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















Salute in splendour

The Sultanate's Fifteenth National Day is being celebrated in splendour this week.



Oman-S. Yemen to exchange

Oman and South Yemen will exchange ambassadors within one month, Minister of Information Abdul Aziz bin Mohammed al Rowas said this week.

Mr Rowas said diplomatic relations between the Sultanate and the People's Democratic Republic of Yemen were existing and ambassadors would be submitting their credentials in "less than a month's time."

Mr Rowas was addressing a press conference on Tuesday attended by local, Arab and international journalists visiting the Sultanate to cover the 15th National Day celebrations.

He said, in response to a question, that Oman's decision to establish relations with the Soviet Union was made in the light of the Sultanate's supreme interests and was a pure Omani decision, and not a part of a coordinated AGCC plan.

He said it was too early to have a Soviet representative at the celebrations simply because there was no Ambassador to Muscat yet. As for Iran and Iraq, he clarified that they were represented by their embassies.

Commenting on the informal side meeting between some of the 61 leaders and representatives of countries attending the celebrations, Mr Rowas said it was natural to see them hold side meetings in Muscat.

He pointed out that His Majesty Sultan Qaboos believed that informal meetings could help immensely in solving the problems and pave the way for a useful and more positive formal meetings.

Referring to meetings held between His Majesty and both Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak and His Majesty

King Hussein of Jordan, particularly after the recent Palestinian declaration in Cairo, Mr Rowas said they were cordial and aimed at crystalising a collective Arab stand to put an end to sufferings of the Palestinian people.

Mr Rowas said His Majesty the Sultan and the people of Oman looked on Egypt as an "elder brother in the Arab family". Egypt's isolation caused a major imbalance within the Arab world and Oman has always been seeking to rectify the situation, he added.

Answering questions related to the Arab Gulf Cooperation Council, Mr Rowas said the proposed pipeline project to carry crude oil from AGCC Secretariat-General and no positive steps had been taken so far. However, he said Oman had no objection to "host" the pipeline.

He said there was no proposal to expand the AGCC to include all the countries in the Arabian peninsula as it would go against the AGCC statues.

Commenting on international terrorism he said the Government was willing to coordinate with any willing party to restrict the dangers of terrorism and eliminate its causes.

Regarding navigation in the Strati of Hormuz, Mr Rowas said it was governed by international laws and regulations, adding that he did not expect navigation to stop. If it does, he said, the matter would be considered with the AGCC framework and then with other parties concerned.

About the Soviet Union's participation in an international conference on the Palestinian issue, he said that any Arab or international effort that could lead to a just and honourable solution to the issue receive Oman's fullest support and backing.

On domestic issues, he said the third Five Year Plan would concentrate on education, health, communications and roads while stress would be placed on productive projects in agriculture, fisheries and industry.

Mr Rowas said the 55-member State Consultative Council had played a significant role in enriching the second Five Year Plan and the Council would be developed gradually to cope with Oman's development.

President Zia talks to 'Times'

The President of Pakistan, General Mohammad Zia-ul-Haq said on Tuesday that the Iraq-Iran war was not a matter of concern for the Gulf region alone but a problem of the whole Islamic bloc.

In an exclusive interview with the "Times" in his suite at Al Bustan Palace Hotel he said that in his meetings with His Majesty Sultan Qaboos, King Hussain, President Hosni Mubarak and other world leaders he told them that Pakistan which has very cordial relations with Iran was doing its best both at individual and collective levels to stop this devastating war which is causing great harm to the lives and resources of the two Muslim states.

President Zia who left Muscat for Islamabad on Wednesday after a three day visit for the 15th National Day celebrations said that his government's policy was to maintain peace and friendship with all its neighbours.

Pakistan, he said, enjoyed excellent relations with China and Iran. "With the Soviet Union we have hope good bilateral relations except differences on one issue and that is Afghanistan."

He said that Pakistan would not budge an inch from its stand on Afghanistan which call for the withdrawal of Russian troops the return of the refugees and restoration of the country's original status.

The President said his country wanted to make the Sub-continent a region of peace and fraternity." That's why we have gone out of our way to launch a peace offensive with India."

President Zia who had a friendly meeting with the Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi in Muscat expressed satisfaction with the progress made in the process of normalisation with India.

He said His Majesty has spoken very highly about the contribution of the Pakistani community to Oman's development. He urged members of this community to increase their efforts and good work to further promote goodwill, friendship and cooperation between the two countries.

President Zia thanked His Majesty for his kind patronage extended to the Pakistani community and its institutions in Oman.

He said the affection and special treatment meted out to him and his delegation was reflection of His Majesty's regard for the Pakistan Government and its people.

Cooperation between the two countries in various fields was increasing. They have already signed education and cultural cooperation agreements while cooperation agreements in the fields of education, information and economic affairs are being negotiated.

In reply to a question about the change in the medium of instruction in overseas Pakistan schools the President said the decision has been made to promote the national language and culture among the young generation.

The Government, he said, has introduced three languages in schools Arabic, Urdu and English.

• President Zia said he was extremely impressed by the standard of newspapers and magazines in Oman. He particularly praised the "Times" special National Day issue and requested the interviewer to convey his best wishes to the newspaper's management.

This has reflected our ardent desire to develop our joint experience on a firm basis, and to cement the ties between our peoples for the preservation of stability and for the realisation of our aspirations of

our welfare and prosperity.

As a result of our ardent concern for the stabilty of our region, and as a duty dictated by our religion and our obligations to our neighbours, we are continuing our strong support for all mediation efforts to end the Iraq-Iran war, which threatens the security and safety of navigation in the region, and which poses a dangerous threat to international peace. We deplore the loss of life and resources on both sides. We call once more on the leaders of both countries to stop this destructive war and to respond to the international attempts to bring about this end. Preparations must take place to negotiate in an Islamic spirit, to reach a permanent settlement guaranteeing the rights of both parties, and open a new era of friendly relations.

We have always adopted an objective and positive stand towards all Arab and international nitiatives towards reaching a just and comprehensive solution to the Middle East problem. We believe in dialogue as a means to realise peace in the region, based on international legalty in conformity with mutual commitment to the United Nations resolutions, its Charter's princioles and international laws.

It is vital to overcome the present stagnant situation, which is condusive to Israeli attempts to perpetuate the present situation. We support the Jordanian-Palestinian endeavours as all Arab and international endeavours to seek a perma-

nent and honourable peace. We call on all international forces, friendly to Israel, to accept their responsibilities and exert their full influence to put an end to Israeli intransigence, so as to provide an opportunity for positive progress towards reaching a solution which will restore the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people and guarantee justice and peace for all.

We have repeatedly warned against the danger of Arab differences which threaten the real interests of our nation, and call for unity of purpose and the substitution of harmony for dissension. In order to deal with these basic issues, we, today, reaffirm once more that there is no way for this nation to confront the dangers which face us except through a Pan-Arab solidarity which would restore its prestige and enable us to deal with international realities. We reaffirm our support for the positive work of the committees tasked by the Casablanca Conference, as well as for all serious efforts to clarify and eliminate differences. We are looking forward to the day when Arab solidarity will be strongly and comprehensively restored, with the will of God Almighty. We also aspire to strengthen the Islamic solidarity in order to reinforce the effectiveness of the efforts exerted to that end, so as to support the common causes, settle disputes and solve the problems from which the Islamic nation is suffering. As the role of the non-aligned community becomes stronger and more effective in a world torn by struggle, we praise the efforts made to strengthen this role, and urge positive response to these basic principles of the non-aligned movement. We also subscribe to unity of the member countries in defending their interests on the international level, and in their determination to avoid embroilment in the super power struggle.

At a time when world economic problems are becoming ever more complex, and particularly affecting the developing countries, we join in

supporting the appeal to establish a new international economic system on a more equitable basis, to create a balance between the needs of the developing countries and those of the industrially advanced countries, who, we believe, should now bear their responsibilities to assist in rectifying the economic imbalance caused by the wide gap between them and the developing countries of Asia, Africa and Latin America. We also believe that urgent attention should be given to the serious problems of drought and refugees which are increasing in many parts of the world.

During this year, the world has witnessed dangerous events and developments in various regions which emphasise the instability of the world situation, due to the increase of tension and conflict, and the escalation of violence and terrorism. We renew our appeal to the leaders of the world to work for the realisation of human aspirations towards an era of peace and cooperation. We once again demand that effective measures be taken to eliminate terrorism in all its forms. We also strongly adhere to the necessity for a sincere commitment to work wholeheartedly towards solving world problems, and eradicating tension and struggle by peaceful means.

The role played by the United Nations in solving political and economic problems is of profound importance, in a world of increasing struggle and challenges to the United Nations' Charter and its relevant resolutions. We call upon all the world nations to undertake their responsibilities in strengthening the role of the international organisation to render it more effective. We must do so in order to serve peace and stability and consolidate the cooperative relations between members of the international family for the benefit of the whole world's nations.

We emphasise the special responsibility of the two super powers for international peace and security. We hope that the forthcoming summit talks which will start tomorrow between the two leaders, Ronald Reagan and Mikhael Gorbachev, will commence an effective detente towards establishing just solutions to international issues which will alleviate the present intense international tension and call a halt to the arms race and remove the spectre of nuclear war. Turkish Embassy to open soon

A Turkish Embassy will be opened in Muscat on December 1, the "Times" was told this week by Turkey's State Minister for the Information Portfolio and External Affairs and spokesman for the Turkish Government, Mr. Mesut Yilmaz.

The Minister was in the Sultanate for the Fifteenth National Day celebrations.

He was accompanied by Turkey's non-resident Ambassador Mr Umut Arik who is based in Riyadh.

Mr Arik said that Turkey's first designated resident Ambassador to the Sultanate is Mr. Orhan Kulin who is director-General of Legal Affairs in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. He previously served at the United Nations in Geneva, Belgium and Greece.

Turkey is represented in Oman at the moment by Honorary Consul General Dr. Cengis Arcazoy.

Mr Arik said that his country hoped to boost trade with Oman. At present Turkey's exports to the Sultanate are valued at 1,500,000 US Dollars.

Admin centre opened in South

A RO 1.1 million administration centre was opened on Saturday at Taitam in the Southern Region.

Formally opening it, the Minister of State and Wali of Dhofar, Sayyid Hilal bin Saud bin Hareb, said the centre would act as a catalyst for the economic and social development of the region in general and of Taitam in particular.

Sayyid Hilal said it was a happy occasion for him to open the centre when the Sultanate was celebrating its 15th National Day.

The centre consists of Government offices, a mosque, police station, clinic, market and staff quarters.

The construction was completed in 20 months.

The opening ceremony was attended by the Deputy Wali of Dhofar, sheikhs and senior Government officials.

52 research projects

The Institute of Applied Research under the University of Petroleum and Minerals in Dhahran has completed 52 research projects, according to the annual report of the institute.

Nearly 30 research projects financed by Government departments and industrial establishments were taken up in 1984-85 compared with 23 the previous year.

Sixty-three papers prepared by the institute have been presented at various scientific conferences, the report added.

Praise for Unesco

The Secretary-General of the National Commission for Education, Culture and Science, Ali bin Salah al Mujeni, returned to Muscat after attending the 23rd session of the Unesco held in Sofia, Bulgaria.

In an interview Mr Mujeni said the outcome of the conference was "satisfactory" particularly the decisions concerning the world organisation's new programmes and the \$307 million budget for the next biennial period of 1986-87.

The new budget is 25 per cent less than the originally proposed one as a result of the US withdrawal and activities have been tailored accordingly, with stand-by programmes made dependent on additional contributions.

Commenting on the relationship between Oman and the Unesco, Mr Mujeni said: "I am happy about the enhanced

cooperation in the recent years, further heightened last year when Oman sent its permanent representative to the Unesco." (The Sultanate's representive currently in Paris, the organisation's headquarters, is Moosa bin Jaffar bin Hassan).

Finance and technical expertise from Unesco to various developmental projects in Oman has been forthcoming, Mr Mujeni said, adding that Omanis were being sent abroad from time to time for education and training through the world body.

Mr. Mujeni will leave next month for Tunis to attend a meeting of the executive board of the Arab League's Education, Culture and Science Organisation which will be followed by the eighth session of the ministerial conference of the 21-member body.

A booming year at Seeb Airport

Movements of aircraft, passengers and cargo have shown a big increase during 1984-85 at Seeb International Airport following a boost in airport facilities.

This is revealed in an annual report issued by the Directorate General of Civil Aviation of the Ministry of Communications.

The report has introductory notes by Salim bin Nasser al Busaidi, Minister of Communications and Sayyid Sami bin Hamoud al Busaidi, Under Secretary for Civil Aviation and Meteorological Affairs.

The general aircraft movement at the airport increased by 19 per cent; commercial passenger traffic 10.8 per cent; cargo traffic 28.6 per cent and mail 16.3

During the period 437,852 passengers were in direct transit through Seeb registering an increase of 13.3 per cent compared with the previous year

Of these Gulf Air carried 176,761 transit passengers, an increase of 21 per cent; British Airways 161,898 a decrease of 0.8 per cent and Air India 7,158, a decrease of 43.1 per cent.

All other airlines carried 92,035 transit passengers, an increase of 43.3

Gulf Air carried most of the arriving and departing passengers — 443,818 followed by Air India 128,365; PIA 53,599 and British Airways 49,848.

There was an increase of 30.76 per cent in international scheduled freight

'Danger can' warning to drivers

The PDO magazine "Al Fahal" has cautioned the public, particularly motorists not to leave air freshners in the

Quoting an accident where a can of air freshener exploded in a PDO employee's car, smashing the car's rear window into pieces, the journal said: "This was one danger not thought of while compiling the PDO's safety publication 'Drive and Survive"

A can of air freshner, carried on the rear window ledge of the car blasted the back window when it exploded after lying in the sun for several hours.

'The force of the explosion was so powerful that the can and some glass pieces were found hundred metres away," the journal said.

At Salalah Airport the total civil aviation aircraft movement rose by 9.6 per cent. The commercial passenger traffic increased by 47.8 per cent; freight traffic 47.8 per cent and mail traffic 63 per cent.

Expansion

The report says that the first phase of the Seeb Airport expansion projects completed recently involved the construction of a new hall for arriving passengers; expansion of the departure hall to double its size and the construction of a large transit hall.

The new arrival hall has a part allocated as a "welcome hall". Above the hall a large block of offices has been construction to provide offices for airlines operating in Muscat.

The expansion also involves the installation and operation of a flight information board on aircraft and construction of a large transit hall for departing pas-

The second phase of the Seeb terminal expansion project which is scheduled to be completed in the near future includes the construction of a new domestic terminal, a new public concourse, a fulllength roadside canopy together with extension of the terminal car parking

At Salalah Airport work has already started on the construction of a new passenger terminal embracing two arrival and departure halls.

With the completion of the terminal by April next year, Salalah Airport will be able to accommodate 500 passengers

Under the expansion plans the extension of the Muscat Flight Information Region has been carried out in accordance with the decision of the International Civil Aviation Organisation. The Muscat Area Control Centre has proved its ability to provide the highest standards of air traffic services.



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

The UAE

• The UAE and China this week signed the first technical, economic and trade co-operation agreement between the two countries. Sheikh Hamdan bin Mohammed, UAE Deputy Prime Minister and the visiting Chinese Deputy Prime Minister Yao Yilin signed the agreement for their respective countries.

- The 17th World Parachute Jumping Championships open in Abu Dhabi on November 28. The championships continue until December 5, Major-General Mohammed Saeed al Badi, the Chief of Staff of the Armed Forces said.
- Two Unesco experts are to arrive in Dubai on November 26 at the invitation of the UAE Ministry of Education. They will assist in the preparation of a study on the national curriculum and an adult education programme.
- Some 265 families in the UAE's Western Region will receive a total of Dh 698,680 as social security payment for the months of October and November, according to an announcement made in Zayed City.

Saudi marine science faculty being expanded

The Faculty of Marine Science at King Abdul Aziz University is being expanded to add a fish farm and departments of fisheries and marine maps, the Dean Dr. Mohammed Musa al-Amoudi, told 'Arab News'.

The faculty now has departments for marine biology, marine chemistry, marine geology and marine physics. The faculty, the first one of its kind on the Red Sea coast and in the Middle East, also boasts of some of the most modern equipment available in the world.

Since its inception in 1979, the faculty has produced 71 graduates who are now engaged in activities

related to their fields of specialisation. Most of them, the Dean said, are employed by the Ministry of Agriculture and Water and the Meterological and Environmental Protection Administration.

The faculty developmed from a marine section started at the Faculty of Science in 1975. The section gradually grew into an institute of marine science and by 1979 the facilities available were adequate to turn the institute into a faculty.

Situated on the Abhur Coast of the Red Sea, the faculty provides ideal atmosphere to study the secrets of the sea.



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

Conference on King Abdul Aziz



An international conference on King Abdul Aziz, the founder of Saudi Arabia, will be held in Riyadh from November 23 to 28. The conference is being organised by Imam Muhammad ibn Saud Islamic University

King Abdul Aziz, who started his struggle in 1902 to gain control over the country, succeeded in uniting different areas under its present name in 1932.

Participants at the conference will be from King Saud University in Riyadh, King Abdul Aziz University in Jeddah, Umm Ul-Qura University in Makkah, the Arab Historians' Union, the Ministry of Education and the Riyadh Archives.

An information campaign on King Abdul Aziz will be launched simultaneously with the conference and will include television interviews with historians, radio programmes and publication of booklets.

'Greening of Makkah' plan

The Makkah Development and Planning Bureau, in co-ordination with the city Municipality, is studying the possibility of turning the mountains of the Holy City green by plantation and landscaping. The methods include the construction of 'greenways', children's parks and other utilities.

The bureau will draw up a comprehensive plan for the construction of tunnels, public utilities and new bridges. A plan for plantations in Arafat is already under implementation.

Saudi banking

The Saudi Arabian Monetary Agency has reported that the assets of the Kingdom's 11 commercial banks grew at a barely perceptible clip of 0.2 per cent during the second half of the fiscal year, ending July 7, 1985.

According to statistics compiled by the central banking authroity total assets rose from SR 155.56 billion to SR 155.81 billion during the second half.

• The oil export capacity of Saudi Arabia's east-west pipeline to the Red Sea will be boosted early next year by 40 to 50 barrels per day, the Governor of Petroleum said. The pipeline was constructed three years ago to link Saudi production sites on the Gulf with giant Red Sea terminal at Yanbu.

Dammam port

King Abdul Aziz Seaport in Dammam, equipped to receive transocean cruise liners, now has 39 wharves operating according to international standard, the Port Director Mohammed Ali Nasser al-Ghaithi, said.

He said the port is considered one of the cleanest in the world - because of the great attention paid to landscaping and beautification programmes.

The port has automatic fire-fighting facilities and accurate naval guidance systems.

Arab Centre for Medical Documents, Publications

The Board of Trustees of the Arab Centre for Medical Documents and Publications in Kuwait has called for publicising the activities of the centre.

At the end of a two-day meeting recently, the committee, headed by the Minister of Public Health and Planning and Head of the Executive Bureau of Health Ministers Dr. Abdul Rahman al Awadi said it had been agreed to translate and publish the World Health Organisation magazine from January 1986.

The Board agreed on the need of setting up a library and a documentation centre and discussed the budget of the centre for the coming year.

The board also discussed issues relating to a medical encyclopaedia and medical dictionaries which the centre is going to publish.

Dr. Awadi said Kuwait had allotted a budget for the construction of a perma-

nent headquarters for the centre - as part of the country's five-year plan.

The centre is now working on a programme for the Arabisation of medical text books and also co-ordinating with foreign doctors to prepare a seven-language dictionary on psychology and other neural sciences.

Work on the dictionary in Arabic, French, English, Italian, German, Portuguese and Spanish started seven years ago, he said.



Bahrain

- Bahrain's Crown Prince and Commander-in-Chief Sheikh Hamad bin Isa al-Khalifa, last week received the visiting Saudi Prince Sultan ibn Abdul Aziz, the first Arab astronaut.
- The President of Bahrain's General Organisation for Youth and Sport, Sheikh Isa bin Mohammed al Khalifa, has returned home after a successful visit to South Korea and Japan.
- The Bahrain Telecommunications Company has announced that Bureaufax services are now available from the island to Turkey and Seychelles. The Bureaufax, which uses the international telephone network to send

documents and urgent written messages to faraway places, is now available to 24 countries, including most of the AGCC states, the UK, the US, Japan and Europe.

- Assets of Bahrain's 75 offshore banks rose slightly in September, but remained near their lowest levels since early 1982, the Bahrain Monetary Agency said on Saturday. The agency said total assets rose by \$79 million in September to \$55.45 billion.
- The US Defence Department said on Saturday it intends to sell Bahrain 54 M-60A3 tanks and associated equipment, spare parts, ammunition and training for about \$90 million.
- A scientific course on 'Evaluation of Government Bodies' in the Arab world as ended, a Bahrain report said.

Kuwait streamlining its civil service

Kuwait is trying to streamline its bureaucracy and boost government efficiency.

One in every 10 people is employed by the Government and an opposition member of the National Asssembly says that civil servants on average work only 56 minutes in a six hour day.

The efficiency drive is the latest in a series of measures taken by the country to cope with the oil market trends and comes amid calls for greater 'Kuwaitisation' of the workforce.

Inevitably it affects the job prospects for the foreigners, now making up 60 per cent of Kuwait's population.

His Highness the Crown Prince and Prime Minister Sheikh Saad says a special task force entrusted with mapping out reforms will soon submit a blueprint for action after year-long study.

Official 1984 statistics show the civil service employing 159,364 people — 28 per cent of the country's workforce and 9.5 per cent of its population.

The number of civil servants in most other countries does not exceed three per cent of the population, observed the Kuwait News Agency in a labour survey last February.

His Highness the Emir appointed the Prime Minister in October 1984 to head a supreme council to look into reforms.

The council, including other ministers, academics and public officials, was told to review civil service manpower needs and seeks ways to boost productivity.

A member of the Royal Family immediately called for removal of incompetent, senior officials as a start to reform.

"Some top officials are not fit for the posts they hold. We should weed them out," said Sheikh Ibrahim Duaij Al Sabah, chief of the Public Authority for Agriculture and Fisheries.

The National Assembly made equally sharp criticism of the bureaucratic overmanning and alleged corruption.

Deputy Sami Al Munayes protested that surveys showed civil servants on average actually worked only 56 minutes each six-hour day yet their salaries would swallow 25 per cent (\$2.6 billion) of the 1985-86 budget.

Kuwaitis, who enjoy one of the highest incomes per capita in the world, make up just 18.6 per cent of the country's workforce—and the majority work for the government.

A heavy influx of foreign workers during the oil boom of the 1970s brought in large numbers of Palestinians, Egyptians, Iraqis, Iranians and Asians.

The National Assembly is now pressing for faster 'Kuwaitisation' of major sectors of the workforce, such as the civil service in which Arab expatriates play a big role.

A five-year social and economic development plan unveiled earlier this year gives priority to developing the role of nationals in the economy and gradually restoring an even population balance between nations and foreigners.

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
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British scholarships for Oman

UK FIRMS SET UP FUND TO HELP TALENTED OMANIS

The British Embassy in Muscat has announced the launching of a 'British Scholarships for Oman' scheme - to be funded entirely by the British commercial community in the country. The announcement co-incides with the Fifteenth National Day.

The strong links which Great Britain has with Oman has seen the creation of several Government-to Government aid programmes in traditional areas like agriculture, education, health and vocational training "but this is the first time that British companies are taking the initiative to directly aid the country through scholarships," an embassy spokesman said.

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Germany brings a milestone for Ford

Ford of Germany is celebrating an anniversary. Sixty years ago, businessman George Carlson plenipotentiary of Henry Ford - had "Ford Motor Company Akteingesellschaft" entered in the trade register of the city of Berlin.

Share capital totalled five million Reichsmarks. This was the start of what today is the "Ford-Werke AG", a firm with some 47,000 employees which builds around 800,000 motor vehicles per year, making it the third largest automobile manufacturer in the Federal Republic of Germany.

To mark the anniversary, the Cologne plant is presenting a completely new range of models after a full programme of renewal carried out over a period of only a few years.

The key features are outstanding design and technology. One of the highpoints came last spring with the launching of the Ford Scorpio which, for the first time, incorporates a fully electronic, integrated ABS anti-block braking system, which is standard for the basic model up.

At the begining of 1926, the workforce of the newly founded company totalled 37. On the 8th of April that year, the first Model T Ford assembled in Germany left the production

Business flourished for the Ford company from its Berlin assembly line. By August of 1927, nearly 9,000 Model Ts had been put together there and the Model A, which came next, proved a hit.

About 100 Ford workers put together 60 automobiles a day, coming close to the maximum capacity of the Berlin plant.

After protracted consultations, the board of directors decided to look around for a site for a new factory.

When this became known, a tough battle began between several German cities keen to attract the new factory. At one stage, Neuss looked like winning.

But this was not to be - thanks to Cologne's mayor, the man later to become the Federal German Chancellor, Konrad Adenauer.



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What's new?

Putting on lean look

Leaner animal meat and a cure for obesity in humans could be the result of a new antibody developed in Scot-

The antibody breaks down body fats in animals and was discovered by researchers at the Hannah Research Institute while trying to find out how farm animals get fatter when they are pergnant but lose fat when in milk.

"We soon realised the wider implications for farmers trying to produce leaner meat," says research team leader Dr David Flint. "The whole agricultural and food industry is moving to production of food with less fat to meet consumer demand and this is where our new technology should

"The treatment works by attacking the fat cells in the body. After one injection fat simply breaks down. And so far our research shows that growing animals lay down even more protein than they do normally, which is an even greater benefit to the farmer."

Already the Hannah Institute researchers are working with colleagues in other laboratories in Britain to assess the potential use in different farm animals. And patents are being taken out to protect the benefits the new antibody could realise.

Hannah Institute's Director, Professor Malcolm Peaker, says, "We are on the threshold of major new development to modify farm animal performance and to do it humanely.

The human applications of the new antibody are at an early stage but Professor Peaker is hopeful it will prove a great help. "The day when we can prevent obesity by a simple injection suddenly seems nearer," he says.

Surgeons give their long-range verdict

More than 150 radiologists in conference in Brisbane, Australia, have seen the first live long-range transmission of brain, chest and lumber spine pictures from Britain more than 20,000 kilometres away.

The quality of the pictures sent over public telephone line from Frenchay Hospital in Bristol, south-west England, were so good that Senior Radiologists Professor Haram Baddeley in Brisbane was able to make correct diagnoses of the three test scans, which were from patients in the Frenchay Hospital, for treatment that morning.

The scan pictures were sent using British Telecom's Imtran unit. This is a portable all-in-one microprocessor transceiver unit, housed in a briefcasesized container.

The system uses a slow scan television technique to transmit detailed pictures through the normal telephone system to domestic television screens

"This successful transmission means that surgeons and others can give a second opinion or diagnosis from anywhere in the world, provided they have Imtran," said Frenchay's senior consultant neurosurgeon Huw Griffith, who was involved in the development of the system. "Patients need not be moved, with obvious advantages.'

The Imtran unit, now available commercially, has other applications. It can be used to transmit black and white images from a wide variety of situations on site, via the telephone network, to wherever the expert who can interpret the picture may be..

It could, for example, be used to transmit pictures from inside an aero engine direct to the manufacturer to diagnose faults or pin-point the cause of a failure.

British Telecom is currently negotiating the sale of Imtran units to Australia and the United States.

Speeding up micro-chip production

A technique for speeding-up the production of micro-chips is being developed by scientists of Hull University in northern England.

The researchers believe their new discoveries will also have relevance to the development of laser microsurgery.

They are using excimer lasers to remove the thin polymer film which is applied to a silicon wafer, and then exposed to low power ultraviolet light through a stencil.

The process is far quicker than the traditional method of removing the film by wet chemical development, and the short wavelengths used mean the excimer laser allows small and intricate patterns to be produced.

Dr Peter Dyer, a senior lecturer in the Department of Applied Physics, and Dr Geoffrey Oldershaw, senior lecturer in the Department of Chemistry, are now testing their new technique, measuring the resolution limits to ensure the accuracy of the etching process.

GLORIA makes a big Filling in techniques discovery in the deep

New technology for serveying the ocean floor is to be made available world-wide as a result of an agreement signed in Britain.

The British developers believe it could mark the start of a new industry seeking to exploit the detailed information it will extract from the world's deeper waters.

Under the technology transfer agreement the Marconi group will build and operate the surveying sonar system known as GLORIA - Geological Long Range Inclined Asdic - which has won praise for its survey work around the American coast.

GLORIA was developed by the UK Institute of Oceanographic Sciences (IOS) for its exclusive use and is engaged currently on work for the US Geological Survey as part of a six-year agreement to survey the entire 12.9 million square kilometres of the US Exclusive Economic Zone.

In a survey last year, GLORIA covered nearly 650,000 square kilometres in three months off the US west coast and discovered over 100 previously unknown underwater moun-

A recent find with it was a cataclysmic landslide which would have toppled rigs or destroyed pipelines and cables if they had been in the area.

World-wide interest in the work has led IOS to loosen its monopoly on the £1 million GLORIA system and to seek a partnership with industry to exploit its commercial potential.

Marconi's underwater systems company will now build its own GLORIA system and establish a worldwide commercial surveying service with it.

It expects the service to have a turnover of £5 million a year or more as countries look for help in exploring the deeper waters for such things as hydrocarbons and minerals.

Although it will initially be involved in training others to use GLORIA, IOS expects its role to be gradually reduced to one of consultancy as Marconi's activity with it gains momentum and achieves operational independence.

GLORIA is a side-scan sonar that can be towed at eight knots or more to map a swathe 60 kilometres across, giving cover of over 20,000 square kilometres a

It produces what is in effect a map of the seabed. A pulse of sound is emitted in a narrow beam at right angles to the towing ship's track.

This is reflected from seabed irregularities and the echo is recorded to produce a line on a map which is built up from successive pulses as the ship moves forward.

New techniques in dental care have just undergone a successful three-year test and research programme in Britain.

pass test

The work has been carried out at Newcastle University in north-east England where Professor John Murray, a specialist in paediatric dentistry, explained the shortcomings of present techniques.

He said cavities were normally filled with a silver amalgam substance but after a time it allowed decay to reemerge around the edges. Additionally, healthy tooth tissue had to be removed to anchor the filling in place.

Scientists have now developed two new procedures using different materials. In each method, decay is removed but healthy tooth tissue is hardly touched.

Permanent

One procedure, which is suitable for children, involves coating teeth with glass ionomer cement which chemically bonds to the tooth. The other method, designed for permanent teeth, utilises a composite restorative filling material and an acid etching process.

Professor Murray said: "The new fillings appear to last as long as the silver amalgam fillings. And they also have many other benefits.'

The University's work will continue for another three years, through further financing from the UK Medical Research Council.

Thanks for the memory

Scientists now believe that within ten years they can develop a drug which would restore memory by relieving senile dementia -said to be one of the world's biggest social and medical challenges.

News of the latest developments in the memory drug research at UK laboratories was given recently at a pharmaceutical conference in London by Dr Leslie Iverson, one of the world's leading neuroscientists.

Dr Iverson, head of the neuroscience research centre of the pharmaceutical manufacturer, Merck,

Sharp and Dohme in Harlow, near London, told the conference: "A modest improvement in brain function would allow many people to live home instead institutionised. The prospects of symptomatic relief of senile dementia being available by 1995 are good."

A former director of Britain's Medical Research Council Neuro-chemical Pharmacology Unit, in Cambridge, Dr Iverson and his team have been cooperating with Cambidge University scientists in a study of dementia in the elderly.

The WWF hopes to raise £4 million initially for a worldwide conservation programme and to alert the public to the environmental damage caused by poorly planned drainage, dam construction and pollution.

Wetlands are ecosystems where land and water meet. They include marshes, mangroves, shallow coastal estuaries, coral reefs, swamps, peat bogs and fenlands. They play an important role in flood and erosion control and provide water during droughts.

Wetlands can produce up to eight times as much plant material as a cultivated field, and two thirds of the world's fish harvest consists of species which spend their nursery and growing periods in estuaries.


Over 40 countries have ratified the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands of International Importance, setting aside 322 wetlands covering a total of 20 million hectares.


Commenting on the campaign, Sir Peter Scott, founder of the Wildfowl Trust, Slimbridge, and chairman of the World Wildlife Fund International Council said: "All over the wrold, wetlands are disappearing. It is important to educate people to understand their value, from schoolchildren to adults and particularly the leaders of countries who have to make vital decisions.".


Money raised will aid conservation programmes such as planned multiple use of the seasonally-flooded inner deltas of the Niger River, Mali, which can become a rich source for maintaining life in the Sahel; training protected area managers in the vast Pantanal wetland of Brazil's Mato Grosso region reducing the threats of industrial pollution, largescale drainage and filling in the Wadden Sea, Europe's largest coastal wetland, bordered by Denmark, Federal Germany and the Netherlands; and helping to preserve the freshwater marshes of Lake Poyang, China, used by millions of waterbirds.







The stamps are in the denominations of 250, 200, 100, 50 and 20 baizas. Five thousand stamps of each value have been printed.


The Department has also issued a brown card, besides the 'first day covers' - with the five stamps and some impressive designs.


Majesty's Personal Representative Sayyid Thuwainy bin Shihab.







In the 30,000 capacity stadium every seat was taken while the entire length of one end was occupied by students.

The opening display formed words of a greeting saying: 'His Majesty, the youth of Oman congratulate you on the 15th National Day'.


A gymnastic display featuring trampoline and springboard exercises, were demonstrated.














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'Magic' from Bangladesh

The Under Secretary at the Ministry of National Heritage and Culture, Malallah bin Ali bin Habib, was the guest of honour at a recent evening of Bangladeshi folklore dancing.

The event, which attracted a large number of dignitaries and other guests, was held in the garden of the Medinat Qaboos residence of Mr Amjadul Huq, Charge d'Affairs of the Bangladesh Embassy and was staged as part of the Sultanate's 15th National Day celebrations.

At the start of the evening, Mr Habib spoke on the importance of cultural links between the Sultanate and Bangladesh, "Let us hope that this cultural exchange will be a step towards further cementing bilateral relations between the two countries".

On behalf of the Ministry of National Heritage and Culture Mr Habib thanked the Bangladesh Cultural Association for making it possible for the Bangladesh troupe to participate in the National Day celebrations.

The Bangladesh Folklore Dance Troupe consists of 14 young men and women who received systematic training at the Balbul Academy of Fine Arts in Dhakae.

The Academy was set up in 1955 to provide an impetus for study and research and to put together scattered artistic works from throughout the country.

The troupe presented a wide selection of colourful and evocative dances, each dancer having absolutely perfected intricate head, finger and foot movements which take years of patient study to learn.

Bangladesh folk dances are very much a reflection of the life-style, drawn directly from activities such as the sowing of seeds, harvesting and fishing.

Tribal dances of the hill and mountainous regions are much more stylised, the accompanying form of music being ritually preserved and classical movements find their roots in the ancient cultural heritage of the sub-continent.

The programme began with the 'Monipuri dance', an example of what is probably one of the oldest forms of classical dancing in the sub-continent. It has a flow and grace which is not only unique but which contrasts sharply with other forms of classical dance.

This was followed by the 'Dhole dance' and then a 'Naga Tribal Dance' depicting the vigour, energy, love, hatred and danger faced by hill and mountain dwellers in their everyday lives. The brilliantly coloured apparel of the dancers reflecting cherished expectations and a passionate rapport with their fight for survival.

The audience was completely transfixed by a bewitching performance of 'Megh O Surja - The Clouds and the Sun dance'.

Composed on a semi-classical format, the dance depicts the struggle of human beings against the vagaries of nature, conveying the message that however gloomy and cloudy life appears there is always the hope that sunshine and happiness will break through.



Gypsy dance

The 'Snake Charmer Dance', portraying in detail the rituals of this dangerous means of livliehood was an absolute masterpiece of dance and rhythm, as were both the 'Fishermen's dance' and the wildly ecstatic 'Gypsy dance'.

The first programme of dance pieces concluded with a modern item, the 'Liberation Dance', a stirring composition depicting various aspects of Bangladesh's War of Liberation in 1971.

The dance numbers were


interspersed with a number of folk and modern songs sung by Nadira Begum and Shabnam Mustari, both of whom sang not only in their native Bengali but also in well rehearsed Arabic, — which proved extremely popular with all members of the audience.

The evening of sheer Bangladeshi magic drew to a final close with the entire dance troupe participating in a Dance Drama, 'Nakshi Kanther Math' - 'The Embroidered Quilt', written by a famous folk poet from Bangladesh, Jasimuddin.



PAM MORRIS CONTINUES HER INVESTIGATION OF THE UNEXPLAINED.

"Alien beings from a distant galaxy have been visiting the earth for at least 10,000 years and continue to 'drop in' on a regular basis". Unproven speculation - or is it?

Well over 750,000,000 people claim to have spotted various versions of 'flying saucers' and some even claim to have been kidnapped by extra-terrestrials, experimented on them later released.

Can so many people be wrong? Scientifically—labelled 'Unidentified Flying Objects' they have been observed in numerous world-wide locations.

Countless research projects, utilising the best technical equipment available, magnetometers, gravimeters, lasers and computer-enhanced photographic techniques have all been used in attempts to establish that U.F.Os are more than the holographic thought projections often suggested.

Masses of 'evidence' has been microscopically disected and rigorously analysed by scientists and astronomers working in space-age laboratories in almost every corner of the world.

The ratio of believers to unbelievers continues to rise but, on the whole, authorities stubbornly withhold concise

information and decisive opinions which, if given and proved positive, could lead to a wave of unparalleled terror among the general populace.

Reports relating to U.F.O.s and visitors from outer space are nothing new and, (here is where discrepancy arises) are claimed by some to have been faithfully recorded by ancient Egyptian, South American and Babylonian people, by the African Dogon tribe and even in the Old Testament.

'Whirlwind'

The Old Testament records that while the prophet Ezekiel was by the River Chebar in Mesopotamia: "Behold, a whirlwind came out of the north, a great cloud, and a fire unfolding itself, and a brightness was about it, and out of the mist thereof as the colour of amber, out of the midst of the fire."

"Also out of the midst thereof came the likeness of four living creatures. And this was their appearance; they had the likeness of a man. And their feet were straight feet; and the sole of their feet was like the sole of a calf's foot and they sparkled like the colour of burnished brace."

This is but one of the five mentions of Ezekiel's 'visions' in the Old Testament.

Ezekiel himself thought he was experiencing dream-like 'visions of God' in an ecstatic moment but numerous people since then consider that the vision describes the arrival of a spaceship with extra-terrestrial occupants.

It has been suggested time and time again that spacemen made vast contributions to rapid technical and cultural advancements in ancient South and Middle American nations.

The 'Nazca lines', in the desert outside the present day town of Nazca in Peru, have been widely acclaimed as an improvised airfield for space craft operating in the vicinity of the earth.

Archaeologically dated somewhere between 300 B.C. and 900 A.D. the Nazea lines are said to be lengthy runways, decorated by adjacent drawings of huge animals, birds and various mythological creatures, to attract the 'space gods' to return.

Drawings

These magnificently accurate drawings on a monumental scale can only be observed from the air and the question as to how, and, more to the point, why they were so carefully constructed remains unaswered.

The Nazca lines themselves stretch for many kilometres and one tends to wonder at the kind of spacecraft requiring runways of such a staggering length, certainly they could bear no relation to the present conception of a spaceship or rocket.

Other South American examples often cited as evidence of space travelling visitors include Olmec sculptures in Mexico, dated approximately 1500 to 800 B.C., of beautifully helmeted giant skulls; the Palenque astronaut, also in Mexico and dated approximately 683 A.D., said to depict a man sitting at the complicated controls of something resembling a space rocket and Tiahuanco, approximately 800 A.D. located on the islands and shores of Lake Titicaca on the border of Bolivia and Peru, where a futuristic culture flourished briefly, then mysteriously and very abruptly disappeared.

Generally less well known, and pro-

viding an even more unquestionably remarkable example of unexplained astronomical knowledge among primitive peoples, are the beliefs of the Dogon tribe living in Mali, south of the Sahara desert.

The Dogons have accurate details about a small star, totally invisible to the human eye, that orbits Sirius, the brightest star in the sky.

They know it is very heavy, it has an elliptical orbit, and the position of Sirius within the orbit.

Astonishing

Details apart, it is astonishing that they know about it all, for they could not have been told by explorers - its existence was not suspected by Western astronomers until the middle of the 19th Century, and it was not photographed, faint as it is compared with Sirius, until 1970.

Yet this star, called Sirius B by modern astronomers, has formed the basis of the most sacred Dogon beliefs since antiquity.

So how could they have learned so much about it?

There seem only two concievable possibilities: Either they used some form of divination or distant viewing, as in psychic experiments currently being conducted; or, as the Dogons themselves profoundly believe, visitors from a planet attached to Sirius B landed on Earth and passed on the knowledge themselves.

The Dogon call their visitors 'Nommos', who have to live in water.

They are said to have arrived in an ark and drawings in the dust portray 'the spinning or whirring of the descent of the ark.'

They describe the noise of thunder that it made and a whirlwind of dust caused by the violence of its impact with the ground.

Other Dogon 'legends' tell of 'spurting blood' from the ark, which may refer to its rocket exhaust.

The Dogon also seem to make a distinction between the ark that actually landed on earth and a star-like object in the sky that may represent the main inter-stellar spaceship or mother-ship.

The Dogon originated in Libya and research in this area has drawn

undoubted parallels between the Dogon 'Nommo' and the amphibian god of Babylon, 'Oannes', a superior being who, with his companions, was said to have taught the Sumerians mathematics, astronomy, agriculture, social and political organisation and written language.

'Oannes' has been described closely in surviving fragments of Babylonian history. 'The whole body of the animal was like that of a fish; and it had under a fish's head another head, and also feet below, similar to those of a man, subjoined to the fish's tail. His voice, too, and language, were articulate and human'.

Is this a description of an extra-terrestrial being who visited earth and shared his profound knowledge and wisdom with ancient peoples or a fantastic, mythological figment of historical imagination?

All these so called legends would appear to be based on fact somewhere but where exactly the line can be drawn is undefinable.

In more recent times the subject has been one not so much of actual spacemen landing on earth but of flying saucers and other unexplained aerial phenomena.

Comprehensive records of U.F.O. sighting were compiled during the 19th Century, with observations being made by reputable astronomers such as those working from Greenwich Observatory.

On November 17, 1882 a vast green disc with a mottled appearance was observed from Greenwich and later reported to have been spotted in various European locations.

Also in the London vicinity a 'spherical craft' was seen rising vertically through the clouds on March 19, 1847.

Discs

Reports of 'luminous discs', 'torpedoshaped objects', 'glowing circular objects', 'spinning aerial wheels' and 'bright spherical craft emitting lowpitched whining sounds' were legion then as now.

With over 20 per cent of the worlds' population admitting to having seen 'something', and numerous others having kept their observations to themselves for fear of ridicule, it would appear that there is definitely something 'up there'.

Are the occupants of these present day U.F.O.'s decendents of past extraterrestrial visitors making regular return trips to take a look at a world which they helped to create? Sounds plausible.

Are these space men planning an invasion or wishing to establish or re-establish friendly contact? Have they already done so? Some would say "yes" others, mainly official sources, would give a resounding "No".

Earthlings can only wait and see, and, perhaps, hope that the question of 'U.F.O.'s and 'extra-terrestrial beings' will one day be answered and, at the same time, wonder if and why we should be the only and the most advanced form of life in a universe which we are just beginning to explore and understand.





In Vienna you will find Schonbrunn Palace. Vienna is where the Riesenrad the giant Ferris wheel - goes round, where the Vienna Boys' Choir sings, and where you will find the world famous Spanish Riding School.

Specialities

Vienna is old and new - and provides such an interesting combination of the two that there are countless different ways in which every visitor can discover and experience the city.

Visitors to Vienna are always particularly struck by the fact that it is higher than they had expected.

The mighty facades of the many great buildings, and palaces are often five or six storeys high. Many of these palaces were built in the 18th century, and it was the baroque building boom that changed the face of the city and gave it the name "Vienna gloriosa"



some of the finest views of Vienna - on a fine day, of course. The countryside around Vienna is also full of variety, ranging from the Wachau, the most lovely stretch of the Danube valley, to the nearby Schneeberg and Rax mountains (both around 2,000 metres high) and the puszta, or Hungarian steppes, in Burgenland.

It's an easy day trip by boat to Melk, a baroque abbey towering above the Danube, and the fascinating Renaissance castle of Schallaburg.

Peaceful monasteries like Heiligenkreuz and Klosterneuburg and romantic castles such as Greifenstein and Kreuzenstein are only a few kilometres from the gates of the city and are ideal goals for half-day excursions.



Heathrow facelift

London Heathrow Airport's Terminal 3 is to undergo a £68 million redevelopment programme designed to improve comfort and service.

The departures and arrivals buildings will be enlarged and refurbished and work will begin early next year immediately after British Airways' long haul services are transferred from Terminal 3 to the new £200 million Terminal 4. The redevelopment is expected to be completed by early

Floor space for passengers checking in luggage will be increased by 40 per cent and the departure lounge will have additional seating and more floor space.

The catering area will be larger and the Duty and Tax Free shop will double in size. A new automated baggage handling system capable of sorting items by laser will be installed.

The baggage reclaim area will be 70 per cent larger and new carousels will handle 50 per cent more baggage. The arrivals concourse and the immigration hall will both be extended.

The redevelopment is timed to take advantage of a temporary drop in the annual total of about 11 million passengers passing through Terminal 3, when British Airways, responsible for a third of that figure, transfers its international flights to Terminal 4.

GOIC talks on Arab industries

The meeting is expected to discuss ways of increasing industrial co-operation, marketing issues and problems of competition facing the private industrial sector.

The Doha-based GOIC is an inter-Governmental body comprising Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Iraq, Bahrain, Oman and the UAE.

Real estate rules are approved

The Deputy Prime Minister for Financial and Economic Affairs, Qais bin Abdul Munim Al-Zawawi, announced approval of a recent study concerning ownership of real estate by AGCC citizens in Oman.

The implementation of terms covering aspects of ownership, purchase and the sale of real estate by AGCC citizens in Oman will not affect the existing real estate market in the Sultanate.

The Secretariat has been authorised by AGCC Heads of State to examine the observations made in the study and to take protective measures to bring the matters in line with implementation of the formula.

On the question of a unified currency the Deputy Prime Minister said that this is included in the subject of economic co-operation and will be put forward by the Secretariat General of AGCC at forthcoming conferences of the governors of AGCC Central Banks.



RO 7m loan for Oman Refinery

Sayyala oilfield on stream

The Sayyala oilfield has come on stream producing about 1,500 cubic metres of dry oil a day.

The RO 800,000 early development facility (EDF) project has been completed on schedule and within the budget, according to the latest edition of 'Al Fahal', a Petroleum Development Oman publication.

Sayyala is different from most other EDF projects in that it has the capacity to handle water produced with the oil. The water cut is very low at present but is expected to increase as production continues.

The production facility is equipped with bulk and test separators, a dehydration tank and a water disposal system through which production water is reinjected into the ground.

Starting in early April, the plant was designed, constructed and brought on stream in six months with first production early last

The wells are self-producing. In contrast to the heavier oil fields of the south, the oil is very light, at around 48 degree API. It has a high proportion of natural gas liquids and the permanent production facilities, due for completion in mid-1986, will have an NGL plant to handle them.

The atlas, a graphic account of 15 years of achievement under the leadership of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos, presents basic information of the socio-economic scene as in the mid-1985. Illustrated with detailed maps and diagrams and general information texts, the atlas can be a working tool to those who share in making decisions regarding the loca-

tion of projects and facilities.

Pin-pointed are locations of banks, industrial and agricultural sectors, petroleum, gas and mineral concentrations, cultural and tourism centres, hotels, roads, airports, seaports, social housing, community development projects and postal and telecommunications facilities, among other things.

The atlas informs the reader of the rapid changes that have taken place during the past 15 years. As it says in the forward: "With few exceptions, the maps presented here would be blank were they to illustrate the situ-

ation in 1970."

The 382-page Statistical Year Book, the 13th issue, carries details pertaining to the past year as well as previous years up to 1970.

The additional information in the current issues relates to the series of unit value indices of imports and a new series on national accounts at constant prices.

Mrs Rajiha bint Abdul Ameer, Acting Under-Secretary for Planning and Director-General of National Statistics, supervised preparations for the publication of both the atlas and year book.

UK trophy for OCL

RO 1.5m loan for Oman Lubricants

The Oman Development Bank on Saturday signed a loan agreement with Oman Lubricants Company LLC for a new lubricants plant at Mina al Fahal.

The RO 1,500,000 loan agreement was signed by Mr. Mohammed bin Moosa al Yousuf, Chairman of the bank and Mr. C.P. Harrison, General Manager of Oman Lubricants.

Oman Lubricants Company is currently constructing a plant incorporating the most advanced blending systems of its kind in the world. Representing a several million Rials joint venture between Shell and a group of Omani partners, the high-technology plant is being constructed by a local company Yahya Costain - Process Engineering Division.

Oman Lubricants Company was

incorporated in January 1984 and is managed by Shell Markets (Middle East) Limited. The engineering design used in the construction of the plant and the advanced computer process technology is being supplied by the Royal Dutch Shell Group of Companies. When the plant is commissioned at the beginning of 1986, it will initially have an annual capacity of 15,000 tonnes covering about 30 different lubricants.

At present all lubricants sold in the Sultanate are imported from manufacturers in Europe and the Far East. In future, most local demand is expected to be met by the output from the new plant, including such popular brands as Super Motor Oil, Rotella 40, Rimula X, Spirax and Tellus.

...and loans for four other firms

Oman Development Bank has also signed four other loan agreements with promoters of various new industrial projects.

The Under-Secretary of Finance, Mohammed bin Moosa, who is also Chairman of ODB, signed for the bank while the promoters singed on behalf of their companies.

According to one of the agreements, the bank will extend RO 30,000 to the Gulf Aluminium Company which has an investment of RO 115,000 and will have a production capacity of 100 tonnes per year.

The Bid Bid Plastic Products LLC - with an investment of RO 150,000 and a production capacity of 50,000 polypropylene mats a year, will get RO 75,000 from the bank.

The bank has also granted RO 300,000 to the Oman Metal Industries Company which has an investment of RO 600,000. The company specialises in the production of truck bodies, dumpers, tankers and flat-bed trailers.

A loan of RO 15,000 has been sanctioned by the bank for the Mohammed Tayyeb al Alawi Establishment which has a capital of RO 25,000.

Marginal fall in profits for Gulf Helicopters

The Gulf Helicopters Company, a Gulf Air subsidiary, expects to make a profit of QR 2.5 million this year against last year's QR 3 million. Abdullah al Attiya, Chairman, said recession had been the main reason for the fall in profits.

He was talking to newsmen after a meeting of the board of directors of the Doha-based company last week in Doha. The board also discussed future plans. "Future expansion plans depend on the North Field gas project," Mr Attiya said.

The gas project is likely to provide substantial opportunities for the expansion of the fleet and of manpower. He said it was necessary to train nationals as pilots and engineers.

Gulf Helicopters, now registered in England, has decided to register itself in

Qatar. Mr Attiya said it offere'd several advantages to become a national company.

The company has a fleet of six helicopters. The main client is Qatar General Petroleum Corporation, which has a three-year contract due to expire in 1988. Occasional charter requests are made from Abu Dhabi and Oman.

The board decided to limit operating expenditure next year to QR 21 million, decreasing it by 4.5 per cent from the current year figure.

A new gas turbine station is to be set up in Dubai with a capacity of 200 Mw of electricity per hour, the daily 'Al Bayan' said. The plant, consisting of four gas turbines, will also include desalination units to provide Dubai with 20 million gallons of water per day.

Kuwait's I-card campaign

Some 19,612 Kuwaitis and expatriates have been fingerprinted in the first phase of the 'identity card' campaign, according to the Director of the Criminal Investigation Department, Brig. Mansour Ahmad al Ibrahim.

The programme began in September and covered the areas of Dasmah, Deiya and Al She'b and all residents above the age of 18.

Of the total, 9,430 were Kuwaitis, Brig. al Ibrahim said. Those found to be stateless numbered 306.

Defaulters who failed to reigster fingerprints with the department have been asked to report to special centres during working hours.

The programme is expected to last 18 months and the second phase is expected to start shortly in the areas of Qadisiyah, Mansouriyah, Shamiyah, Nuzha, Shuweikh, Fayha and Abdalla al Salem.

In the Failaka Island, fingerprints of 1,850 Kuwaitis have bee recorded, Brig.

Saudi film on deserts

A documentary film on the destruction of arable land and desertification in Saudi Arabia has been produced in Riyadh.

The film was produced in the Al Nafuz desert in Rub al Khali in the Eastern Province. It shows different sandstorms and various experiments on the subject conducted by the University of Petroleum and Minerals and King Saud University.

The film was inspired by the studies made in Riyadh city by King Saud University - on the 3,700 tonnes of sand found in the city every month. The film suggests a plantation programme as the best solution to the problem of desertification.

'Palm Tree' meeting

Gamal Awad v Ross Norman - "I think Ross Norman will take apart Gamal Ahwad. He is very potent at the moment and if anyone was entitled to claim the No. 2 spot officially it would be him. His overall results are much more consistent."

The way you move around the squash court is just as important as the strokes you play.

No matter how good a strokemaker you are, you won't win points if you don't have good court movement.

Firstly it is very important to watch the ball at all times, even when your opponent is about to serve.

Watch the ball, don't watch the front wall, and this will help you to anticipate where the ball is going.

When your opponent is ready to hit a shot, bend your knees. Then, when you take your first step towards the ball, move very quickly, and maintain the pace with your second movement.

The speed of your movements will determine how quickly you can put your opponent under pressure, so always be fast.

On the Iraq-Iran war the Egyptian President said Egypt was working to put an end to the war and appealed to both Iraq and Iran to stop the fighting.

In response to a question on the

possibility of freezing the Camp David accords, Hosni Mubarak said the accords were already frozen as a result of Israel's attitudes regarding the Palestinian issue. However President Mubarak said the cancellation of the Camp David accords will be an irrational step that will please Israel and relieve the Israelis from a commitment to solve the Palestinian issue as stipulated in the accords.

According to a preliminary report, a baggage Xray machine at Toronto airport where the flight began was faulty on the day of the flight. Some baggage was cleared before the fault was discovered.

The Emir of Qatar arrived in Paris on Wednesday for a threeday State visit to France during which he will hold talks with President Francois Mitterrand and other French officials.

India extends 'hand of co-operation'

Indian Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi spoke to the people of Oman in an address telecast by Oman Television during his visit to the Sultanate for the 15th National Day celebrations.

In his talk, Mr. Gandhi spoke of the traditional links between Oman and India and praised the Sultanate's development efforts.

He urged the Arab Gulf Cooperation Council to focus on the possibilities of what he called 'South-South cooperation'

His address also covered global and regional tensions and the Palestinian issue.

Mr Gandhi said that there was a long tradition of contacts between Oman and India. The Gulf and Arabian Sea, he said have been a bridge between the two countries.

"Five thousand years ago the people of the Indus Valley traded

actively with Dilmun, the land we know today as Oman," he said adding that European sailors had depended on Omani navigators to find the sea route to India.

The Indian Prime Minister said India had followed with keen interest the strides made by Oman in the last 15 years under the enlightened guidance of His Majesty.

"This is my first visit to Oman and I take this opportunity to reiterate India's support for Oman's development endeavours," he said. "You are embarking on your third Five Year Plan. India extends her hand of cooperation to you in your task of utilising your country's rich resources and potentials."

Mr Gandhi said that as fellow members of the Non-Aligned Movement, Oman and India had

common interests in defusing global and regional tensions.

Turning to the Indian expatriates working in Oman, the Indian Prime Minister said there were nearly a quarter of a million Indian nationals in Oman who contributed to the Sultanate's national progress and prosperity.

"The Government and people of Oman have shown the friendliest of feeling for them. I as sure that Indians residing here in Oman will continue to work unsparingly for the progress and development of Oman to deepen the friendship that prevails between our two countries," he said.
