South Pole.

The exhibition also has a market square with Harrods and other British retailers as well as Omani and British craftsmen displaying their skills.

Paintings by some well known Omani and British artists, including Anwar Sonya, Rabha Mahmoud, Barry and Sarah Parett and Carol Lanfear also feature in the exhibition.



Government testing new waste disposal system

Rural sanitation is being given top priority and the Government of Oman, in association with the World Health Organisation, is introducing a new domestic liquid waste disposal system on an experimental basis.

Dr. Mohammed Dajani, a WHO expert on domestic liquid waste disposal, is currently visiting the Sultanate at the invitation of the Environmental Health Section of Ministry of Health

Under the project, being jointly carried out by the Ministry of Health, Ministry of Social Affairs and Labour and the Ministry of Regional Municipalities, Dr. Dajani is to hold demonstrations at Nakhl, Khaboura and Adam - three areas with different soil natures — permeable, medium permeable and rocky.

Dr. Dajani told the "Times" that the purpose of his visit was to educate both the public and the concerned Government officials about the construction and the working of new flush latrines which are cheaper, more efficient and required much less water than conventional systems.

The consultant will guide local staff in designing and constructing the system so that it is appropriate to the site conditions and the requirements. During the demonstration he will be accompanied by representatives from the participating Ministries who will be trained to continue the project after the expert leaves.

At the end of his visit the consultant will brief the concerned authorities about the method of construction, the work involved both before and after the system is installed.

The demonstration at the three different sites, Dr. Dajani said, would also give an idea about it cost effectiveness. However, he pointed

out self-help could bring down the cost considerably.

The system includes the construction of an underground leeching pit within the house compound and putting the latrine on top or near the pit. The expert said the location of the pit had to be carefully selected in order to conserve the environment.

Fertiliser

After the pit is full, another pit can be dug and the first one filled with soil and closed for at least a year. He said the gap of at least one year was vital to ensure that all the pathogens are killed. After that the pit can be emptied and the decomposed contents re-used as fertiliser. This way the two pits can be used alternately and can serve for many years, Dr. Dajani said.

Dr. Dajani said the new pour flush units were an improvement on the traditional latrine as because of the water seal there was no possibility of either insects or bad odours moving back from the leeching pit. "It suits the country's resources too as instead of the 10 to 12 litres of water which is needed to flush a normal flush toilet, this system only requires one to two litres per flush," the expert pointed out.

However, the main reason for introducing this excreta disposal system is health. It had been observed in the past that human wastes were a major source of pollution of water wells and afalaj in the rural area.

The problem becomes severe in the rainy season when rain water flow over the ground and carries the improperly disposed human waste polluting into the traditional wells and falaj causing an outbreak of water borne diseases such as Diarrhoea.

Since water is vital for life, it had been felt that measures were needed to prevent such pollution, especially when fresh water is scarce in the country. It was obvious that most of the water born diseases could be reduced and controlled by improving human waste disposal and introducing the necessary facilities and safe methods of disposal of the waste in the area

The expert said that the advantages of the system were that it served as a proper sanitary measure for collecting domestic waste, was free from odour and insects, it utilised less water than conventional systems and was less expensive. "It incorporates simple technology and is therefore easy to install, use and maintain."

The expert, who has supervised rural sanitation programme in Jor-

dan, said these household latrines had been successfully tried in India and many other countries.

He suggested that to begin with, a health education programme would be necessary to introduce the method to the public but "once they start to see the benefit of the system it should be accepted by the majority."

'Opec states following quota'

Oil prices may shift in the range of \$15 to \$17 a barrel this year, Oman's Petroleum and Minerals Minister Said bin Ahmed al Shanfari told reporters after meetings with four non-Opec oil producing countries.

Mr. Shanfari also blamed the recent decline as "baseless rumors spread by vested interests."

"The oil market is very sensitive," he added.

He said he believed all OPEC states were following their output quota.

Following separate meetings with the Ambassadors of the Soviet Union, China, Malaysia and the Yemen Arab Republic, Mr. Shanfari remarked: "The outlook is very encouraging and I expect the market to be in good shape."

He predicted that the oil prices would stabilise at \$18 per barrel in 1990. "This year they move betwen \$15 and \$17 depending on market discipline."

Arab League official

The Deputy Prime Minister for Legal Affairs, Sayyid Fahd bin Mahmood al Said, who is also the President of the Sultan Qaboos University Council last week met the Secretary-General of the Arab-League's Council of Justice Ministers Mohammed Miko.

During the meeting, also attended by Sultan Qaboos University Secretary-General Hammad bin Hamed al Ghafri, they reviewed efforts by the council of Arab Justice Ministers to unify Arab legislations.

Mohammed Miko commended the Sultanate for its backing of efforts for joint Arab co-operation, and said he had noted the enormous progress, made by the Sultanate in various fields including legislation.

Mr. Shanfari said discussions held with the ambassadors centred on the next session of Nopec oil experts in London on February 21. Recommendations made will be submitted to a joint meeting of Opec-Nopec oil ministers expected to take place in March. He added that Oman would adhere to any directive made by the ministers.

When asked about Omanisation, Mr. Shanfari said the process "is progressing well and on schedule."

He stressed that Omanisation had not affected the growth of the Petroleum Development Oman, Oman Refinery Company and the Oman Mining Company. "The right man takes the right place."

The Deputy Prime Minister for Security and Defence, Sayyid Fahr bin Taimour al Said last week received in his office in Beit al-Falaj camp the British Ambassador to the Sultnate, Mr Robert L Alston

Present during the meeting were Air Commodore Mallallah bin Rustom al Sadqi, Colonel Abdullah bin Salih al Dhabry and Khalifa bin Khalfan al Amry from the office of the Deputy Prime Minister.

Austrian Minister

Austria's Minister of Education, Arts and Sports Dr Hilde Hawlicek is due to arrive in Muscat tommorrow on a four-day visit following an invitation from National Heritage and Culture Minister Sayyid Faisal bin Ali al Said.

Besides holding talks with senior official here, she will also visit places of historical importance.

New rules on charity shows by expatriate bodies

Associations and other organisations run by expatriates in Oman will not be allowed to organise charity shows in aid of the disabled without prior written permission from the Social Affairs and Labour Ministry.

This is one of the new regulations contained in a Ministerial Decree issued by Sheikh Mustahil bin Ahmed al Mashani, the Minister of Social Affairs and Labour.

It said applications to organise charity programmes by both Omani and expatriate organisations must be submitted to the Director-General of Social Affairs in Muscat or his counterpart in Salalah.

The application must mention the kind of charity programme, its date and venue; value of tickets; proportion of the proceeds that will go to the disabled which should not be less than half and a letter of approval from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in case the organisers are expatriates.

The application must be submitted a month before the show with letters of approval from the Ministry of National Heritage and Culture, the Royal Oman Police and the Ministry of Education and Youth if the programme is a sports event.

The decree empowers the Ministry to send one of its staff to attend the programme and ensure that all regulations have been abided by.

Training course in measurement

The Government is organising a training course in measurement from March 20 to 27.

The organisers are the Directorate General of Specifications and Measurements, Ministry of Commerce and Industry.

The proceedings of the course would be held in Arabic and all participants will be Omani nationals.

UNDP experts hold talks

The Minister of Social Affairs and Labour Sheikh Mustahail bin Ahmed al Mashani met a delegation of experts from the UN Development Programme.

They discussed difficulties facing the implementation of the development programme and also reviewed the agreement between the Ministry and the international organisation.

Kuwait course

Twelve land surveyors from the Housing Ministry have left for Kuwait for a three-month training course.

Said bin Nasser al Maskari, Under-Secretary of Housing met the trainees before their departure. He urged them to make the best use of the course to develop their skills.

Campaign planned on proper disposal of soft-drink glass containers

Producers and Importers of soft drinks in the country are joining hands with the Government to fight the menace caused by the improper disposal of non-returnable glass bottles.

In a meeting with representatives of the Muscat Municipality, the Ministry of Regional Municipalities and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry last week, soft drink bottlers and importers discussed steps to be taken to ensure proper disposal of glass bottles.

Said Amor Ali al Marhuby, General Supervisor of Health Affairs, Muscat Municipality, told the "Times" that it was decided at the meeting to intensify the public awareness campaign about the use of specially designed and locally manufactured "bottle collector

bins'

He said the meeting debated various means of getting the message across to the public and a final decision on the campaign will be taken soon.

The meeting also decided to distribute more bins around the town. Mr al-Marhuby said it was also recommended that such bins must be placed near all stalls, shops and kiosks selling soft drinks in glass bottles.

He said these bins would be supplied by the manufacturers of the soft drinks, who had offered their readiness to do so. Besides having signs indicating the use of the bins the containers could also carry the logo of the soft drink companies supplying them, Mr. Said al Marhuby said.

About 60 specially designed bottle collectors were distributed on an experimental basis in Muscat and other big towns around the country last year. Participants at the meeting felt these bins had proved successful to some extent and there was need for greater public awareness about these collectors.

It may be remembered that recently Muscat Municipality banned the carrying as well as selling of soft drinks in glass bottles at parks, beaches, playgrounds, cinema halls and schools.

The ban order was issued for greater public safety as broken pieces of glass bottles were reported to have caused many accidents.

He said the ban was not only on fizzy drinks sold in glass bottles but all drinks sold in glass bottles, including tonics.

At present there are four soft drink factories and at least 13 importers, excluding importers of tonic drinks in Muscat.

A major health survey

"It will give use a broad picture of the health of a one-year-old in Oman in relation to the socio-economic status of the woman". The survey is expected to last some 20 months and is a follow-up of the survey covering some 5,000 households now being undertaken by the Government.

"The basic objective of the whole exercise is to assess the condition of the country's children and factors that affect their health so as to provide them and their mothers with better health. For instance, we know that infant mortality has been reduced dramatically, but we have no documentary proof".

Speaking at the seminar at Al Bustan Palace Hotel on economic links between Oman and Britain on Saturday, the Duke of Kent who was in Oman on a four-day visit, said the friendship festival represented "a celebration of a tried and trusted friendship as well as a determination on the British side to keep it so, and to play a full part in Oman's development in the future as in the past.

"This keen interest on the part of Britain shows a confidence in the future of the Omani economy and a will to seize the opportunity to further strengthen existing links," said the Duke who ended his four-day visit on Tuesday.

The Omani side at the seminar was led by the Deputy Prime Minister for Finance and Economy, Qais bin Abdul Munim al Zawawi, and included the Minister of Commerce and Industry, Salim bin Abdullah al Ghazali, and the Under-Secretary Dr. Al Yaqdhan bin Talib bin Ali al Hinai.

The British participants included the British Ambassador to Oman Mr R.J. Alston, Mr David Douglas-Home, Chairman of the Committee for Middle East Trade and several officials and businessmen.

The Duke said there was a well established and strong British presence in industry, commerce and finance in Oman, "but we know we cannot afford merely to rely on traditions, however solid these may be and we are quite clear that the British dimension itself has to evolve if we are to keep pace with your changing priorities."

Trends

He said the meeting was talking place at a formative moment in the evolution of Oman's economy and would help the British side to have a clear perception of the main trends in Oman's economy.

Britain, he said, realised that Oman was vulnerable to volatility in the value of the dollar as well as to declining oil prices and there was movement away from reliance on oil revenue.

The Duke said his country would like to know more about the progress made by the Sultanate in trade and the removal of tariff barriers between the AGCC countries.

"This will help to establish an idea of the areas in the economy of Oman in which British activity and investment would be welcome: here it will be valuable in this context to have the views on the Omani side of both Government and private sector, as the perceptions of each are very important to us in assessing the contribution we might be able to make."

At the same time, he pointed out, Britain would need to pay careful attention to Oman's requirements in terms of issues such as employment as well as purely economic factors.

He was hopeful that the seminar would help in identifying the specific conditions which must exist if fruitful partnerships between the two countries were to be further developed.

"I am sure that there will be potential attractive openings for British finance, skills, technology, training, management and marketing know-how."

Earlier, welcoming the Duke and his delegation, Mr. Zawawi said the Oman with Britain festival was a reflection of


progress, a lot was yet to be achieved.

A significant contribution Islam has made to public health is in the sphere of what is now a specialised branch of medicine...dentistry.

Thanks to the monumental efforts made by the World Health Organisation and the International Dental Federation, outstanding progress has been achieved in the domain of dental health and oral hygiene all over the world.

Oral pathology and surgery have made giant strides. Orthodontics (concerned with the prevention and cure of poor tooth alignment and related dental aversions), prosthodontics (provision of artificial teeth to replace the missing ones), pedodontics (looking after the teeth of children and adolescents), periodontics (cure of ailments connected with periodontal tissues) and other branches of dentistry have jointly helped to improve radically the general dental health of the people.

The result is that the rate of dental diseases has registered a remarkable decline in many parts of the world. Gingivitis (inflammation of the gums), pyorrhea (inflammation of the tissues around the teeth roots) and other related diseases are gradually affecting a lesser number of patients, in several areas.

In the countries where the municipal authorities are particular about adding sodium flouride to public water supplies, despite public opposition to the move, there has been an appreciable reduction in the number of people suffering from caries — decay of the teeth.

However, it is astonishing that very little has been said or written about the enormous emphasis Islam has placed on the protection of teeth.

Probably the first person in the world to lay down the basis of dental

It discusses Islamic concern for dental health and the methods of dental care prescribed by the Prophet.

health and oral hygiene was the Holy Prophet.

At a time when dental education was probably a term unknown to the world, the Prophet stressed the hygienic importance of keeping the teeth clean and tidy. Abu Huraria, a zealous propagator of the Prophet's words and deeds, quotes the Prophet as saying: 'Did I not apprehend that it would be burdensome on my people, I would prescribe the brushing of teeth before every prayer'.

The tradition shows that the Prophet did not prescribe tooth-brushing before the five-time prayer every day only because he thought this was too much of demand on an individual. Otherwise, he was per-

fectly convinced of the hygienic utility of such an action.

The Prophet was himself very particular about keeping his teeth clean. When he woke up or entered the house, the first thing he did was the brushing of his teeth. In a number of other traditions, the Prophet impressed upon his followers repeatedly the importance of brushing their teeth, which he said, 'purifies the mouth and is agreeable to the Lord'.

The Prophet's wife Aisha, a talented and outstanding traditionist, known for her command over both juridical and theological matters, related that the Prophet described the following acts as being among the demands of nature:

- cutting close the moustache
- allowing the beard to grow
- brushing the teeth
- cleaning the nose
- paring the nails
- washing out the base of the fingers
- removing the hair from the
- removing the pubic hair
- washing the affected parts after a call of nature.

The list, which looks like having been prepared by a physician, speaks of the Prophet's interest in the health of his people. It is one of many things which make Islam not only a religion concerned with the spiritual aspects of life, but also a code which deals with such important subjects as public health and cleanliness.

The regular cleansing protects the teeth against cavities, malocclusion and decay, often caused by sugar, safeguards the tissues supporting the teeth, corrects dento-facial incompatibility and assists the digestion of the food. A bit of extra dental care, as prescribed by the Prophet, may make a hell of a difference to one's health.

The Prophetic emphasis on toothbrushing can be greatly exploited in order to bring about a radical change in public attitude to dental health, a change which is inevitable if social and emotional problems resulting from the disfigurement of the teeth and gums are to be solved. These problems often greatly contribute to the psychological upsets which subsequently give birth to alcoholism and drug addiction. It can, thus, be stated accurately that the Prophet's sayings concerning toothbrushing represent preventive measures against the use of chemical methods to achieve gratification.

The Islamic teaching on cleaning the teeth may be used to arouse fear among the beauty-concious youth for the disadvantages resulting from dental carelessness such as the disfigurement of the gums and teeth, deterioration in personal appearances and excessive pain caused by tooth extraction which makes life miserable.

In a number of countries, particularly in Europe and the Gulf, dental health services are available free of charge. But this can make a major difference to the dental health, only when accompanied by public education. The members of the general public must be made aware of the fact that toothbrushing on a regular basis can eliminate plaque from the teeth, crevices and gum margins. The development of calcus is impossible in the event of the elimination of plaque.

The educating of the masses in the world of Islam on the basis of the Prophet's traditions can also help reduce the incidence of one of the most widespread diseases of mankind — the periodental disease.

Airport traffic up in London

London's three major airports, Heathrow, Gatwick and Stansted, last year handled nearly 60 million passengers, an 8.2 per cent increase over 1987.

The BAA, formally known as the British Airports Authority, has reported that 37.5 million of the 1988 travellers used Heathrow, which has long been the world's busiest international airport.

This total, which was eight per cent up on 1987, was boosted by a rise of over 10 per cent in passengers in December to more than 2.8 million.

Gatwick Airport had an even bigger 13.2 per cent increase in December to swell its annual figure to 20.7 million while Stansted eclipsed both its "big brother" airports with a damatic 46.6 per cent jump in 1988 travellers to top the one million mark.

Airliner movements at all three London airports were up as were cargo tonnages handled. Total aircraft movements for the three were just over 330,000 and cargo handled totalled 862,733 tonnes.

BAA says all major market sectors except domestic flights saw in improvement in business. Traffic on European scheduled routes increased by 11 per cent while there was a sharp upturn in the growth of European charters with a 14 per cent rise in December. The increase in North Atlantic traffic were again in double figures, this time an increase of 17 per cent, while other long haul routes recorded a collective increase of 10 per cent. Prominent among individual long haul markets was a 23 per cent rise in traffic to and from Japan.

Loans boost for industrial sector

As part of the ongoing industrialisation programme of the Government, the observation and follow-up section at the Ministry of Commerce and Industry's Industrial Incentives Department has been following up new projects under implementation and submitting periodical reports on them.

These reports reflect the executive position of the project and the extent to which the concerned party is serious about implementing it. This is done in order to provide an opportunity to other investors with a serious desire to set up the planned project.

After the project enters the stage of production, the stage of industrial control begins. The Ministry gives the necessary advice and opinion to industrial projects with a view to ensuring that the national product of Oman is not only of the highest quality, but also conforms to international specifications. This enables the Omani product to compete with similar products imported from abroad.

The soft loan project is an important step which may eventually help boost industry. The loans are granted following the promulgation of a Royal Decree which formulates the regulations for Government grants to private sector projects, in the sphere of industry, agriculture, fisheries and minerals.

Tourism

Coinciding with the launching of the third Five Year development plan, a Royal Decree was issued for financial support to the private sector in the spheres of industry and tourism. Its provisions were later amended to conform to the requirements of the new phase in the light of the experience gained from the second Five Year Plan. The decree added tourism projects to the list of industrial projects benefitting from financial support.

Industrial loans are granted only to the projects which assume the form of joint stock companies. The condition is that at least 25 per cent of the company's capital should have been covered through public subscription and Omanis own at least 75 per cent of the capital throughout the period of the loan. This does not apply to projects vital to the national economy, provided the minimum share of Omanis is 51 per cent.

The Government loans are to be utilised for any of the following three purposes:

- 1. Setting up of a new project.
- 2. Supporting the existing projects which want to expand and improve their productivity.
- 3. Supporting the projects facing difficulties in continuing with the production for any of the reasons specified by the Financial Support Committee.

The Government loan, which is without interest, is granted as follows: maximum value is equivalent to 100 per cent of the capital of the project within Muscat area and 125 per cent of the capital of the projects

outside Muscat.

The loans are granted in annual instalments to be paid after the passage of a five-year grace period.

The interest-free Government loans granted to industrial projects are unique of their kind. No such easy loans are available in any of the neighbouring countries.

The total value of the loans granted to industrial projects since the beginning of the second Five-Year Plan to June 30th, 1988 R.O. 21.3 million. The number of loans

was 61 and the number of industrial companies benefitting from them 58.

The sphere in which the largest number of loans were granted was in manufacturing of non-metallic mineral products. 17 loans were granted to 17 companies, valued at RO 7,918,882, representing 37.16 per cent of the total industrial loan value. The second field in which the largest amount of loans were given is foodstuff, beverages and tobacco

Conference on ozone layer

A major international conference on the impact of chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) and other chemicals on the ozone layer is to be held in London from March 5 to 7.

Hosted by the British Government, the conference will involve Ministers and senior officials from 150 invited countries as well as leading international scientists and industrialists. UK Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher will play a prominent role in the three-day meeting.

The objectives of the conference - which is being held in association with the United Nations Environment Programme - are to extend understanding of ozone depletion; to increase international awareness of the work that is being done by industry to find replacement chemicals or alternative technologies; and to encourage international participation in the process of tackling the problem as set out under the Montreal Protocol.

industry. A total of 13 loans were given to 13 companies, valued at RO 4,704,625, representing 22 per cent of the total value of industrial loans.

The third field in which the Government granted the largest number of loans is the manufacturing of mineral products, machinery and equipment. Eleven companies benefitted from 13 loans valued at RO 1,644,724 representing 7.7 per cent of the total industrial loan value.

The industries which benefitted from the remaining loans are: textiles, garments, leather, wood, wooden products (including furniture) paper, paper products, printing and publication material, chemicals, chemical products, petroleum, coal, rubber, basic metalic products, restaurants and hotels.

Utilisation

There are a large number of reasons why industrial incentives given by the Government are not utilised. These are:

- 1. Investors are not aware of the incentives given to the industrial sector.
- 2. Investors do not carry out the instructions formulated by the Ministry to obtain different forms of incentives and do not submit all the documents required.
- 3. Application for customs exemptions are submitted late. In some cases these applications are submitted a short time before the arrival of the equipment or raw material. In other cases, the applications are made after the actual arrival of the material.
- 4. The names of the equipment or raw material imported are not the same as those specified in the bills of lading. This delays clearance by customs authorities.
- 5. When applications are filed, some of the materials are left out. This requires the submission of a new application and the issuing of a new ministerial decision on exemption.
- 6. Some of the investers do not contact the Ministry or belatedly submit documents proving their entitlement to government loans granted under the terms of the Financial Support Law.
- 7. Some of the companies, which are granted the loans, do not use them for the purpose s for which they have been given.

Did the pterosaur really fly - or merely glide?

A reptile that became extinct between 70 and 80 million years ago is to be studied by Anglo-US zoologists.

Dr. Jeremy Rayner from the zoology department at Bristol University in south-west England, and Dr. Kevin Padian of the University of California, USA, are attempting to solve the mystery of whether the pterosaur was capable of flight - or did it merely glide? Pterosaurs belong to a group of reptiles whose fossilised remains have been found in almost every continent except Antarctica.

Most have been found in North America, Central Europe and a few in Britain, Central Africa and recently, Australia. They were the closest relatives of the dinosaurs although they were not actually dinosaurs themselves. They have many features in the skeleton which indicate that they behaved in a similar way physiologically and mechanically and had closely-related ancestors.

The fossil records of pterosaurs go back to 210 to 220 million years ago. The majority are about 150 million years old and they appear to have become extinct about 70 to 80 million years ago at about the same time that the dinosaurs disappeared from the fossil record.

"Virtually all those that we know about were marine specimens," said Dr. Rayner, "but this may be because they were preserved having died at sea or on the seashore where there is a better chance of survival of the remains than on dry land where other animals could destroy or eat them.

"There has always been great interest in pterosaurs as they were "flying" reptiles. Flight is a very difficult adaptation for animals requiring very extreme physiological, morphological and mechanical specialisations. The

pterosaurs are specialised but we do not know to what extent. They have been compared with birds and bats but we are now learning that they were quite different. We want to understand exactly how they were put together, how they behaved and how they flew."

It has been argued that because some of the pterosaurs were very large they could only glide or soar like an albatross or vulture. But many of them were quite small, not much bigger than a sparrow or blackbird. Dr. Rayner continued: "They must have flown properly in the same way as birds or bats. That means that they had very complex and well-defined patterns of wing movement. We should be able to trace that by looking at the articulations of the bones".

Specimens

Comparisons will be made with modern birds and bats so that it will be possible to estimate what forces would be generated on the wing, how they would vary during the wing movement and discover if the pterosaur's wing was strong enough to sustain them. Specimens have been measured in museums in London and Munich to see how the species differed, the range of dimensions and the range of possible movements by the wing.

The information obtained will be used to produce a theoretical model on a computer predicting the aerodynamics of the reptile. The fossilised bones will then be examined again to see that if they were big enough in the right places to sustain the forces predicted. It is hoped that a three-dimensional model will be produced for testing a wind tunnel

Top US destinations for new immigrants

New York City and Los Angeles, California, are immigrants' top U.S. destinations — but dozens of other areas are getting their share, reports

'American Demographics' magazine. In 1984-86, 36 other metropolitan areas got at least 2,000 legal immigrants a year, mostly Asians and Hispanics. The numbers of Europeans and Japanese fell as economies improved.

"The chance for economic improvement remains the biggest single motivation," says geographer James Allen.

Some 570,000 legal immigrants enter the United States annually, up 30 per cent from the 1970s. Another 200,000 enter illegally. The U.S. population is 6.2 per cent foreign-born.

An offshoot of the influx, Allen says: "Our world view will be more concerned with Asia and Latin America...just by the very political process of having a greater number of voters from those areas."



Emphasis on water resources

New reserves of water have been discovered recently in Oman and studies are under way to determine their proper utilisation for agricultural development.

His Majesty Sultan Qaboos told citizens during his "Meet the People" tour about the vital importance of preserving water resources.

"Preservation of water resources is a duty that will be questioned in the future if we do not take necessary action now," he said.

He said the Government was planning to carry out a comprehensive survey of water reserves in the country.

The plan would encompass all sources, particularly the falajs and wells and lay down a scientific, careful method of exploiting them.

His Majesty pointed out that Oman's achievements in the past 19 years were the result of farsighted policies taking into consideration the needs of future generations.

Speaking about the Five Year Plans His Majesty said the current third and coming fourth plan would concentrate on the development of the remote areas. The urban areas have had their share of development.

His Majesty said since the Sultanate was a vast country, development must be a continuous process.

"Our ambition has always been to satisfy the needs of citizens wherever they are," the citizens were told.

The country's achivements so far made it proud. "We can say without doubt that many of our towns have been well-developed, enabling us to give equal interest to the remote areas."

His Majesty said he held discussions with members of his cabinet recently on this subject and on the welfare of the coming generations in order to provide the youth with facilities for developing their abilities and qualifications.

A national plan for the youth was announced after the last meeting of the cabinet.

"We must unite our efforts to build the nation."

In this context, His Majesty called for an immediate end to the practice of "illegal ownership" of lands.

His Majesty also came down heavily on ostentatious spending following a death in the family or on the occasion of a marriage.

These were bad habits, often forcing

the family concerned to go begging afterwards, His Majesty remarked.

"Now that we have got rid of the practice of dowry, we should spend within the limits of financial capabilities."

On Friday evening, His Majesty toured Izz and areas surrounding Manah and was given a warm welcome by the people.

In the afternoon, giving the Friday prayer sermon at the Sultan Qaboos Mosque in Nizwa, His Majesty emphasised the importance of work.

The Holy Koran treated work as worship and praised those who work hard in order to earn a living and His Majesty quoted several verses from the Holy book in this regard.

Great civilisations were based mainly on the people's devotion to work, adding that God loved those who worked with their own hands in order to feed themselves and His Majesty noted that many of the Prophet Mohammed's sayings urged people to work hard.

Later, the prayers were led by Sayyid Mohammed bin Ahmed, His Majesty's Adviser for Religious and Historical Affairs.

• The number of water connections given to houses, hospitals, schools and mosques in Dubai last year totalled 4,216 — up by 181 compared to the preceding year.

Chairman Abdullah bin Hamad al-Attiyah said the board expected an increase in the company's activities outside the Gulf area as it received offers from oil companies in Ethiopia and Yemen Arab Republic.

• The International Spring Fair opening in Dubai on February 27 will have exhibitors from 25 countries. Participants include: Austria, Bulgaria, China, India, Korea, West Germany, Czechoslovakia, Hong Kong, Hungary, Indonesia, Iran, Mexico, Malaysia, Philippines, Pakistan, Palestine, Romania, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, Spain, Thailand, Taiwan, Zimbabwe and the UAE.

• The United Arab Emirates is planning to replace foreigners employed in ministries with UAE nationals in the next five years, the Dubai based Al-Bayan newspaper reported recently.

It said the government approved a five-year nationalisation plan starting this year due to growing financial obligations, overstaffing and increasing number of local university graduates.

UAE nationals account for less than a third of the 45,000 people working at UAE federal ministries, the remainder being mainly from other Arab countries such as Jordan and from the subcontinent.

• The new Dubai automated abattoir is expected to start regular functioning from April 1.

The municipality will receive delivery of the abattoir from the contractors at the end of March. The abattoir will be commissioned on February 25 for a month.

A municipal delegation recently visited Syria and Turkey for tenders to recruit 21 slaughterers.

UAE helps build homes in Bangladesh

One thousand houses were built and furnished in Bangladesh for flood victims with a total of \$500,000 provided by the UAE Red Crescent Society. This was stated by Eid Al Khamees, deputy chairman of the society, in Abu Dhabi recently.

A grand mosque was also built in Munshiganj at a cost of \$30,000 provided by the society. Besides, eight tons of relief goods, including milk powder, clothes and blankets were provided to the flood victims.

A senior official of the society, Tahir Al Saqqaf, was sent to Dhaka with the relief supplied. The official, who returned to Abu Dhabi recently, held meetings with senior officials of Bangladesh government and also visited the newly-built houses and mosques.

Saudi Arabia

• The Ministry of Agriculture and Water plans to raise the number of greenhouses in the Kingdom by 500 per cent in the coming five years considering the productivity, Al-Madinah reported recently. Greenhouses supply 65 per cent of agriculture products demanded by the local markets, the paper said.

Rice studies successful

Experiments conducted by the Ministry of Agriculture and Water for cultivating rice in the Kingdom have proven 100 per cent successful.

However, due to the fact that rice requires large quantities of water for prolonged periods, the ministry has not embarked on expanding this field, Abdul Aziz Al-Midbil, deputy minister for researchers and agricultural development said.

Rice has been successfully grown in Ahsa but the main obstacle is the availability of water.

There are areas in the Empty Quarter where enough underground water is available but the problem is the harsh climatic conditions and high production cost, Midbil said.

- Arrangements are under way in Hafr Al-Batin to organise the first national industries exhibition there, Secretary-General of the Eastern Province Chamber of Commerce and Industry Hamdan Al-Sereihi said recently. Sereihi said a large number of national factories had shown interest in participating in the exhibition, which is scheduled to start on February 28 and end on March 10.
- Saudi Arabia will celebrate the eradication of literacy after three years as the Education Ministry's 20-year plan predicts that the light of education would cover all citizens in the county by 1992.

Saad Abdul Wahid, director of education in Taif, highlighting the remarkable success of literacy campagins, said there is no need for opening new evening classes for adult education. In Taif alone 23,750 people are attending education clases, he said.

Vaccine tests show progress

A study being conducted by the faculty of medicine at King Abdul Aziz University to extract vaccines from camels to help victims suffering from snake and scorpion bites has achieved some progress.

Under the study, which is being conducted by a team headed by Dr. Abdul Karin Tilmisani in conjunction with King Abdul Aziz City for Science, and Technology, venomous reptiles are collected from the desert and hilly areas and then classified to determine the degree of the poision in each. A pharmacological study will follow to determine the type of poison most dangerous to the human nerves, heart or blood. Poisons extracted so far have been injected in camels, horses and goats to combat the venom of yellow scorpions, according to Al Madinah.

The study revealed that out of the fifty or so types of snakes known in the Kingdom, only eight were found to be poisonous but all types of scorpions were venomous.


• Twelve Qatari female trainees graduated recently from the Regional Training Centre after having attended a two-month typewriting course organised by the vocational training department of the Education Ministry.

Qatar's Minister of Public Works, Khalid bin Abdullah al-Attiyah has said a 10 km-long pilot drainage project designed to remove subterranean and flood water is more than 50 per cent complete, while a comprehensive study is under way to build an effective drainage network.

Al Attiyah, in a recent statement said the project, which extends from the Corniche to the old Rayyan district, will be completed within two years.

"Once completed, the project will assist in solving the rain and underground waters problem in several major

A source at the department said the ban was imposed in accordance with the cabinet decision No (30) for 1981 banning shrimp catching during the mentioned period which is considered a reproduction time for shrimps.

\$ 10,000 donated

Qatar's Red Crescent Society has decided to donate \$10,000 to boost the handicapped, orphans and productive families programme in Somalia which is supervised by the co-operative society in that country.

An official at the Qatar Red Crescent Society told QNA the QRCS in the past year has donated some \$1.715mn to humanitarian programmes in many countries to help in the wake of natural disasters. Donations were both in cash and in kind, he added.

The programme to be implemented in Somalia involves assistance to 24 orphans, their rehabilitation and appropriate living conditions for them as well as training the Somali women in economic and social domains.

Port expansion announced

Kuwait plans to expand its ports to cope with a projected increase in cargo traffic in the 1990s, an official was quoted as saying.

Abdul-Rahman Al-Nibari, assistant general manager of the General Ports Authority, recently said he expected an increase in cargo bound for Kuwait specially in containers.

He said this depended on two factorsa formal Iran-Iraq peace agreement and sufficient funding for the region's economies.

'The signing of a peace accord between Iran and Iraq would give the green light to shipowners that they will not face any attacks and will help to decrease insurance costs," he said.

No attacks have been reported on ships in the Arabian Gulf since Iran and Iraq ended eight years of fighting last August with a ceasefire. But talks on a lasting peace have made little progress.

Tower enters second phase of construction

The first phase of a \$90 million telecommunication tower has been completed and the second and last phase will be completed by the end of March, Kuwait Minister of Public Works Abdel Rahman Al Houti said.

Following an on-site inspection of the downtown facility recently, the minister said the 375-metre high tower is one of the world's unique towers and that it will be used not only by the Ministry of Communication but also by the ministries of interior and information.

A revolving restaurant is being built on the tower at an altitude of 170 metres, Al Houti said.

The minister referred to some difficulties facing the construction of this tower attributing them to the very nature of the project and the technicalities involved.

Asked about his reaction to the completion of the tower's first phase, Al Houti expressed satisfaction indicating that an accurate judgement on the work could not be passed unless and until the

Funds reinvested

At a seminar sponsored by the Kuwait Society for Agriculture Engineers recently, engineer Mohammad Abdel Rahman Al-Fayez said that 60 to 70 per cent of the returns from the agricultural sector are invested in the country's animal wealth, especially meat, poultry, eggs and dairy products.

An expert in nutrition from the General Authority for Agriculture and Fisheries, Dr Ibrahim Abdel Rahman told the seminar that animal wealth will remain the principal source of nutrition and economic wealth at both the national and regional levels.

He said that Kuwait is allocating large areas of land for fodder production and grazing.

• The Ministry of Public Health is in the process of granting Kuwaiti medical specialists, working in the Psychology and Mental Disorders Hospital, the right to open their own private practices.


The sources added that the ministry is finalising a study on this matter which includes conditions, sources of finance and proposed fees for the clinics. Many Kuwaiti physicians have already applied for permits to open such clinics.

• Director of the information department in the Kuwait Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Suleiman Al-Manais has said that the ruler of Sharjah, Sheikh Sultan Al-Qasimi has ordered that one of the Emirate's roundabouts on the main highway be officialy named the Kuwait Roundabout.

Al-Menais added that structures depicting the history and development of Kuwait will be erected on the round-about and a team of specialists will be sent here from Sharjah to discuss the details.

• The Director of the Kuwait Handicapped Society, Hashim Taqi has said that employers are legally bound to appoint handicapped persons and they must be allowed to contribute towards the development of society.

He pointed out that most handicapped people, particularily among the blind, are qualified hands holding posts graduate degrees and doctorates.

• Bahrain's local cement consumption this year is likely to exceed 410,000 tonnes, due to rising demand following improved business outlook in the reconstruction sector, according to officials at the National Imports and Export Company (NIECO).

They said the figure is the same as that of last year, marking a significant change in the total cement production in 1987 of 380,000 tonnes.

Mr. Abdul Ghaffar ruled out the feasibility of cement production on the island due to the lack of limestone which is the raw material for this industry. "This also applies to Kuwait which heavily relies on cement imports," he added.

Erika takes helm of automotive association

Erika Emmerich has been voted president of the Association for the Automobile Industry. She will be guiding the skills of one of the largest industrial associations in the Federal Republic of Germany.

Computers

In her view, the future belongs to the "intelligent car," which will keep in the right lane and maintain a safe distance from the car ahead with the help of computers. These cars will register obstacles ahead in good time and brake. Work is already in progress on such cars in German workshop. Accidents will not be entirely ruled out but they will be operated where they can operate the most advantageously, on motorways. For this reason Erika and the Bonn government are against speed limits on the motorways.

She is not alarmed either by the tough competition which will develop after the single European market in 1992, although German hourly wages for car workers at DM36.87 are on average the highest in the world, higher than the rate in Italy and Spain — not to mention Japan and Korea.

"Medium-sized and sophisticated cars 'Made in Germany' will maintain their markets domestically and abroad because they are technically tops," Erika said. She added it was important that the single European market did not shut itself off, but took on international competition. Then only such manufacturers will maintain that they are adequately able to meet the requirements of world markets."



Steve scores big with Waterbird

World Water-Ski Racing Champion Steve Moore is seen here at the International Boat Show in London prior to leaving for his pre-season training, during which he is to use the new "Waterbird" Ski Racing helmet, as he prepares to defend his British, European and

British and European Water-Ski Racing Champion since 1985, Steve is currently at the top of a sport which has rapidly grown following the impact of international competition and recogni-tion. Victories in America, Italy and Australia secured the World Cup title for Steve in 1986 and in late 1987 he became the new British Speed Racing record holder with an average speed of 87.98 mph (141 kph). Last February he led the British team to the World Championships in Australia where he swept the field to add the World Water-Ski Racing title to his list of honour.

Steve Moore has worked closely with the "Waterbird" designers in shaping and adapting the first British manufactured helmet specifically designed for ski-racers. Steve has not only given first hand advice on areas such as comfort and style but, more importantly, has also incorporated all the possible safety aspects a skier would require from the new helmet.

The new breed of helmet, made of strong laminated carbon fibreglass, offers the advantages of being light to wear but gives extra protection to the back of the head and temple areas. Fitted with a strong chin strap and available in a wide variety of colours, the helmet has been comprehensively tested and has met fully with British Safety Stan-

Smoke detector sends warning at early stage

A smoke-detector from Britain uses a photoelectric system to measure the amount of light scattered by smoke particles in the air.

'VESDA' (Very Early Smoke Detection Apparatus) from Fire Fighting Enterprises, differs from other smoke detectors by measuring the back-scatter of light from smoke particles rather than the transmission of light through smoke. This is said to make it far more sensitive than rival systems, and gives it the ability to sense smoke much earlier, and initiate alarm systems sooner.

percentage over a distance, is the unit used for smoke detection. The Vesda system can detect a smoke concentration as low as 0.01 per cent obscuration per metre. The smoke from a fire just starting is typically invisible to the eye and offers an obscuration factor of 0.1 per cent per metre: this is detectable by

Samples of air are continuously drawn through a detector within the Vesda control uit. Particles in the air sample are subjected to an intense light source within an optical chamber. Photons scattered off the molecules of air and particles of smoke are captured by a sensitive receiver. The resultant signals is amplified and processed to give a continuous readout of the smoke intensity. Several detectors can be mounted within one Vesda unit with air drawn from different sampling zones.

The system is claimed to be equally sensitive to smoke from wood and from plastics. It can be used anywhere but is thought to be particularly suitable for electrical or electronic installations, which often have ventilation systems and

The sensitivity of the Vesda unit is adjustable so that it may be used in atmospheres where there may already be some smoke. It offers three levels of alarm: 'staff alert'; 'fire alert'; and 'fire

A resilient wired float glass, offering high levels of security and fire resistance has been developed in Britain.

The 'Georgian' Wired Clear Laminated Float Glass, from Northern Wired Glass, is an electronically welded steelwire 13 mm (0.5 in) mesh sandwiched between two layers of float glass, with an interlayer providing a product with a nominal thickness of 7 mm (0.27 in).

Though ordinary wired glass will fracture quickly in fire conditions, the float glass offers greatly improved fire resistance. The resilience of the interlayer is capable of absorbing the differential expansion between the wire and the glass. Similarly, the weakness stemming from rusting wire is also absorbed by the interlayer.

If the glass is damaged, the wireembedded interlayer gives strength to the pane and prevents the ingress of wind and water through cracks.

The glass is available in most sizes in the small stock sheet range and it is also made in grey or bronze to allow more demanding solar requirements to be

A 'panic' bolt, which retracts automatically as the alarm is activated to allow emergency doors to swing open freely, has been developed.

The 'Mico' panic bolt, from Tindall Enginering in the UK, is thought to be the first to offer automatic retraction of the top and bottom shoots as an additional safety feature.

In the event of power failure the panic bolt is over-ridden by the failsafe manual system. This is activated by depressing the push plate extending across the face of the door and which is clearly engraved in green - 'push to open'.


The low-voltage solenoid-operated panic button may be flush-mounted on new or existing doors (solid or hollow section) with the mechanism fully concealed in an aluminium box section running the full height of the door, to reduce the risk of vandalism.

The bolt is available in a standard door size of 2,150 mm x 1,000 mm (84.5 in x 39.3 in) per leaf, which can be reduced on site to required length. Larger door sizes can also be supplied and individual colour and finish requirements can be

Indoor and external lighting, preprogrammed to deter burglars by giving an empty house the appearance of being occupied, has been developed in Britain.

The 'Safelight' system, from Bradcroft Systems, can be pre-programmed as many times as necessary to switch on and off as many lights as required. It looks and operates like a central-heating control panel, with a dual-circuit timing device (wire into the house lighting circuit to allow as many lights as needed).

As well as progressively lighting up the inside of the house, it can also be set to light up dark passages, garages and corners outside. Once set, the system operates from a minimum of 15-minute cycles up to 24 hours, and will repeat the pattern every 24 hours.

The cookies were so enjoyed that customers began asking for them regularly.



Honour for Lufthansa

German business travellers prefer Lufthansa to any other airline on flights to South East Asia. Lufthansa services are closest to meeting their requirements, according to two opinion polls conducted by the reputable Emnid Institute and GFK Market Research

The Emnid survey, commissioned by the "Profitravel" business magazine, asked which airline best tailored its services to business travellers' needs. Half the respondents named Lufthansa, while one in 20 opted for Swissair. The findings of the in-depth study are to be published in the next issue of the magazine in mid-February

Similar results emerged from the GFK Market Research poll, carried out for Spiegel-Verlag and the Manager Magazin publishing company of Germany. On international air trips, 76 per cent of the business travellers preferably booked flights with Lufthansa. British Airways was runner-up with 25 per cent.

The pollsters also asked for the preferred airline on individual routes. The rankings on the North Atlantic were: 1. Lufthansa (86 per cent), 2. Swissair (44 per cent), 3. Panam (32 per cent), 4. Air Canada (30 per cent), 5. KLM (29 per cent). The German carrier was also voted Number One on the Far East/ Australia route: 1. Lufthansa (72 per cent), 2. Swissair and Singapore Airlines (each 50 per cent), 3. Thai International (43 per cent), 4. Cathay Pacific (31 per cent), 5. KLM (30 per cent).

In their choice of airline, Germany's 1.3 million business travellers gave Lufthansa most marks for safety, reliability and punctuality. Other major criteria, according to the GFK poll, are speedy check-in, seat comfort and high flight frequency.







The gallery houses one of the largest art exhibitions, entitled "Eternal Oman", ever seen in the Gulf with more than 150 pictures by over fifteen professional artists on display.

Many of the artists are present at the Exhibition Centre to talk about their work, which are on sale with prices ranging from R/O 10 to over R/O 1,000 and discuss the possibilities for commissioned work. Tomorrow is the last day to catch the exhibition.

The exhibition has been the inspiration of Val Rwaan, from Manchester, who trained as a graphic designer at London University before embarking on a career as a professional artist and interior designer.

Her work has taken her to many countries throughout the Middle East, with her first visit to Oman back in 1973. Four years of invaluable experience as the resident artist and gallery director at the prestigious Falcon Fine Arts gallery in Riyadh, where she exhibited her paintings on silk, has helped her to produce the impressive 'Oman with Britain' gallery which she hopes will be regarded as 'reminiscent of the great galleries of Europe.'

Work by many Omani and British artists, most of whom are already well known in Oman are on display. They include Anwar bin Khamis bin Sonya whose work has been exhibited throughout the Middle East and Europe and who was awarded a trophy at the Grolla D'oro, Italy in 1986; Rabha bint Mahnood bin Mohammed who par-

ticipated in the 1st Cairo International Biennial in 1984; Hassan bin Edda bin Boroke who participated in the Seoul Contemporary Asian Art Show in 1986, Lal Bakash bin Ali bin Rehman who participated in the 2nd Cairo International Biennial and won the Second Class; Maryam bint Abdul Karim who was a prize winner at the 3rd Exhibition of AGCC in 1987, and other local artists who are members of the Youth Drawing Centre.

The British artists include Julian Barrow who trained as a picture restorer at the National Gallery in London before studying in Florence and having. exhibitions in London at the Royal Academy and the Royal Society of Portrait Painters, New York and throughout the Middle East, including Muscat in 1984 and 1987. In London, Julian is a neighbour of Wilfred Thesiger, another well known friend of the region.

John Bawtree's work is also familiar to the Sultanate, this will be his third exhibition in Oman. Having qualified as an architect at Kingston Polytechnic, London, John became a full-time artist and has travelled widely. His works at the Oman with Britain exhibition cover subjects as far ranging as the Casbah in Tangiers, Khartoum, Barcelona, the Orkneys, Corfu and Suffolk. For the last three years he has produced paintings for the Grindlays Bank Calendar of Oman.

Other artists are: Carol Lanfear who has a BA in three dimensional design from Manchester Polytechnic and a postgraduate certificate in Art Education from Manchester University; Lyn Shephard who studied at Cambridge University and has had works exhibited at the famous Whitechapel Art Gallery in London; Barry Parrett who says his work has been influenced by "the vibrant colours and haunting atmosphere of Oman's spectacular landscape," he too, has exhibited in England, the USA and the Middle East; Sara Parrett, an art teacher at the Sultan's School for one and a half years who prefers to use the coloured pencil as an ideal medium and her imagination to juxtapose different images and details; Barry Thomas whose work has taken him from the North East of England to Australia and now teaching in Oman, who prefers pastels and watercolour; David Webber who, after a short spell in Oman in 1979/80, returned in 1984 and since then has devoted much of his free time to painting, concentrating on landscape scenes in the watercolour medium; and Susan Ogilvy, a trained occupational therapist who claims "her work reflects her advancing years."

An enchanting part of the exhibition are the paintings in the 'trompe I'oeil' style, a French phrase meaning trick of the eye, with the trick being a painting which is life like and placed in a setting which suggests to the viewers mind a three dimensional object.

The collection of 31 pictures by four artists; Christopher Harris, Barbara Brown, Lian Corolain and Nick Jones, have been commissioned for display by Margaret Norris. Rover 800: a driver's car

In any range of cars, it is not sufficient for a motor manufacturer simply to establish a reputation for quality and reliability. Such a reputation must be maintained over a long period or its credibility will fail with the first change in design. Which is why Britain's Austin Rover invested heavily in its engineering and production facilities before producing its new 800 series.

Quality begins at the designs stage, and with Austin Rover's more than 330 computer aided design (CAD) workstations in use, the 800 has been given quite a few impressive features. These include an elegant body with a low drag factor; two new engines - a two-litre, four-cylinder, 16-valve version and a 2.5-litre Vsix cylinder, 24-valve one; a fully independent suspension system with impeccable road holding; disc brakes front (ventilated) and rear; a dual braking circuit; an anti-lock braking system; and a body protection system that should ensure the car maintains its good looks for longer than the company's six-year warranty.

The new two-litre, four-cylinder, M16 engine, which powers eight of the 14 models in the combined saloon and fastback 800 range, bears some resemblance to a racing engine, with its twin overhead camshafts, four valves per cylinder and lightweight alloy cylinder head. It is available with two forms of fuel injection, a single point on the 120 ps version and a multipoint Lucas system on the 140 ps version.

The latter has a solenoid injector for each of the four cylinders. Each is positioned above the inlet port and fuel is injected at pressure directly into the air streams. The major benefit is better performance and flexibility than with single point, each cylinder being directly supplied with the optimum mixture.

cency because of the barrel-type swirl of gases it induces.

Quietness has been a major design aim throughout. The double overhead camshafts operate the valves through hydraulic tappets rather than the conventional bucket types, and the tappets are therefore self-adjusting, so they operate with no clearance, substantially contributing to quietness. Again, the use of a toothed belt, made of oil resistant synthetic rubber moulded on to nonstretch cord for the camshaft drives, gives a significant reduction in valve operating noise.

Intake noise is reduced by being tuned as far away as possible from the resonant frequency of the car body. Air is passed over a special resonator and then through an intake duct half a metre in length, which is tuned to exactly half the wavelength of the car body (180 Hz).

Technology

The very latest technology is used in manufacture of the 800 series body, with the flexible automated assembly facilities located at the company's Cowley works, near Oxford. With some 400 individual panels, the 800 is the most complex car ever produced there.

Throughout the building system, more than 4,000 welds are applied, 45 per cent by automated equipment. Fiftyone of the 58 robots installed are used for welding, the remaining seven for adhesive application.

The fuel system is extremely responsive, due to a sophisticated combination of microprocessor. Both ignition and fuelling react to a number of sensors monitoring rate of throttle movement, road speed and so on. The information is used to determine precisely the engine timing, the fuel-air mixture, and the duration of opening of the solenoid injectors.

One of the most advanced sensors is the hot wire air flow metre, which uses a heated wire to measure air mass flow into the engine. Changes in the wire's resistance give an extremely precise measurement.

The use of four valves per cylinder provides a great valve opening area and this allows a large volume of mixture through the combustion chamber, giving high power output. It also permits the engines to be run on a very lean mixture because the fuel and air are more thoroughly mixed.

The 16-valve engine has a classic flow head, with two pairs of inlet and exhaust valves operated by double overhead campshafts, positioned either side of the cylinder head. The cross flow head is combined with a pent roof combustion chamber, giving high combustion effi-

The system, designed and manufactured by Automatix International (UK), is considered the most advanced in Europe, with 62 laser cameras carrying out 96 direct and computer checks on the body shell.

After inspection, the body is taken to a 17-station floor conveyor for completion of some spot and carbon dioxide welding and to a finishing line where doors, bonnets and boot lids are fitted. Margins, profiles and surface quality are critically checked before the body is transferred to the paint shop where a pair of GEC CompArm robots undercoat the body prior to final finishing.

The 800's suspension is fully independent. The front comprises double wishbones of unequal length, the rear is located transversely by lower arms and longitudinally by compliant trailing links. The transverse arms carry the coil springs, and the separate dampers are attached to the top of the wheel carrier. Anti-roll bars are fitted front and rear.

The design of the suspension ensures that the tyre makes good contact with the road under all conditions by controlling the angle of the wheel. In the front suspension, the shorter upper wishbone causes the outer wheel, which carries the

greater load, to lean inwards on corners, so that it remains at right angles to the road. The rear suspension performs similarly. It is the suspension rather than the dampers that carries the car's weight.

Six intensive anti-corrosion treatments and special protection for the two most vulnerable areas should permit the Rover 800 to maintain its appearance for many years. There is the seam sealing, using a Plastisol-based sealant, followed by a pre-primer phosphate treatment in seven stages that involve through cleaning and rustproofing.

The exhaust is aluminised, and the front wheel-arch is given smooth plastic liners

Every aspect of the 800 series benefits from the very latest technology, yet internally the cars are elegant and uncluttered. Advanced technology has been used to serve a simple purpose: to enhance the pleasures of driving a quality car on the open road.

Family fun in the UK

"What are we going to do today?" is a question which frequently plagues parents on holiday. What interests the adults may leave the youngsters dragging their feet and grumbling - but the older generation probably wants more than a daily diet of hair-raising amusement park rides.

A new British Tourist Authority brochure is designed to help solve this problem by outlining some of the many and varied opportunities for families to enjoy themselves in Britain

"Family Fun in Britain" gives details of 70 attractions particularly suited to children aged from four to 16, but which, in the main, can be enjoyed by anyone from two to 82. Listed alphabetically within England, Scotland and Wales - and ranged geographically from the Scottish Highlands to the West Country, and from West Wales to East Anglia - the entries include the age range for which they are bestsuited; opening times; whether there is an admission charge; directions for getting there; and important information such as whether there are rooms for nappy changing; children's menus; and play areas.

Also included in the brochure (printed in English only but available from all BTA overseas offices) is a list of some of the events in 1989 of interest to families - from an Easter Egg hunt at Leeds Castle, Kent, to the Royal Tournament in London; and from medieval jousting to "Halloween Horrors'

Action

In many cases the accent is on action, whether it be ascending the Heights of Abraham, 750 feet above the town of Matlock, Derbyshire, in a cable car, or descending 140 metres down one of the oldest mine shafts in Europe for a guided underground tour at the Yorkshire Mining Museum; riding a tractor on a farm tour in Sussex or travelling through stunning Welsh countryside on the Brecon Mountain or Talyllyn railways - and if anything can bridge the generation gap it is surely the nostalgic delights of these puffing steam locomotives.

Animals are always a big draw for youngsters and a number of zoos and wildlife parks are listed, including the Welsh Mountain Zoo with its daily displays of sealion feeding and training sessions, and free flying eagles; and Edinburgh Zoo, whose highlights include "the world's only penguin parade" every afternoon from March to October. Those wanting to explore this field further may like to visit London's Natural

History Museum - and find out for example whether whales can sing; and when the last dinosaur died.

Britain is famous for its fascinating historic houses and among the most impressive - and the first stately home to open regularly to the public - is Longleat in Wiltshire, home of the Marquess of Bath. This magnificent Elizabethan house also has something for children without the least interest in history or architecture - Britain's first safari park, home to lions, tigers, white rhino, camels, giraffe and many other ani-

Another fine stately home combining many different attractions is Beaulieu, home of Lord Montague in the New Forest near Southampton. Here, besides the Palace House and the 13th century Abbey there is the outstanding collection of vehicles which make up the National Motor Museum, and the chance to ride on "Wheels", a lively journey through motoring history.

The museums featured are designed to be both fun and informative. At the North of England Open Air at Beamish, near Durham, and the Blists Hill Open Air Museum at Ironbridge, in Shropshire, the past comes vividly to life. Streets have been reconstructed, lined with old houses, cottages, and shops filled with old-fashioned wares, and the "inhabitants" dress in period costume. At Beamish visitors can ride on old tramcars, while at Blists Hill -

one of six sites which make up the Ironbridge George Museum, commemorating the "birth of the industrial revolution" a couple of centuries ago - men can be seen at work in a printer's, carpenter's, candlemaker's and locksmith's shop.


At the Waterways Museum in Northamptonshire there are boat trips and canalside walks: at the Chatham Historic Dockyard in Kent (formerly the Royal Naval Dockyard) there are displays of ropemaking and trips on a paddlesteamer. The Submarine Museum in Gosport includes a guided tour of HMS Alliance, while Dorset's Tank Museum offers an adventure assault course, the chance to climb on a tank and examine its workings.

Parks

Such a guide would hardly be complete without a few theme parks and where better than Alton Towers, one of Europe's premier leisure parks set in the 550-acre estate of the former Earls of Shrewsbury in the English Midlands. It offers more than 120 rides (including the "Corkscrew" and the new "Alton Beast"), a Kiddies' Kingdom for the younger children, and magnificent gardens - all set against a backdrop of the ruined stately home which gives the park its name.

Travelling north, the Pleasure Beach at the Lancashire resort of Blackpool offers a further 150 rides, including "Britain's first bobsleigh ride, The Avalanche"; with "Funshineland" offering special rides for the very young.

That other typically British sea-



side institution, Butlin's Holiday Camp, has been given a multi-million pound revamp, and Butlin's Holiday Worlds at Bognor Rogis, Skegness, Pwllheli, Minehead, and Ayr - offering both inclusive holidays and daily admission - have subtropical waterworlds with giant water rides, rapids and lagoons; and rollercoaster and funfair rides.

More traditional children's attactions are offered at the newlyopened Teddy Bear Museum at Stratford-upon-Avon - hundreds of bears are on show; and the London Toy and Model Museum housing some 3,000 toys and models from the 18th century to today.

In the age of television, two museums are bound to please. The National Museum of Photography, Film and Television in Bradford, West Yorkshire (winner of the 1988 Museum of the Year Award) includes exhibits you can work yourself; IMAX, Britain's biggest cinema screen, five storeys high: and, from April the new Kodak Museum telling the story of popular photography - 1989 is the 150th anniversary of the birth of photography.

The highly-acclaimed new, Museum of the Moving Image on London's South Bank is also informative and fun, vividly telling the history of cinema. Visitors are encouraged to try the effects of some early optical machines, press buttons to choose what they want to see on screen, become a newsreader and even glide over London using the special effects which made Superman "fly".







Europen Ryder Cup captain Tony Jacklin, who has accepted an special invitation from Karl Litten Overseas to play in the £250,000 tournament, could find himself teeing off with a number of rising stars aiming for a place in his team to face the Americans at the Belfry in September.

Hoping to make a big impact in Dubai will be Peter Baker, Ronan Rafferty and Roger Chapman, three of the younger professionals. Jacklin has already tipped to make a strong challenge for a Ryder-Cup call-up.

Baker produced a brilliant suddendeath play-off victory over Nick Faldo in the Benson and Hedges International last year.





Britain expels top Iranian diplomat

Britain on Tuesday ordered Iran's top diplomat expelled from London in response to Ayatollah Khomeini's death threats against British author Salman Rushdie.

Foreign Secretary Sir Geoffrey Howe told Parliament: "The government has concluded that in our own particular case, it is neither possible nor sensible to conduct a normal relationship with Iran."

Meanwhile Secretary General Javier Perez De Cuellar appealed on Tuesday for the lifting of threats to the life and human rights of Rushdie and his associates while stressing the importance of respect for all people's religious beliefs.

Arabs shot

Israeli troops shot and wounded nine Arabs on Tuesday, the last day of a three-day strike in the Israeli-occupied territories, hospital

officials said.

They said troops wounded six Palestinian protesters in the West Bank town of Jenin and three, including an 11-year-old boy, in the Gaza Strip.

Torture reported

Amnesty International charged on Tuesday that many countries including China, Iran, Syria, and Somalia used torture.

Helena Cook, legal adviser of the international human rights organisation, told the U.N. Human Rights Commission that the risk of torture was greatest when detainees were held incommunicado.

Writer arrested

Israeli occupation authorities have jailed the head of the Palestinian Writers' Union for the second time since the start of a 14-monthold uprising in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, his family said on Tuesday.

Al-Muntawakel Taha, 30, surrendered to military headquarters in Ramallah, north of Jerusalem, on Monday after troops raided his home at the weekend and held his wife and brother-in-law to force him to give himself up, the sources said.

An Israeli security source said the writer had been ordered jailed without trial for six months under sweeping defence emergency regulations, but an army spokesman refused to confirm or deny the report.

Progress in talks

Salvadorean politicians said on Tuesday they have made progress in talks with leftist guerrillas who are offering to end the civil war if elections due in March are postponed to allow them to take

About 30 Salvadorean politicians representing parties across the political spectrum arrived in Mexico on Monday for an unprecedented meeting with leaders of the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front to discuss the guerrillas' offer to respect the elections if they were postponed to September 15.

Meeting postponed

The first meeting of a joint Iraq-Iran military working group due to discuss ways of consolidating a ceasefire in the Gulf War has been postponed, a U.N. spokesman said on Tuesday.

He gave no reason for the postponement of the meeting which should have taken place in a tented camp on the Iran-Iraq border on Wednesday.

Court appearance

Two members of black nationalist Winnie Mandela's bodyguard, the self-styled Mandela United Football Club, appeared in court on Tuesday charged with murdering 14-year-old Stompie Seipei.

Jerry Richardson, the bodyguard trainer, and another member of the club, Jabu Sithole, were remanded in custody until February 28, the South African Press Asso reported.

Flights were stopped last day after Sudanese SPLA started demanding more in tion about each flight.
